SKYLAB CREW RESCUE COMMAND MODULE

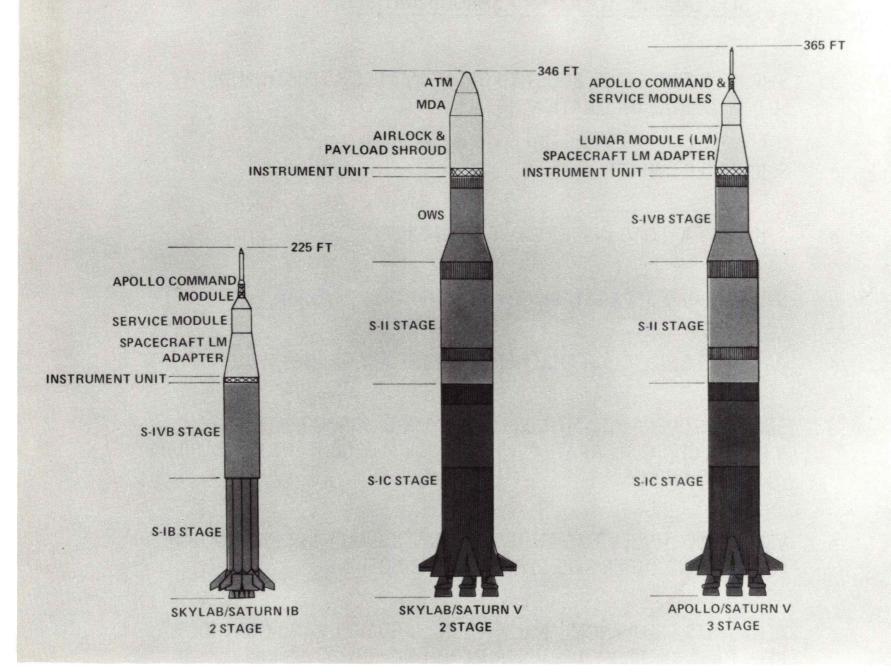

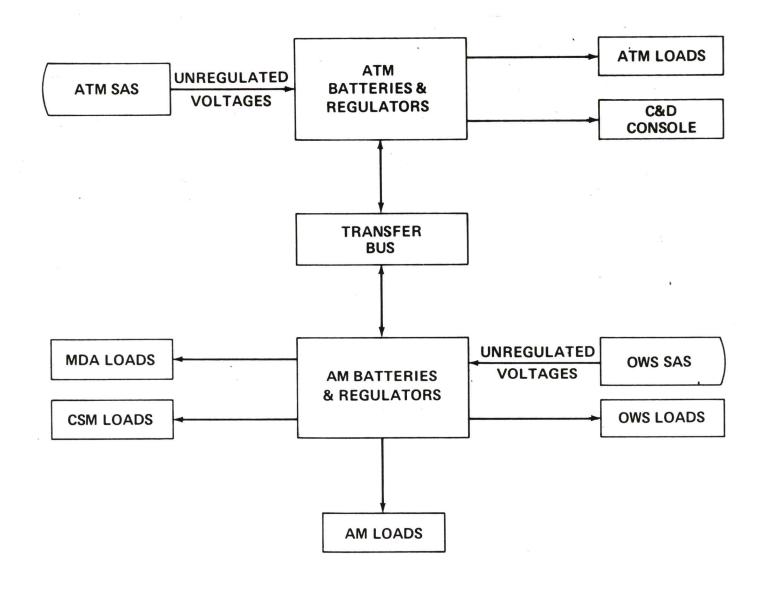


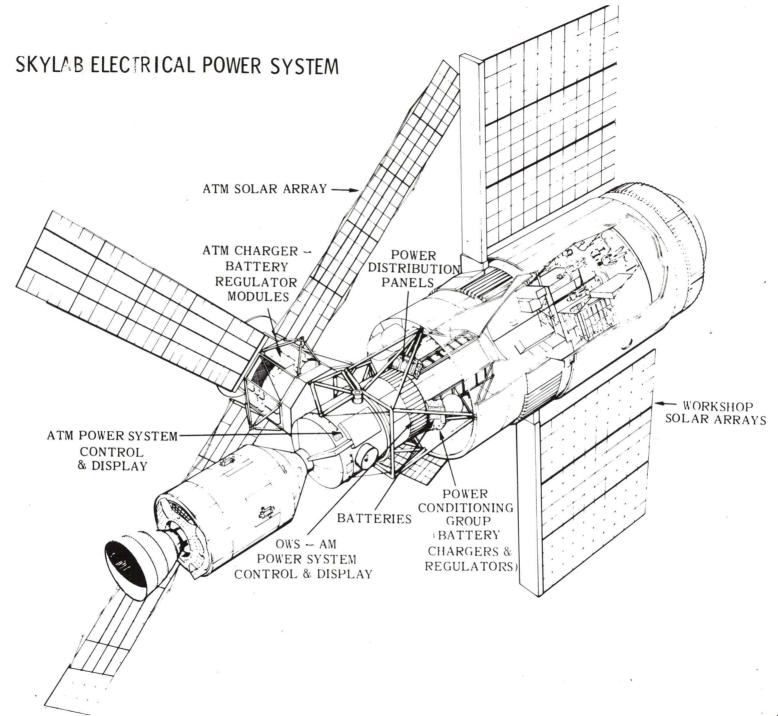


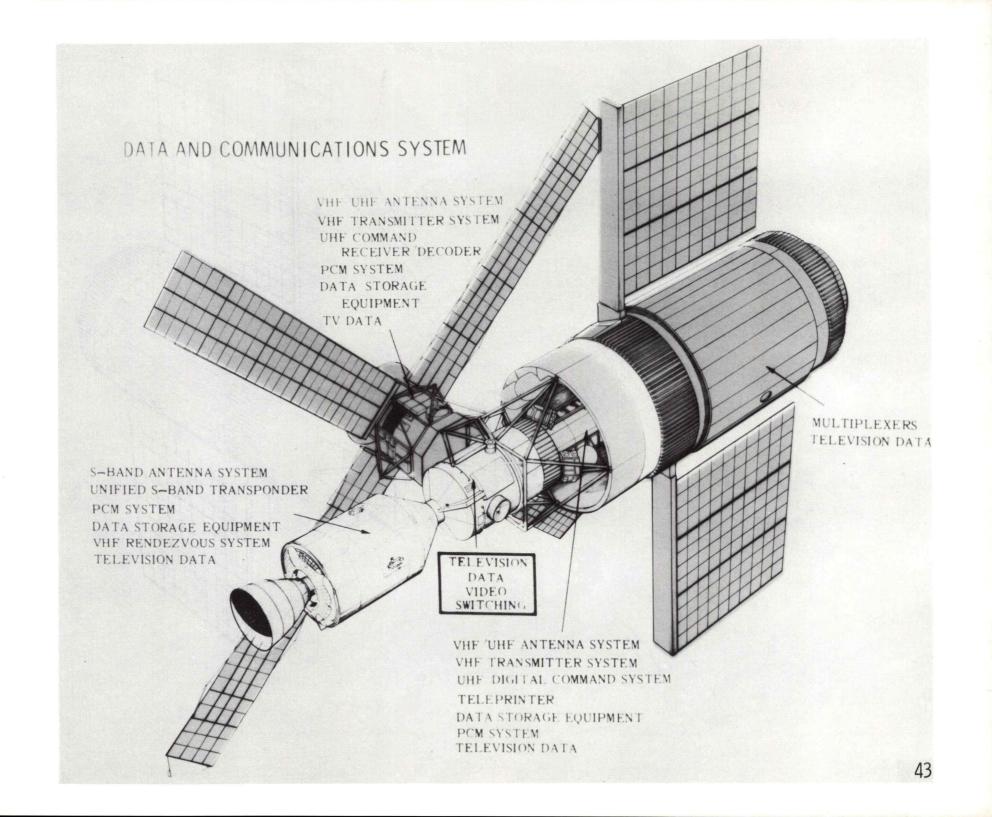
OA ELECTRICAL POWER SYSTEM

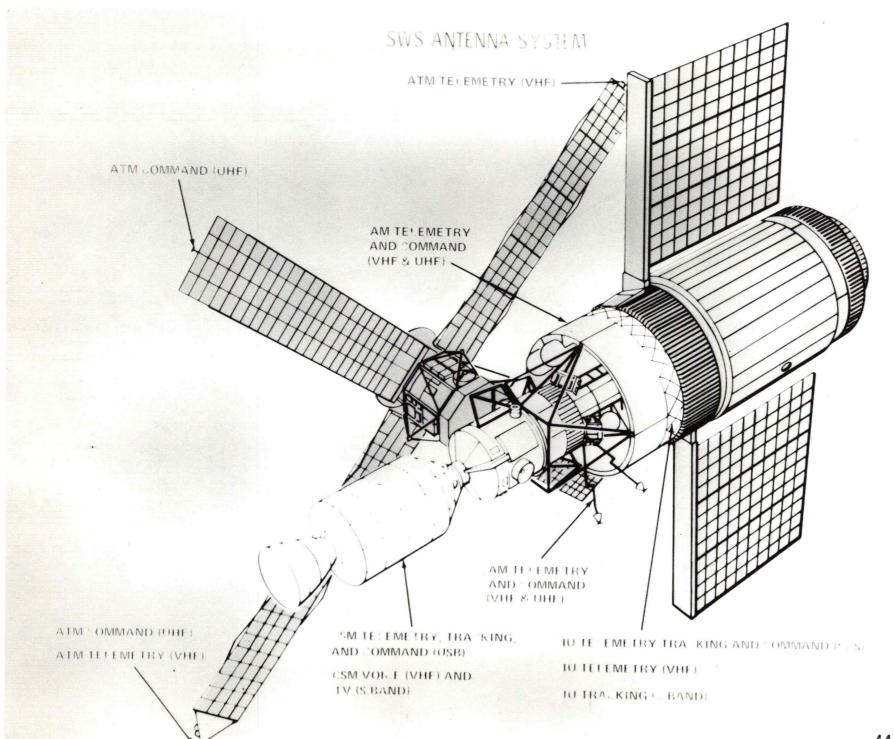
- O ATM EPS GENERATES, CONDITIONS, CONTROLS, AND DISTRIBUTES 26 TO 30 VOLTS VDC POWER TO ATM SYSTEMS, EXPERIMENTS AND TRANSFER BUSES
- O ATM SOLAR ARRAY SYSTEM PROVIDES UNREGULATED POWER TO POWER CONDITIONING AND STORAGE MODULES DURING SUNLIGHT PASS
- SYSTEM IS MANUALLY PARALLELED WITH THE AM POWER SYSTEM,

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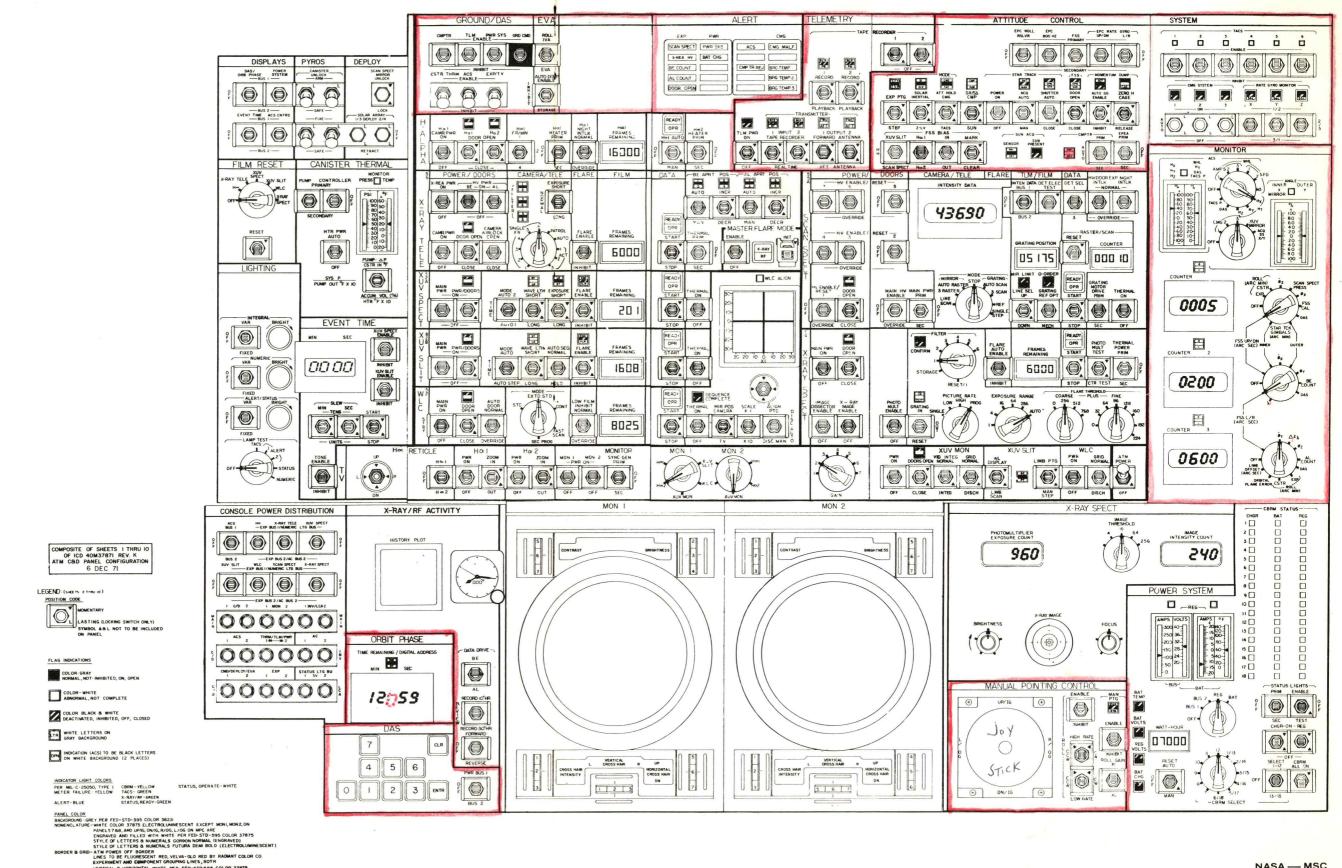

SKYLAB CLUSTER IN EARTH ORBIT—This excellent view of the Skylab 1 space station cluster in Earth orbit was photographed from the Skylab 2 Command/Service Module during the final "fly around" inspection by the CSM. Clouds cover much of the Earth in the background. Sun reflection on the clouds at botton right gives off an interesting coloration. This is a good view of the Earth's terminator. The gold-colored diamond-shaped material on the Orbital Workshop (OWS) shields the vehicle from the powerful rays of the sun. The parasol covers the area where the OWS's micrometeoroid shield is missing. The one remaining OWS solar array system wing has been fully deployed successfully, because of efforts by the astronauts to free the previously stuck solar array beam. The solar panel on the opposite side of the OWS is completely missing.
