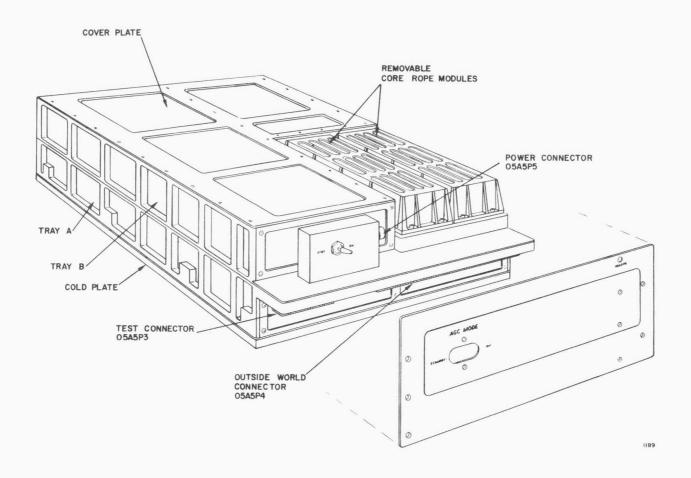


Figure 1. Block IF Computer

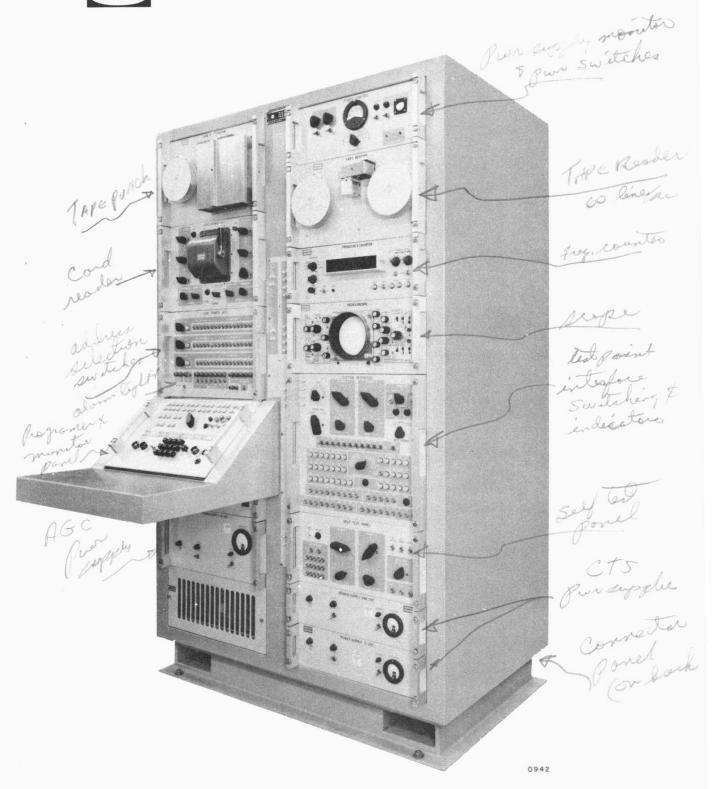


Figure 4. Computer Test Set (CTS)

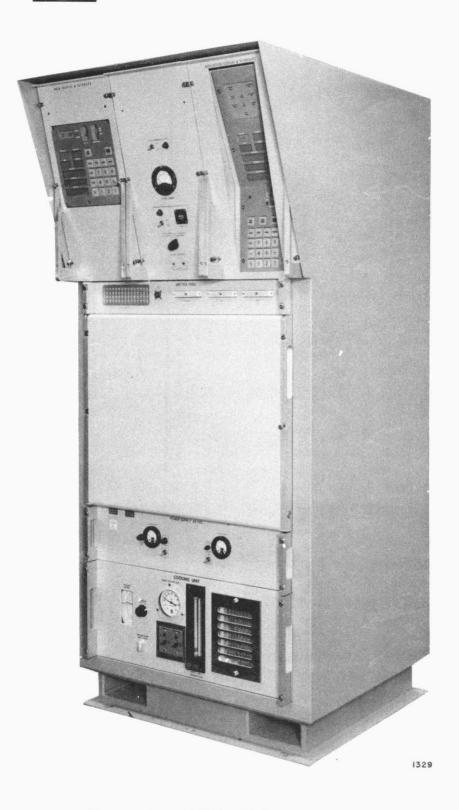


Figure 5. AGC/CTS Operation Console

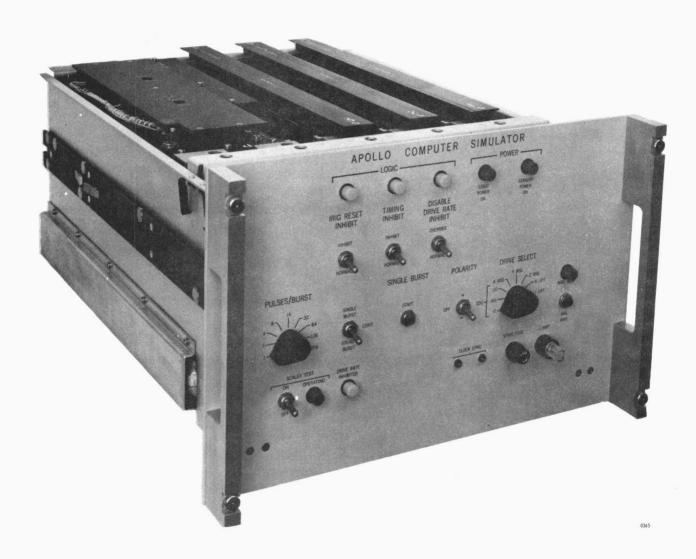


Figure 6. Apollo Guidance Computer Simulator

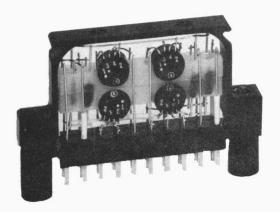
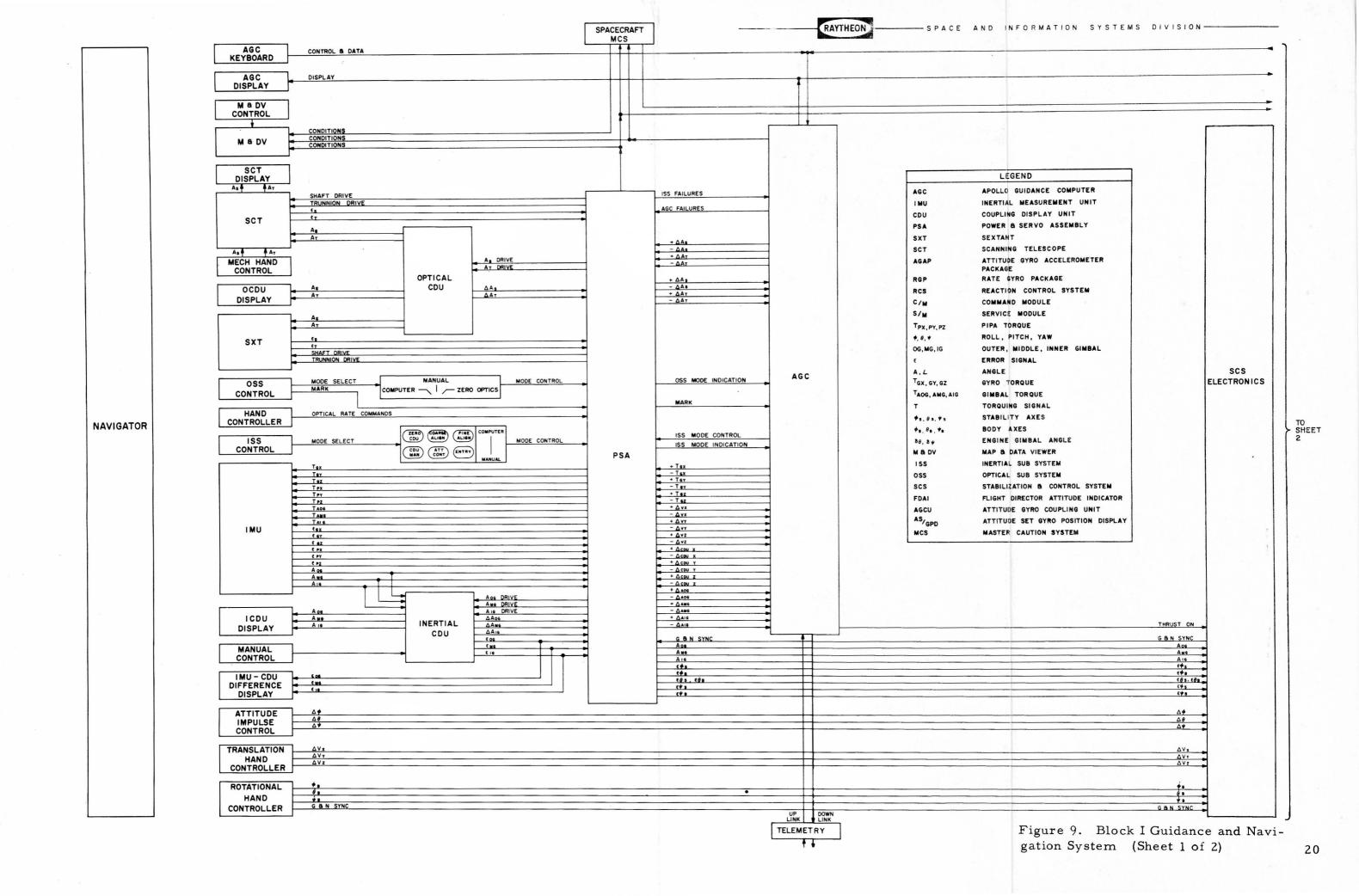




Figure 8. Logic Module and Extraction Tool



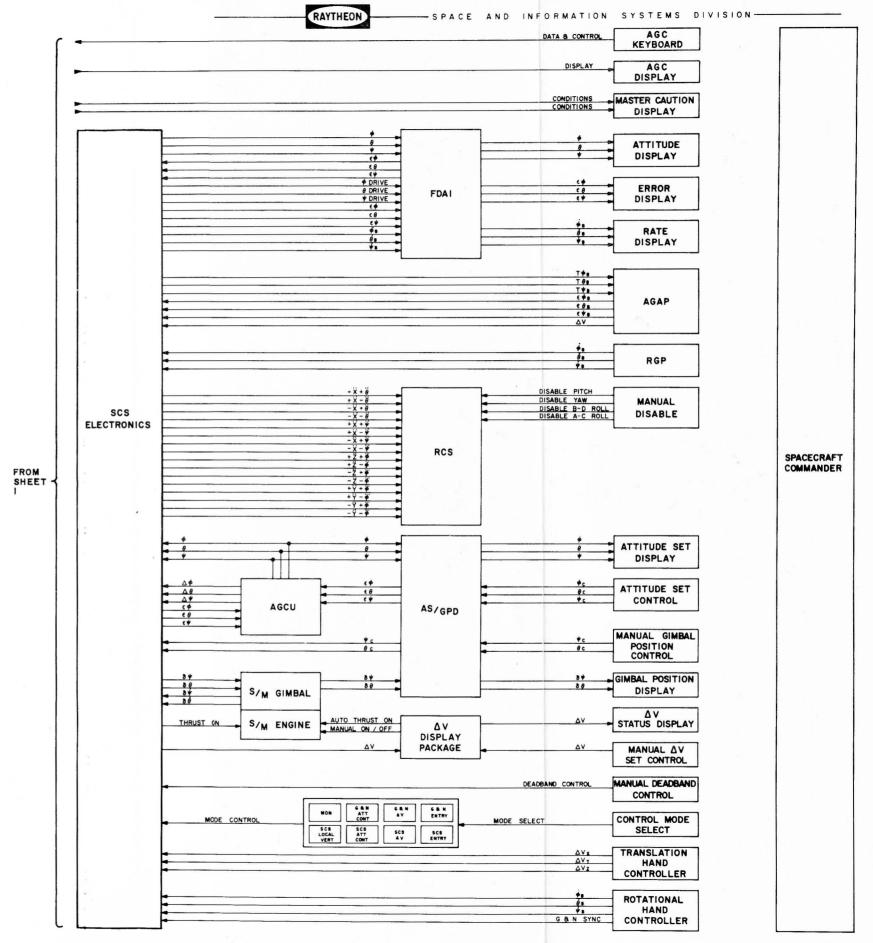


Figure 9. Block I Guidance and Navigation System (Sheet 2 of 2)

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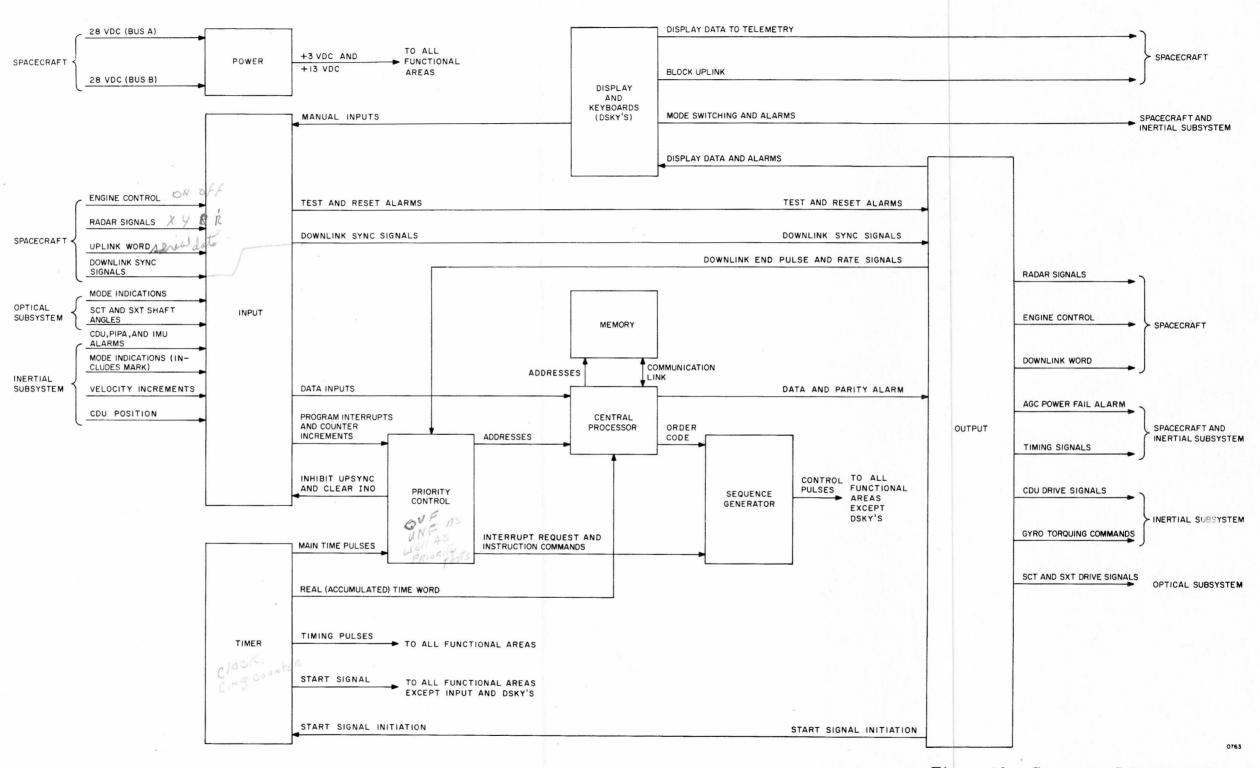


Figure 10. Computer Subsystem General Block Diagram



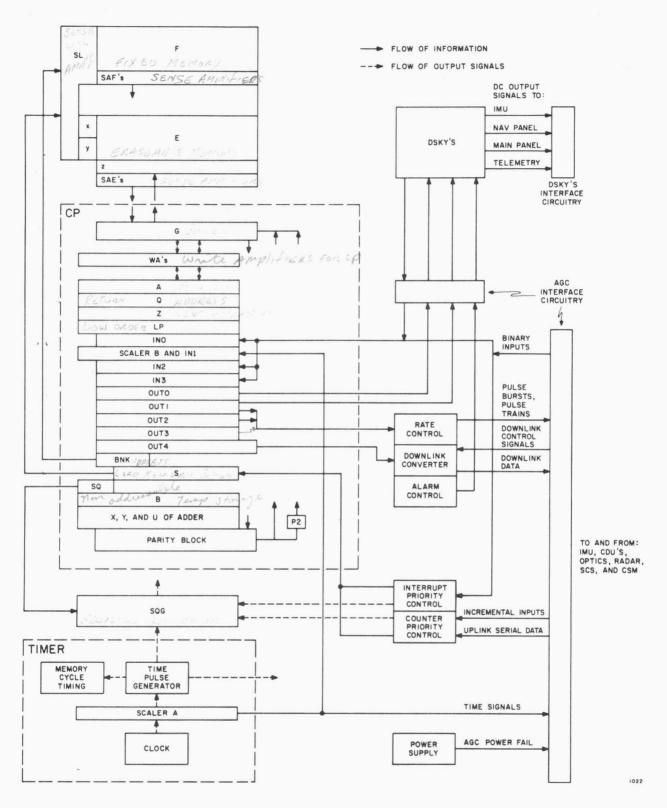
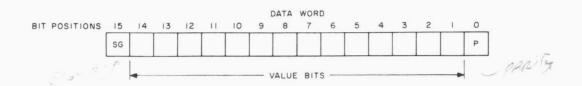
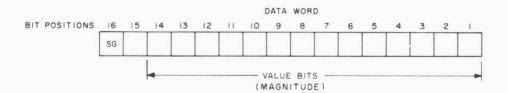


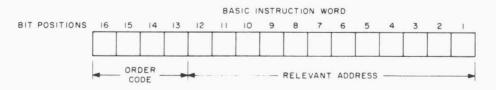
Figure 11. Machine Organization

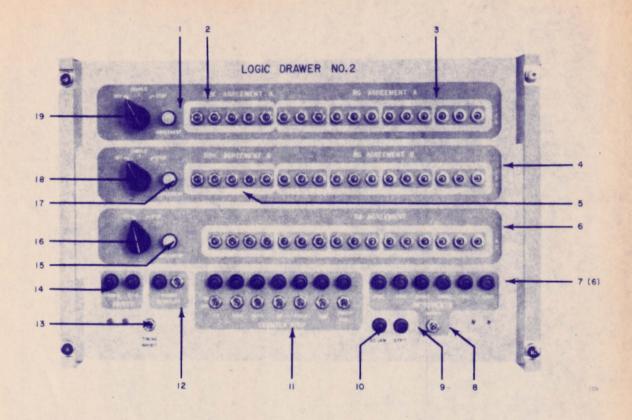

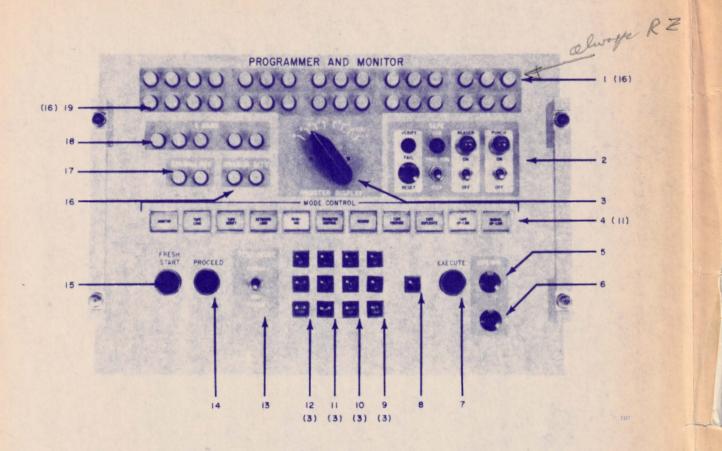

Figure 3. Programmer and Monitor Panel

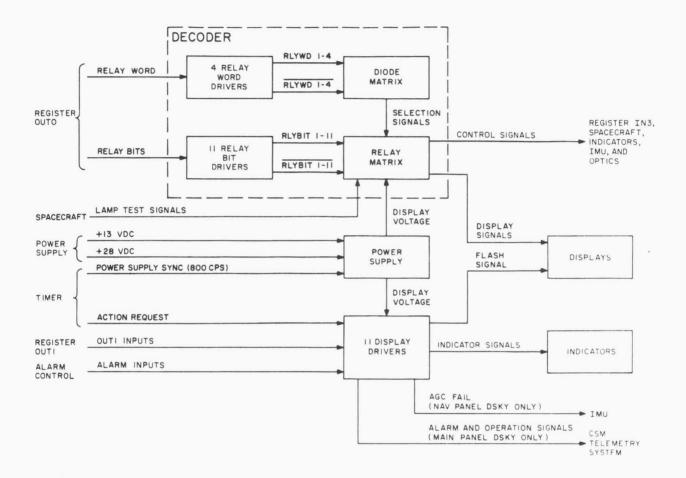


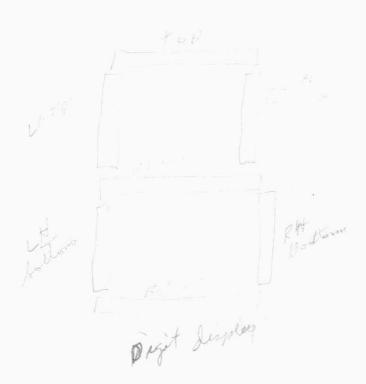
Figure 13. Display

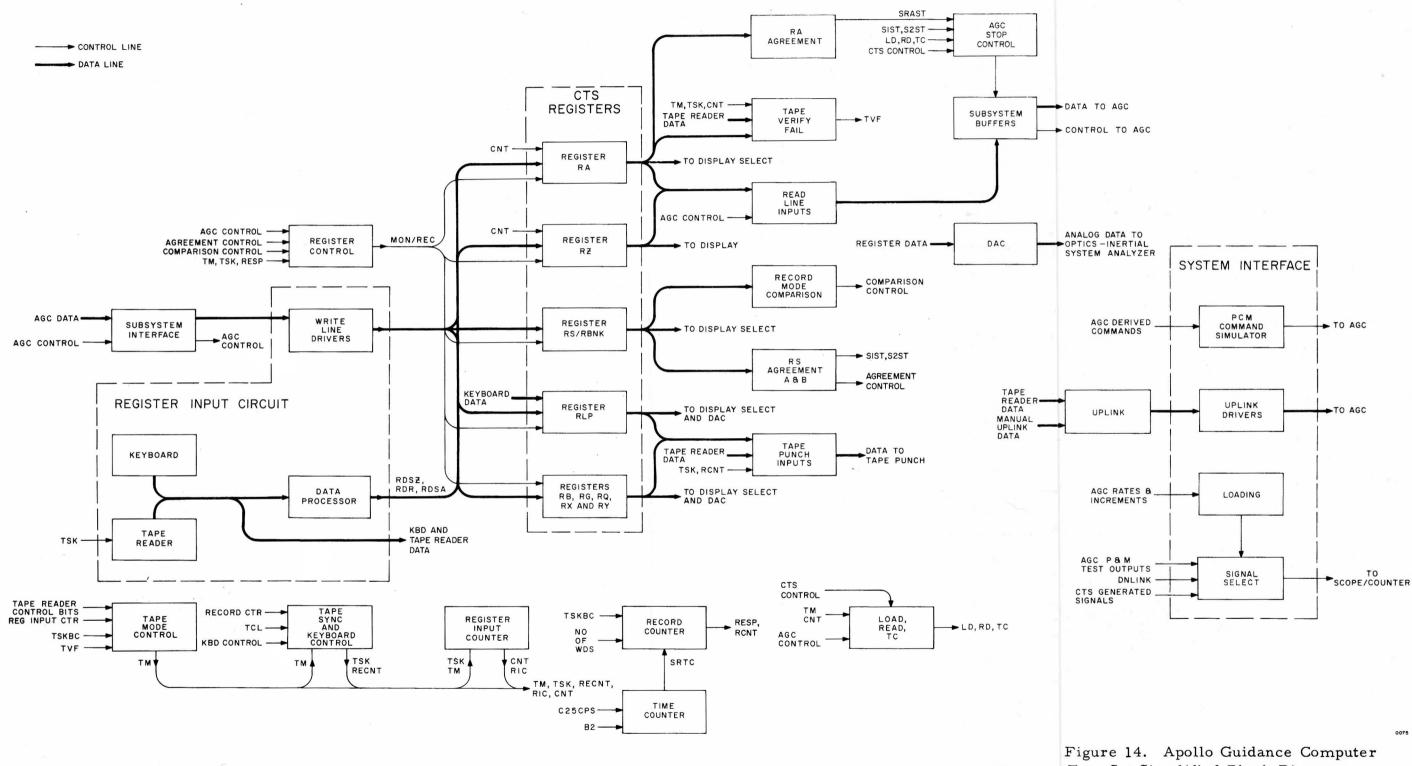

Test Set Simplified Block Diagram

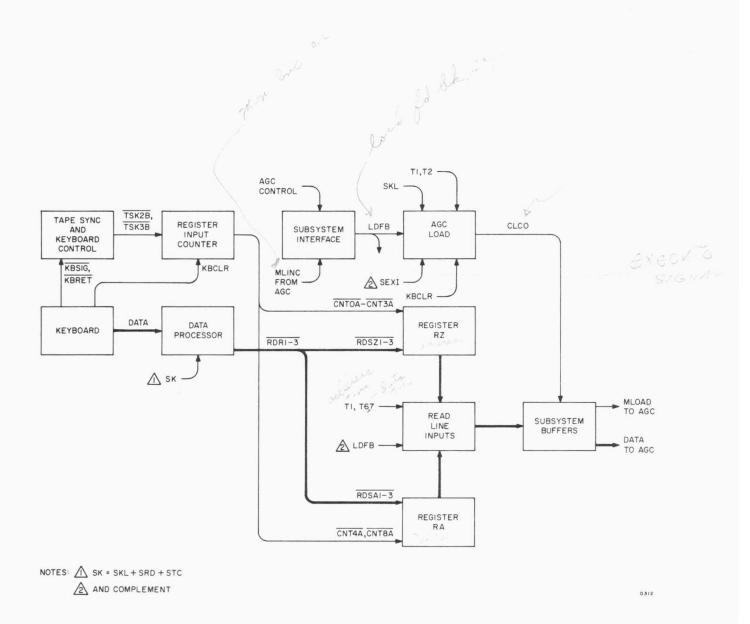


Figure 15. Keyboard Lead Block Diagram

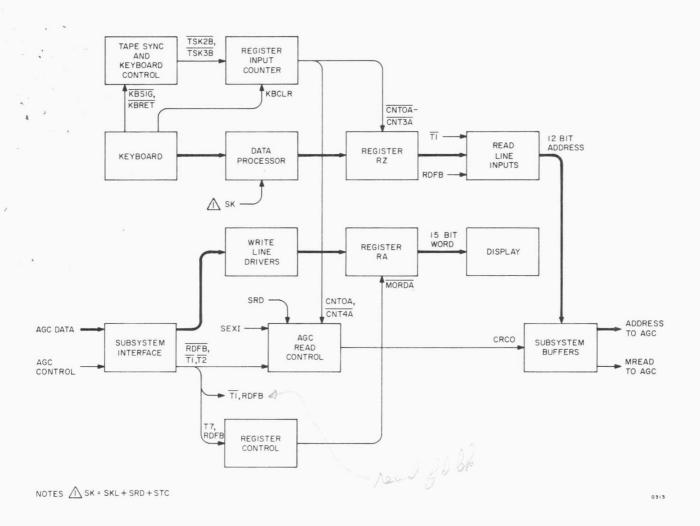


Figure 16. Read AGC Mode Block Diagram

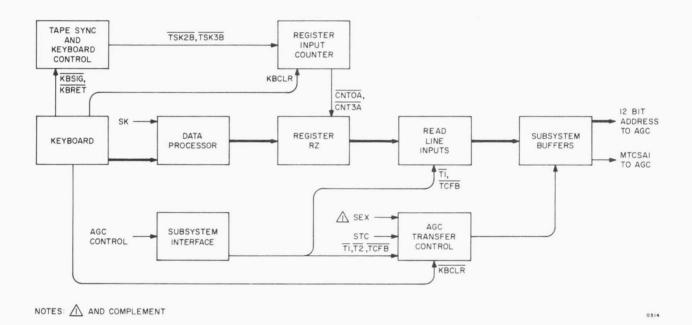


Figure 17. Transfers Control Block Diagram

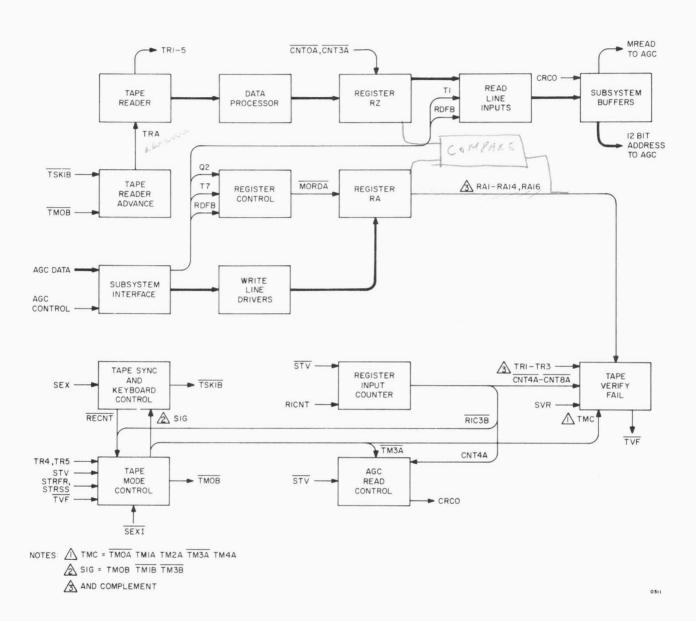
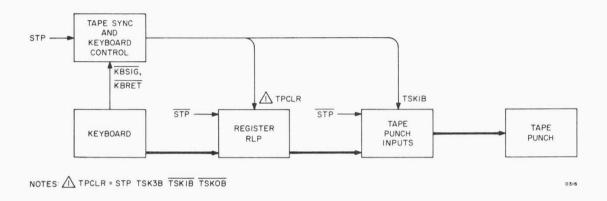


Figure 18. Tape Varify Mode Block Diagram

Figure 19. Tape Preface Mode Block Diagram

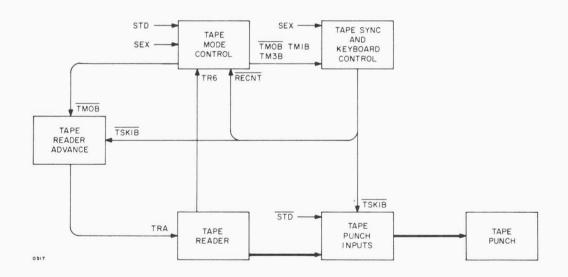


Figure 20. Tape Duplicate Mode Block Diagram

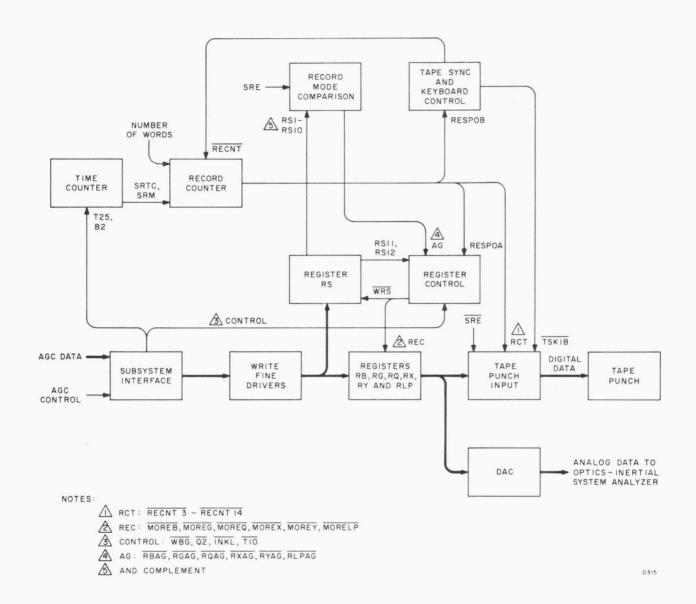


Figure 21. Record Mode Block Diagram

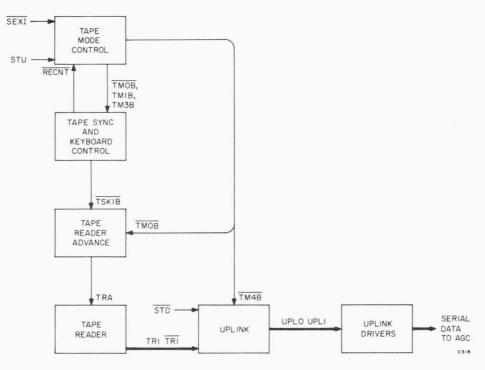


Figure 22. Tape Uplink Mode Black Diagram

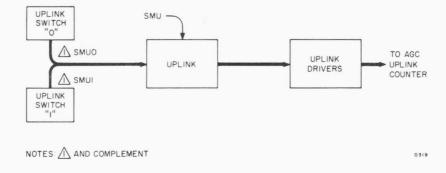


Figure 23. Manual Uplink Mode Block Diagram

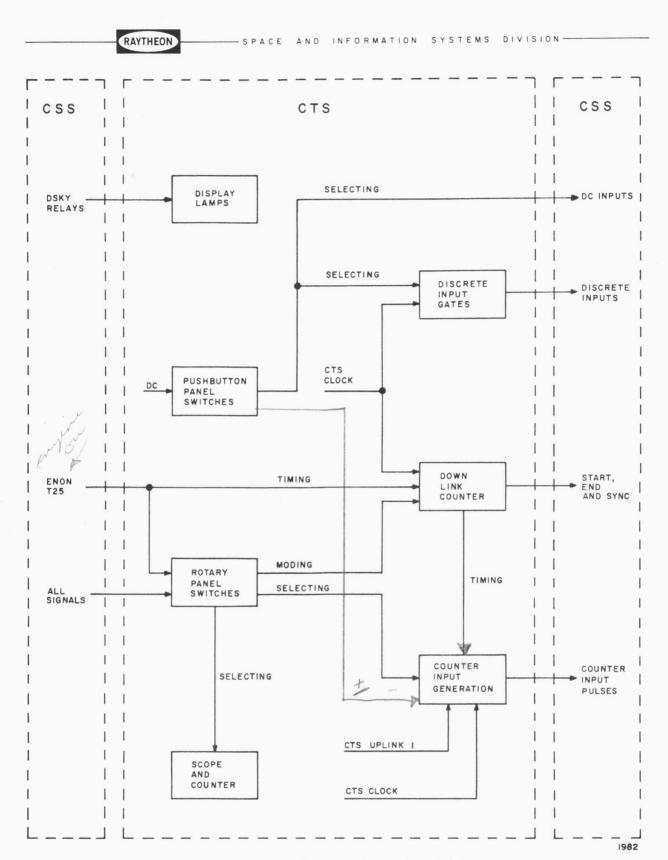


Figure 24. System Interface Unit



Program section Job Control (originally named Executive) consists of two major routines: the Load routine and the Swap routine. Table 12-1 lists the execution times of these two routines. The Job Control carries out the following operations:

- a. It enters pertinent information concerning a Job, whose execution has been requested, into a Job Area and, if necessary, also into a Work Area. A Job Area consists of 8 locations in E memory; 8 different Job Areas are provided; a Work Area consists of 43 locations in E memory; 5 different Work Areas are provided (see table 15-15). The execution of a Job (paragraphs 12-4 through 12-6) may be requested by another Job or by a Task.
- b. It schedules the execution of active Jobs according to their priority.
- c. It puts a Job into a dormant state if that Job requests so.
- d. It returns a Job to the active state if another Job or a Task requested so.

Program section Task Control (previously referred to as Waitlister) consists of two major routines: the WAITLIST routine and the T3RUPT routine. Table 12-1 lists the execution times of these two routines. The WAITLIST routine carries out the following operations:

- a. It determines the time when the execution of a requested Task shall be initiated. The execution of a Task (paragraph 12-7) may be requested by a Job, another Task, or itself.
- b. It schedules the execution of the requested Task according to its times of initiation. This is accomplished by entering pertinent information of the requested Task into the proper place in the Waitinglist.

The T3RUPT routine carries out the following operations:

- a. It initiates the execution of the Task due now.
- b. It moves the Tasks whose execution is due next into place 1 of the Waitinglist; and moves the remaining Tasks up one place. Tasks located in places 2 through 6 are moved into places 1 through 5 of the Waitinglist, and Dummy Task is entered into place 6.

The T4RUPT and downlink output functions are Auxiliary Functions as defined in paragraphs 15-104 and 15-112. The T4RUPT functions listed below are executed by program sections T4RUPT Output Control and Modeswitching And Mark:



- a. Transfer Next Word to DSKY's.
- b. Drive IMU CDU's.
- c. Drive Optics CDU's.
- d. Collect Current IMU and Optics Mode Bits.
- e. Check IMU Mode.
- f. Check Optics Mode.
- g. Scan IMU FAIL, PIPA FAIL, and CDU FAIL Bits and Display Failures.
- h. Check Downlink Operation for a Rate that is too Slow.

The downlink functions mentioned below are executed by program section DOWNRUPT Processor:

- i. Check Downlink Operation for a Rate that is too Fast.
- j. Provide the Next Word for Downlink Transmission.
