: Apollo 12 Postflight Report

I. Problems/Resolution.

A. Prelaunch - At approximately T-1:30, the crew reported observing "all 8's" appear on the DSKY for one update then return to normal PØ2 configuration. The data was not observed in Houston. The mission timer also experienced a shift to its internal configuration at that time. At some time later another similar sequence occurred. No one could find any further problems nor an exact explanation. MIT was asked to investigate. Since no further effects could be found, a GO from all concerned was given. MIT provided the likely explanation which is included as enclosure 1. The GNC Controllers state that a similar problem had been observed during system testing at North American.

B. Launch through Evasive.

1. Launch.

a. Data recorded during this phase is as follows:

The GMT guidance reference release times observed were:

IU 16:21:43.02

CMC 16:22:00.68

This resulted in a computed launch azimuth of 72.029°.

IU timebase times passed to HOSC after BSE confirmation were:

TBl :17

TB4 9:29

TB5 11:51

b. Loss of the CSM inertial platform - At approximately GET = 36 secs, all data from the CMC was lost as indicated on display and stripcharts. A power "glitch" was reported by EECOM. The data returned at ~ 48 secs at which time two reasonable CMC state vectors were obtained which reflected on the stripcharts. The CMC data was again lost until approximately 61 secs at which time an event indicating a G and N platform failure was recorded on the stripcharts. Several failure events were observed, five restarts and the 1105 (downlink too fast) and 3777 (CDU failure caused the ISS warning) alarms were noted. The CDU's indicated the platform was still spinning out of control. No further valid acceptable state vectors were obtained, verifying the CMC had lost all knowledge of its navigation state. An effort was made to secure the platform to minimize damage to the inertial components. We considered using the "IMU cage" switch but decided that might be too hard on the components. It should have "coarse aligned" when the CMC determined that the platform had apparently rotated into gimbal lock. Due to the large attitude errors in the error counter, the platform never stabilized until the IMU power was turned off via the circuit breakers at approximately 10:30. A detailed MIT investigation was conducted and is included as enclosure 2.

Crew reports were sufficient confirmation that the platform was lost and that the G and N was "NO-GO. Discussions with FDO resulted in the following reports to Flight:

- •There would be no "SIVB to COI" call.
- •The only Mode IV capability was "one-impulse-line-on-the-horizon", i.e., the delayed Mode IV call.
- c. <u>IU state vector errors at EOI</u> At EOI, noticeable differences existed between the <u>IU</u> state vector and the high speed C-band radar vector. Only very slight differences were detectable during source shifts late in launch phase. There was no positive indication of problems in the <u>IU</u> navigation. No stripchart failure discretes from the <u>IU</u> were recorded during the anomaly at 36 secs nor throughout the launch phase. BSE3 reported a possible platform anomaly which was later determined inconclusive and was dropped by all as possible bad data.
- FDO, having no confirmation of IU problems, elected to go to orbit with that source since all sources confirmed a GO orbit. The problem was not again considered discussion worthy until post-CRO tracking was in, confirming differences observed at EOI. All other IU guidance reports during launch phase were nominal.
- 2. Earth Orbit All normal activities for earth orbit were completed with the following additions:
- a. \underline{G} and \underline{N} evaluation The \underline{G} and \underline{N} needed to be returned to a normal configuration to verify that it was satisfactory for continuing the mission. The following sequence was recommended and executed to verify the \underline{G} and \underline{N} :

- •Had "AGC" verify all possible CMC data available on high speed telemetry displays. Verified no problems.
- •Generated and loaded the RTCC launch REFSMMAT at CYI shortly after insertion. The P52 preferred option 1 was required since a P51 alignment was necessary to determine the platform orientation. P51 destroys the onboard REFSMMAT which was valid. RTC reconfigured CYI from IU to CSM for commanding. The crew completed the alignment shortly after CRO AOS, torquing at 52:29.
- •The following sequence established CRO/HSK first pass:
 - •V96E To stop CMC integration prior to a NAV update. He got a 20430 alarm indicating a sub-surface vector prior to executing the V96E, which was valid.
 - •EMOD dumps Over CRO since their command computer was down. TIC was briefed and a good recording was obtained at GET = 55 mins. It was played back at CRO LOS and verified as "all GO" by AGC at GET 1:46.
 - •Navigation updates First update was to get CMC back on line at HSK using EOI insertion vector. Did V66 and V45 to get configuration back to nominal prior to HSK LOS.
 - •CMC self-check Done as backup to EMOD. Completed satisfactory at GET 1:37 prior to receipt of EMOD.
 - IMU vs IU gimbal angle comparisons Began at CRO and continued through TLI. Showed no drifting trends.
 - •Second P52 Recommend second P52 option 3 as drift check during second darkness prior TLI. This was completed at GET 2:20:20 with the following GO torque angles:

x -00.014°

Y -00.028°

Z +00.018°

- •Gross PIPA checks They were conducted by GNC. These were given a GO over the states.
- •States pass: Updated CMC state vector with TEXS17 for TLI.

- •CRO second pass: Gave final "GO" on G and N based on P52 torque angles (GET = 2:28).
- •Poct-TLI ARIA telemetry data recorded during TLI was played back through the HAW ground station. The data was run through a vector comparison scheme similar to launch phase. The differences between IU and CMC after correcting for initial state vectors errors showed excellent performance of the G and N under powered flight conditions.
- b. IU state vector errors We used the normal procedure of checking IU orbital elements in the case when stripchart data is lost at EOI. The orbital elements were checked at CRO/HSK and over the states. Both radar vectors reflected similar differences from the IU vector as follows:

The errors were considered large but not near the limit value.

Discussion with FDO post-HSK update showed that using an IU vector for TLI prediction and integrating the radar vector over the TLI profile reflected a slightly smaller than nominal MCCl. Decided there was no justification for updating IU due to greater concern for CSM at this point in the mission, and the fact that no criteria exists for updating with no observed discrete IU guidance failures. Flight was advised of noteworthy IU errors, but that they were not near limits. The trajectory support area at HOSC, Huntsville, Alabama, was sent the IU telemetry vectors, the HSKS12 and TEXS17 track vectors and apprised of the vector differences including comments that the error, assuming no further degradation, would not cost us any MCC penalty.

MSFC data predicted on the IU vector reflected 22 fps total inertial velocity difference a TLI cutoff when compared to the RTCC double integrated output. The difference was such that TLI cutoff would be effectively underspeed. The MCCl prediction indicated that it would be in such a direction as to cost less ΔV but rotate the trajectory conic back to the desired conditions. The TLI pad was based on the expected cutoff conditions. At actual cutoff, the vector comparisons reflected approximately 24 fps difference in the underspeed direction. FDQ and GDO were satisfied with the resultant comparisons which showed good agreement between high speed radar sources and the CMC cutoff vector. The IU showed the expected error.

The IU telemetry vector was sent to HOSC (ICHU 15) per premission plan. An attempt to contact HOSC to determine if they desired a high speed radar cutoff vector was futile. The problem was unknown loss of the HOSC Network loop. Since HOSC was not nominally expecting any further vectors, there was no further attempt to communicate until at the agreed on later time. Houston voice later was contacted and the line reestablished. There was no particular concern at MCC about not sending the high speed radar vector since the pre-TLI radar vector and IU telemetry vectors were there and MCFC had previously stated their plan to use the IU vector for the 507 slingshot maneuver predictions.

3. Evasive - The timeline from TLI cutoff through the evasive was nominal.

C. Translunar Coast.

- 1. Due to the problems encountered during the launch with the S/C G and N, the decision was made to checkout the LM. Upon entering the LM, the crew powered up the LGC and preformed a computer self-test, which was successful, and an erasable memory dump. The erasable memory was checked by AGC and given a "GO". The Guidance Officer was in agreement and gave Flight a "GO" on the LM PGNS.
- 2. A procedural problem was encountered the first time the CSM dumped the erasable memory, which required a second dump. While the data was coming into the remote site on LBR, the INCO commanded HBR causing the RSDP to lose telemetry lock. During the second dump, the site had no problems, and all the data was recorded.
- 3. Two problems were encountered performing star searches in the GOST (MSK 229). The first was an intermittent problem which displayed a star LOS time which was prior to the start of search time. The second anomaly was the displayed star number for certain boresight stars had a leading plus sign rather than a leading zero. Both problems remain open at this time and are being investigated.
- 4. The first two sets of P23's, which are used to determine the horizon altitude bias, revealed a discrepancy. The data from the first set of P23's yielded an altitude bias of 49.2 km and the second set an altitude bias of 24.8 km. In an attempt to resolve the discrepancy, the crew was asked several questions. Based on their answers, it was determined that a different part of the horizon had been used on the two sets. On set No. 1, the top of the haze line was used, and on set No. 2, the blue horizon was used. Then by some sort of black magic, Math Physics and MTT recommended an horizon bias update of 19 km. The horizon bias update of 19 km was passed to the crew.

D. LOI,/LOI2.

1. The maneuver pads and command loads were voiced and uplinked to the spacecraft as per the timeline. Also, an addition to the LOI abort

procedure was passed to the crew which would reset the C Moon (flagword 8 bit 12) and L Moon (flagword 8 bit 11) flags to lunar reference. The update was to correct an error in the prelaunch initialization of the flagword, which was set to earth reference. If left unchanged, the LGC would assume it was in earth orbit rather than lunar orbit.

An additional error that was made during the prelaunch loading of the erasable memory was pointed out by AGC. The transpose of the lunar landing REFSMMAT, which would be used in the LM LOI abort procedures, was loaded rather than the matrix itself. Due to the transpose being an ortogonal matrix, no problem would be encountered had it been used. These two errors in erasable memory initialization point out that a more careful check of the initialization and the crew procedures should be undertaken by MIT.

- E. Predescent Lunar Oribt No problems were encountered prior to the start of LM activation.
 - F. LM Activation through T_3 .
- 1. LGC Program Alarms Two alarms of significance were experienced in this period with no impact on the activity. These are discussed in detail below:
- a. Alarm 212 PIPA fail but PIPA not being used. This alarm occurred during the DSKY light test and was expected as a normal event. However, there was some concern generated in that the alarm never occurred during simulations. The alarm is a side effect of conditions generated to cause the warning lights of illuminate, in particular, the LGC warning light. With the computer fail indication, the LGC inhibits or turns off the gyro torque power supply for the IMU. This power supply also provides the current to bias or compensate the accelerometer. When the float ceased the null activity, the PIPA fail indication was triggered. The alarm never occurred in simulations because the LMS does not exactly duplicate the flight software/hardware interfaces.
- b. Alarm 1106 Uplink too fast. This alarm occurred shortly after the command uplink of PIPA compensation values. The occurrence was noticed after the crew was told of the uplink completion. It is believed by this position that the alarm triggered by the crew changing the DUA switch setting. The LGC carefully checks every signal received from the command hardware. A group of bits in each signal must be of a particular configuration or the LGC disregards the signal as bad data. When the LGC receives a random stray signal, the 1106 alarm is set. To be completely satisfied that the last command uplink was successful, the Guidance position requested the crew to readout the address locations that had been updated. The resultant values readout were as uplinked and everyone was happy. This type of alarm has been experienced on a previous mission, Apollo 7, where a FDAI switch was determined to create noise spikes which gave CMC 1106 alarms throughout the mission.

- 2. Command Uplink Difficulty During LM activation, a remote site command computer problem was discovered which explained a command uplink difficulty. On the first two command loads uplinked to the LGC, not all of the data was received. The uplink had to be retransmitted by the line-by-line mode. On investigation to insure all the data was being transmitted by the remote site, it was discovered that the site (GDS) had experienced ground loop failures during the uplink of the above mentioned command loads. The ground loop failures were further explained as a timing sync problem between the 642B command computer and the updata link buffer hardware. The timing problem caused the updata buffer to request keycode data from the computer at a rate faster than it could transmit. As a reult, a keycode was transferred but never transmitted. The timing problem was a random type thing and proved to be only an inconvenience whenever it occurred.
- G. Lunar Stay The same remote site command problem that occurred during the activation occurred again.
- H. Ascent/Rendezvous During ascent, the IGC/AGS velocity differences grew to approximately 5 fps in all axis at cutoff. During powered flight, these differences were too small to definitely identify either system as the correct one. In fact, the cutoff vectors indicate that although the PNGS was in error in downrange velocity, at least part of the radial velocity difference was due to slight AGS errors. In any case, all errors were well below any switchover limits.

After insertion, Control advised Guidance that the PIPA bias values had changed by $X = -.0049 \, \text{fps}^2$, $Y = -.005 \, \text{fps}^2$, and $Z = +.01 \, \text{fps}^2$. These numbers account for all the downrange error and part of the radial error seen during ascent. The Guidance Officer was later informed that the change in the PGNS PIPA bias on the surface may have been caused by the V35 (DSKY test), which also caused the 212 alarm as described in the descent section.

- I. Postdocking Lunar Orbit The LM impact burn was executed as planned, but there was an apparent overburn of approximately 5.4 ft/sec, which resulted in the LM impacting short of the target point. Exact cause of this miss, though within preflight predictions, is still under investigation.
 - J. TEI No problems were encountered during this phase.
- K. Transearth Coast/Entry The only problem that occurred during the transearth phase was an OCDU fail during P23. The fail indication occurred because the crew did a "Verb 37 Enter" too soon after selecting zero optics. The computer did not have sufficient time to complete optics zeroing process, consequently, it remained in this mode and was unable to drive the optics in CMC when asked. For a more detailed explanation, see enclosure 3.

II. Recommendations.

- A. The errors in the IU vector did not cause any concern at MCC when considering MCCl. However, they apparently cost MSFC a good slingshot maneuver. MCC, for Apollo 12, did not have an acceptable way to simulate the slingshot in the RTCC and was, therefore, not aware of the effect the vectors had on the slingshot. Had a navigation update been the acceptable route in earth orbit, the problems would have been nonexistent. It is recommended that for all future missions, navigation updates be procedurally planned for the IU whenever the vectors reflect confirmed differences outside the accepted MSFN accuracies. Current limits on the IU vectors are unacceptably larger than the MSFN capability.
- B. We strongly recommend that Guidance and Control Division investigate the PIPA bias that occurred on the surface, especially any connection with the V35 test. If there is the remotest chance that V35 execution can influence PIPA biases under the right circumstance, then a careful review of both LM and CSM checklist use of V35 should be made.
- C. We strongly recommend that MIT verify all crew procedures and that the prelaunch erasable memory initialization be compatible with the procedures.
- D. The procedures for formating ARIA playback of TLI information should be reviewed with the RTCC/GPB personnel, quite a bit of confusion resulted when a playback was attempted during translunar coast. Any influence on these procedures by the new RTCC offline vector analysis program should also be clarified.

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ENCLOSURE I

DSKY DISPLAY ANOMALY

Approximately 1.5 hours before liftoff, the crew reported the intermittent appearance of all 8's on the main DSKY numeric display. The reported condition was not observed on telemetry.

The cause of the anomaly is not known at this time, however, one mechanism which could cause the reported symptoms has been encountered previously in the block II DSKY. The electroluminescent segments which make up the displayed characters are controlled by a relay matrix as illustrated in the attached figure. The relays have a small (approximately 0.003 inch) clearance between the contacts, and despite extensive screening, have a history of contamination causing shorts in this area. Because the segments are capacitive, they must be discharged positively to avoid residual glow when turned off. As indicated on the figure the discharge path for all segments is through a common resistor. If, with the relays in the off position as shown, a short occurs across the contacts of any one of the relays, the operating voltage will be applied to all segments through the common discharge path and 8's will appear in all locations.

A failure of this type will affect only the display function of the DSKY involved. All data entry and control functions and the display function of the redundant DSKY (in the CM) will remain operational.

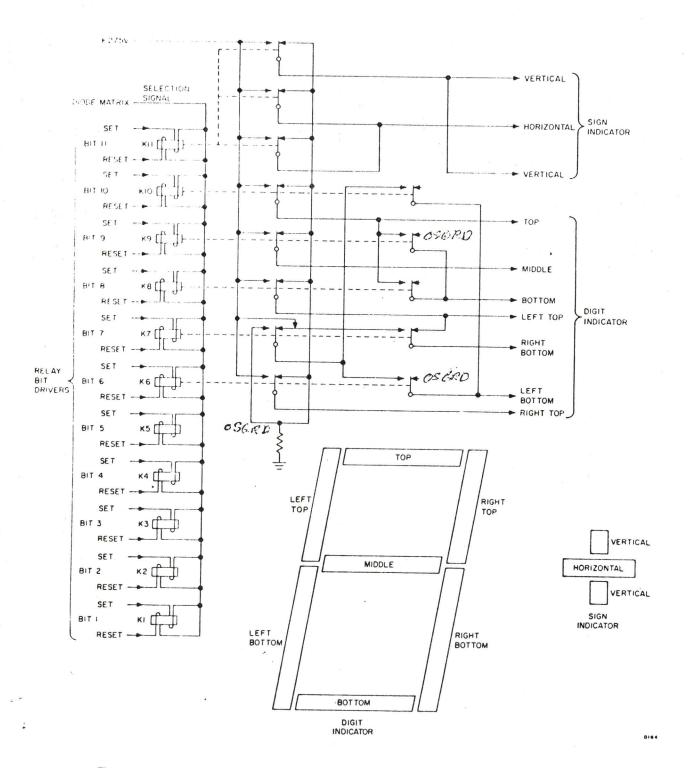


Figure 4-136. Relay Matrix, Simplified Schematic Diagram
