## PREFACE

THIS DOCUMENT IS DESIGNED TO SUPPORT THE CREW SYSTEMS FAMILIARIZATION COURSES 30815.

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## SECTION ONE

## CONTROLS AND DISPLAYS

### 1.1 Introduction and Description

The LEM, with its many subsystems, is a manned vehicle, designed to support two astronauts from lunar orbit until the rendezvous with the CSM when the lunar stay is completed. Since the LEM is manned, the crew must be furnished data relative to the status of the subsystems, be warned of malfunctions, be provided with guidance and navigational readouts, and once supplied this information, be able to take the required action.

Many considerations and principals went into the layout and design of the controls and displays. Controls and displays relating to a particular function are generally grouped together. Thought was given to the 0 and $1 / 6$ "G" environments to be encountered, as well as to space suit limitations. As details are discussed in more depth, the philosophy of design and placement will be better understood.

Displays may be described as devices used to exhibit information. Several types are used in the LEM. The exact purpose for each will be covered in detail. Most of the LEM displays are lights, however, certain specially designed devices are used and will be described in detail later in this Study Guide.

Controls are selected to suit their function. For instance, a common toggled switch may be found in various configurations. There are two and three position toggles. Each position may be a "Maintain" (MAIN), in which the toggle will stay in the position selected, a "Momentary" (MOM) where the lever is spring loaded to return to its original position, or a "LOCK", where a mechanical restraint must be released in order to move the lever. Also, specially designed devices are used to control specific functions, as will be seen later.

### 1.2 Alpha Numeric Designators

Every display and control is assigned an alpha numeric designator. These will indicate the related subsystem, the type of device, and a sequentially assigned number.

### 1.4.1 Caution and Warning

In order that the astronauts may be made aware of an out-of-tolerance condition in any LFM subsystem without the necessity for continuous monitoring of meters, the Caution and Warning Electronics Assembly (CWEA) was designed. The CTEA is itself a part of the Instrumentation subsystem, but monitors all LEM subsystems and will register an indication to the astronauts if certain limits are exceeded.

Failures or malfunctions are placed in one of two categories:
Warning -- malfunctions which require immediate corrective action and affect crew safety.

Caution -- generally will indicate the occurence of one of several malfunctions in a given subsystem which will not require immediate repair or immediately affect crew safety.

Caution and Warning indications are made by three methods. For either a caution or warning situation a 3000 cps tone is heard on each astronaut's headset and both Master Alarm Lights ( $6 \mathrm{~S} 2-6 \mathrm{~S} 3$ ) are activated. These lights are mounted in a capsule which can be pushed to trigger a switch. Either of these switches, being pushed, will deactivate the tone and light for both astronauts. In addition to the tone and master alarm lights, an individual caution or warning indicator is lighted to denote the area of malfunction. This light remains on until the situation activating its circuit is corrected: at which time it is extinguished. The Warning Indicators (6DSI-6DS2O) are mounted on Panel I and the Caution Indicators (6D21-6DS40) are mounted on Panel II.

## CAUTION AND WARNING DISPLAYS



The (ASC PRESS) warning light is illuminated if either: (1) the pressure in either of two ascent helium tanks falls below 3000 psia prior to staging; or (2) if the blanket pressure in the fuel or oxidizer lines at the bi-propellant valves of the ascent stage decays below 120 psia. If illuminated by a low helium pressure, this light is extinguished by a signal from a deadface switch resulting from separation of the descent and ascent stages; if illuminated by low fuel or oxidizer pressure the light is extinguished only by restoration of pressure.

6-DS-3 HI/LOW HELIUM REG OUTLET PRESS WARNING LIGHT
The (DES REG) warning light is illuminated if the pressure within the descent helium lines downstream of the regulators rises above 260 psia or falls below 220 psia. The light is extinguished when nominal pressures are restored or staging is accomplished (deadface switch). This signal will be enabled by a delayed DES ENG "ON" command.

6-DS-4 DESCENT PROPELLANT LOW QUANTITY WARNING LIGHT
The (DES QTY) warning light is illuminated if, prior to staging, the fuel or oxidizer in the descent tanks falls below a quantity such that approximately 10 seconds of burning time remains. This low level signal is enabled only if a descent engine "ON" command is present.

6-DS-6 CONTROL ELECTRONICS SECTION AC VOLTAGE FAILURE WARNING LIGHT
The (CES AC) warning light is illuminated if the AC voltage (single phase 28 V 800 cps or three phase 26 V 800 cps ) in the Control Electronics Section of the STAB/CONT subsystem is out of tolerance. The light is extinguished when the Gyro Test Control switch (11-S-1) is actuated to either the POS RT or NEG RT position.

6-DS-7 CONTROL ELECTRONICS SECTION DC VOLTAGE FAILURE WARNING LIGHT
The (CES DC) warning light is illuminated if the $D C$ voltage of one or more of the DC power supplied $(+15 \mathrm{~V},-15 \mathrm{~V},+4.3 \mathrm{~V}$ $+6 \mathrm{~V},-6 \mathrm{~V}$ ) in the Control Electronics Section of the STAB/CONT subsystem is out of tolerance. The light is extinguished when ll-S-1 is actuated to either the POS RT or NEG RT position.

The (AGS) Warning Light is illuminated if: (1) a failure is sensed in any of the following AGS power supplies +28 V , +12 V , or 28 V 400 cps , or (2) if a fail signal is generated by the AEA test assembly. The signals to illuminate this light are inhibited if the AGS Status Switch $(12-S-7)$ is in the OFF position.

6-DS-9 LGC POWER FAILURE WARNING LIGHT
The (IGC) Warning Light is illuminated if a failure occurs in the IGC in: (1) the power supplies $(+28 \mathrm{~V},+13 \mathrm{~V}$ or $+3 \mathrm{~V})$, or (2) the counter or (3) the scaler. The light is extinguished by either: (1) restoration of nominal voltage, or (2) placing the Guidance Control Switch (9-S-6) to the AGS position.

## 6-DS-10 INERTIAL SUBSYSTEM FAILURE WARNING IIGHT

The (ISS) Warning Light is illuminated if a failue of any of the following occurs: the 3.2 KC power supply, the 800 cps $5 \%$ supply, the PIPA during main engine thrusting or the CDU. The light is extinguished by placing $9-S-6$ to the AGS position.

6-DS-11 RCS TCA WARNING LIGHT
The (RCS TCA) Warning Light is illuminated if there is a primary coil command to fire a specific thruster, but no chamber pressure at that thruster. Additionally, a failure such that opposing co-linear jets are on simultaneously, illuminates the light. The light is extinguished when the isolation valve associated with the failed TCA is closed.

6-DS-12 RCS "A" REGULATOR FAILURE WTARNING LIGHT
6-DS-13 RCS "B" REGULATOR FAILURE WARNING LIGHT
The (RCS "A" REG) Warning Light is illuminated if the pressure in the helium line of the pressurized RCS System "A" rises above 205 psia or falls below 165 psia. The light is extinguished when the nominal pressure is restored or if both helium regulator solenoid valves of System "A" (as operated by the System "A" Regulators \#1 and \#2 (8-S-2 and 8-S-3)) are closed. The (RCS "B" REG) Warning Light for System "B" is illuminated and extinguished in an identical manner as the (RCS "A" REG) Warning Light.

The (DC BUS) Warning Light is illuminated if a low voltage condition ( $\langle 26.5 \mathrm{~V}$ ) occurs on either the Commander's or the Systems Engineer's DC electrical bus. The light is extinguished by restoration of a nominal voltage condition.

6-DS-16 CABIN LOW PRESSURE WARNING LIGHT
The (CABIN) Warning Light is illuminated if the cabin pressure falls below 4.6 psia. The light is extinguished when cabin pressure is restored to a level greater than 4.8 psia. This indicator will not operate during periods of intentional cabin depressurization (i.e., when the EGRESS position is selected on the Atmosphere Revitalization Section Pressure Regulator Valves ( $7-\mathrm{H}-1$ and $7-\mathrm{H}-2$ ), or if the Cabin Repressurization Valve ( $7-\mathrm{H}-3$ ) is manually placed in the OPEN position.

6-DS-17 SUIT/FAN LOW PRESSURE WARNING LIGHT
The (SUIT/FAN) Warning light is illuminated if either: (1) the pressure within the suit falls below 3.12 psia or (2) if the \#2 suit circulating fan fails. If illuminated by low suit pressure, it is extinguished by restoration of a nominal pressure. If illuminated because of \#2 fan failure, the light is extinguished by deactivation of the Suit Fan $\_$P Control Circuit Breaker (4-CB-120).

6-DS-21 HIGH He REG OUTLET PRESS CAUTION LIGHT
The (ASC HI REG) Caution Light is illuminated if the helium pressure downstream of the regulators in the ascent helium lines is greater than 220 psia. The light is extinguished wher pressure is reduced to a nominal value.

6-DS-22 ASCENT PROPELLANT LOW QUANTITY CAUTION LIGHT
The (ASC QTY) Caution Light is illuminated if the level of ascent fuel or oxidizer in the ascent tanks reaches a value such that approximately 10 seconds burning time remains. The signal is intended to permit the crew to manually shut down the ascent engine to avoid possible explosive effects resulting from depletion of either fuel or oxidizer before the other, and to indicate that ascent engine thrusting is not available for midcourse correction or rendezvous braking. These low level signals are enabled only if the ascent engine is on.

The (ENG GIMBAL) Caution Light is illuminated if a difference between the gimbal drive signal and gimbal response from the $Y$ or $Z$-axis trim function is sensed. This signal is enabled only if the Descent Engine is armed. Additionally, the signal is disabled following staging (deadface switch).

6-DS-24 DESCENT PROPUISION BURST DISC FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (BURST DISC) Caution Iight is illuminated if the burst disc at the descent propulsion helium tank is ruptured. The light is extinguished by separation of the descent stage (deadface switch). This malfunction indication applies only if a supercritical helium pressurization scheme is adopted.

6-DS-25 PGNS FAILURE CAUTION IIGHT
The (PGNS) Caution Light is illuminated if any of the following conditions is sensed: (l) middle roll gimbal angle is greater than $\pm 60^{\circ}$; (2) deviations in IMU temperature are greater that $\pm 5^{\circ}$ from normal; (3) and "AND" of RNDZ RADAR OPERATE and RADAR CDU FAIL; (4) the "AND" of RNDZ RADAR TRACK ENABLE and DATA NOT GOOD; (5) the "AND" of LDG RADAR DATA NOT GOOD and the landing radar antenna in the DESCENT or HOVER position; (6) a DATA GOOD signal with an ambiguous antenna position signal; (7) failure of some program check; (8) restart; (9) PIPA failure during periods when not thrusting. The light is extinguished either by selecting the AGS position on $9-S-6$ by actuating the DSKY RESET pushbutton.

6-DS-26 INVERTER FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (INVERTER) Caution Light is illuminated either: (1) if the AC bus voltage is <ll2V or (2) if the AC bus frequency is <398 cps or $>402 \mathrm{cps}$. The light is extinguished when within-tolerance conditions are restored, or if the AC Power Control Switch (4-S-14) is turned off.

6-DS-27 BATTERY FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (BATTERY) Caution Light is illuminated if an overcurrent, reverse-current, or over-temperature condition occurs in any of the four descent or two ascent batteries. The light is extinguished when nominal conditions are restored or if the affected battery is turned off.

6-DS-28 RENDEZVOUS RADAR DATA FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (RNDZ RDR) Caution Light is illuminated if a rendezvous radar data-not-good condition occurs. The light is extinguished when a "Data Good" condition is restored, or if the rendezvous radar is turned off. This signal is enabled only if the Rendezvous Radar mode switch (17-S-3) is in the AUTO TRACK position.

The (IDG RDR) Caution Light is illuminated if: (l) the landing Radar Range Data is not good, or (2) if the velocity data is not good. This light is not enabled until both range and velocity "data good" signals have been achieved. The light is extinguished when a "data good" condition is restored, or if the landing radar is turned off.

6-DS-30 PRE AMPS POWER FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (PRE AMPS) Caution Light is illuminated by an out-oltolerance condition in either of two parallel redundant -4.7 V regulated supplies which power the RCS jet pre-amplifiers. This light is extinguished either by the stage deadface switch or by actuation of the Abort pushbutton (1-S-13).

6-DS-32 RCS FAILURE CAUTION IIGHT
The (RCS) Caution Light is illuminated if: (l) out-oftolerance ratios of fuel and oxidizer quantities remain in the tanks of either RCS System "A" or "B", or (2) if the pressure of the helium tank in either RCS system drops below 1700 psia. If illuminated by an out-of-tolerance Oxidizer/Fuel ratio, the light is extinguished by selecting the momentary ON position of the QTY TEST switch ( $8-S-6$ ). If illuminated by a low helium pressure condition, the light is exti nguished by selecting the He position of the RCS Temp/Press Monitor Switch (8-S-19).

6-DS-33 HEATER FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (HEATER) Caution Light is illuminated by an out-oftolerance temperature condition in: (1) any of the four RCS thruster quads, or (2) the S-band antenna assembly, (3) the rendezvous radar antenna assembly, (4) landing radar antenna assembly. The light is extinguished by positioning the Temperature Monitor switch (18-S-10) to the affected heater assembly position.

6-DS-34 C/W REG POWER FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT
The (C/W PWR) Caution Iight is illuminated if any one or more of the following regulated power supplies fail: +9 V , $+23 \mathrm{~V},+4 \mathrm{~V},-3 \mathrm{~V},-2 \mathrm{~V},+2.3 \mathrm{~V}$. The light is extinguished only by restoration of nominal power to the CWEA. Unlike the other C/W lights, this light is undimmable.

The (ECS) caution light is illuminated by any of the following malfunctions: glycol pump failure; $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ partial pressure greater than 7.6 mm of mercury; water separator failure; or suit fan \#l failure. The light is extinguished by correction of the malfunction which illuminated it as follows: restoration of glycol pump pressure as.a result of selecting \#2 pump or selecting the EMER position if \#2 has failed; or restoration of nominal $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ partial pressure level; or restoration of nominal water sẽparator speed; or selection of the \#2 suit fan.

## 6-DS-37 OXYGEN QUANTITY CAUTION LIGHT

The ( $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ QTY) caution light is illuminated if a low quantity condition $\mathrm{K}<135$ psia) occurs in the descent oxygen tank, or if a less than fullquantity condition ( $<684 \mathrm{psia}$ ) occurs in either ascent oxygen tank, or if a low quantity condition ( $<95$ psia) occurs in ascent tank \#l. The light is extinguished by momentarily positioning the $\mathrm{O}_{2} / \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{O}$ QTY MON switch ( $7-\mathrm{S}-2$ ) to the $\mathrm{C} / \mathrm{W}$ RESET position. The descent tank low quantity signal and the ascent tanks less than full signals are inhibited following staging (deadface switch).

## 6-DS-38 GLYCOL FAILURE CAUTION LIGHT

The (GLYCOL) caution light is illuminated by either of two malfunctions: (l) low glycol quantity in the primary coolant loop; or (2) high glycol temperature in the primary loop as sensed at the glycol water evaporator outlet. Both signals are inhibited following selection of the SEC position of the Glycol Pump switch (7-S-3). If illuminated by the high temperature condition, restoration of the temperature to a nominal level also extinguishes the light.

6-DS-39 WATER QUANTITY CAUTION LIGHT
The (WATER QTY) caution light is illuminated if the quantity remaining in the descent water tank falls below $10 \%$, or if a less than full condition occurs in either ascent water tank, or if unequal levels occur in either of these ascent tanks. The light is extinguished by momentarily positioning 7-S-2 to the C/W RESET position. The descent tank low level signal and the ascent tanks less than full signals are inhibited following staging (deadface switch).

LEM Flag Indicators are of the "Leaf Spring Positioning Concept" (LSPC) type. The major consideration leading to the design of the ISPC was an operational requirement specifying that the off flag must return to the viewing window in case of a complete power failure. This requirement necessitated the use of a spring strong enough to return the appropriate off flag to a neutral position, and hold it stable in this position under all environmental conditions with no power to the device. The ISPC device draws no power in an off position mode. The center flag will appear in the viewing aperture with no signal to the device. Cantilevered leap springs acting against a rectangular positioning block, positively retain the flag dial assembly in position. A signal from the electronic circuit sends current to the torquer coil, driving the dial against the stop and exposing the flag. Upon removal of the signal, the flag will return to the center position.

For the three-position device, two inputs to the electronics assembly are used. With an input at "A" and "B", the flag is driven against the lower stop. With inputs at "A" and "B", the flag is driven against the upper stop. The two-position device operates on the same principle as the three-position device except that current flows in only one direction through the circuit, and the dial moves only to expose a second flag.


FLAG INDICATORS

The "Servometric" concept employs the closed-loop rebalance principle to position a pointer in accordance with an input signal, as shown. An output from a feedback transducer mounted on the pointer is compared with the input signal. The resulting error signal is amplified and utilized to drive the pointer (and transducer) to the correct position by means of a simple, direct-drive D'Arsonval type of torquer. The simplicity, low power, and low weight of meter movements are achieved without their open loop operation, poor dynamic stability under vibration and acceleration, and cumbersome vibration isolation. The concept also provides the fast response, high accuracy, stability, mechanical ruggedness, and closed loop operation associated with servoed displays but without their bulk, weight, and mechanical complexity.

The "Servometric" concept requires one moving clement -the torquer. This electromechanical element must move a pointer for display indication, operate from a DC input signal, and have an accurate position feedback element. The type of concept selected was the permanent magnet DC torquer. These devices are somewhat similar in appearance to a D'Arsonval meter movement but their characteristics and construction are different in that the mechanism parameters are chosen to be compatible with the associated rebalance potentiometers. Power to the moving element is brought in through flexible metal ribbons and no burshes or slip rings are required.

One torquer is required for each channel displayed (a dual indicating instrument requires two torquers). Two basic torquers are required in the four different LEM displays. They are the 250 degree torquer and the 50 degree torquer. Both torquers operate on the same concept, but are constructed differently for the specific packages and dial displays.

The $250^{\circ}$ torquer is so named because it has an active rotational capability of $250^{\circ}$. It is designed to be packaged in a standard two-inch round display. The torquer uses the concept of an internal magnet, a center pole piece, and an external pole piece. The permanent magnet is charged with north and south polarity which is conducted into the pole pieces, which are made of high-permeability soft iron. The center pole is in contact with the north pole of the magnet. It distributes the lines of flux throughout the $250^{\circ}$ air gap and acts like a unipole magnet of north polarity. The concept of design is based on maintaining a nearly constant level of flux density in all parts of the circuit.

The $50^{\circ}$ torquer is a mechanism designed for use in the vertical scale displays and the Cross-Pointer. The torquer is designed using a concept utilizing two magnets. The circuit concept is especially suited for small angles of travel and develops high torques. The torque is high because two air gaps are provided so that two legs of the coil are in the magnetic field. The magnets and iron pole pieces are all pie shaped to provide a magnetic field only in the arc of the coil swing.


The Thrust-to-Weight Ratio Indicator is an acceleration measuring device which will be mounted in the LEM instrument panel. The indicator will be read out by the pilot, the information to be used for monitoring descent engine performance during lunar orbit checkout and X-axis acceleration of the ship during lunar landing. A moving pointer travels along a fixed vertical scale to indicate the desired reading.

The Thrust-to-Weight indicator is only sensitive to acceleration inputs along its axis of mass motion. A mass in the unit is constrained to linear motion and supported longitudinally by a constant rate spiral spring. The inertia force of the mass is balanced by the spring force. The displacement of the mass is proportional to the inertia force, and hence to the input acceleration, under conditions of constant acceleration. Displacement of the mass is translated to pointer displacement, giving an output which is linearly proportional to input acceleration.

The pointer assembly consists of an aluminun pointer which is epoxied to a plastic sliding block. The block slides in a track which is machined in the me chanism frame and which constrains the pointer assembly, except in the direction motion. A hairpin-type spring is epoxied to the pointer. The spring ends serve as attach points for the pointer cord, and thermal contraction of the cord is compensated for by deflection of the spring. Pulley bearing loads are thus kept at very low levels and friction is minimized.

The Range/Range Rate Indicator displays range and range rate by means of vertically moving tapes, reading against a fixed reference marker. Digital coding on the back of the display tapes is read by means of sensors, and in effect, the display tape and readhead comprise a digital encoder.

Driving the tapes are stepper motors, controlled by the integral electronics. The integral electronics comprised mainly of microelectronic integrated circuits, for a special purpose digital computer, capable of recognizing which of the many inputs is being received by the indicator and comparing the input data against the tape feedback and generating an error word to operate the stepper motor.

Each tape drive consists of a stepper motor driving wrap-up spool to which the tape is affixed at one end. The other end of the tape is attached to another spool connected to the motor driven wrap-up spool by a constant tension spring gear. The utilization of a constant tension spring provides a tape tension that is relatively constant irrespective of the varying wrap-up diameters on the tape spools. Bearing mounted flanged rollers are used to guide the path of the tapes across the sensors.


### 1.4.6 Flight Director Attitude Indicator

In order that the astronauts may monitor the LEM attitude with respect to a given reference axis, some form of attitude display is required. A system of servo-motors, servo-amplifiers, and synchroresolvers has been designed to display the IEM attitude on a panel mounted device. This device is the Flight Director Attitude Indicator (FDAI). Its primary display is a sphere, mounted to gimbal about three orthogonal axes and oriented so as to never present its gimbal points to an observer.

In addition to indicating the attitude of the LEM, the FDAT incorporates six meters to indicate rate and error of roll, pitch, and yaw. The RATE indicators meter the rate of change of angular position and the ERROR needles indicate the deviation between the programmed and the actual attitude. The error needles can also be used to monitor the rendezvous radar antenna position with respect to the LEM axes.

Between the sensing servos on the stable platform and the FDAI ball itself is a complex system of electronic and mechanical components. This unit, the Gimbal Angle Sequence Transformation Assembly (GASTA), was designed to operate in conjunction with the FDAI and to modify its input signals to the required configuration. This circuitry is necessary to transform the angular position of the stable platform gimbals to signals of the proper configuration to operate the FDAI ball properly. It is to be noted that the outer gimbal of the stable platform allows rotation about the X-axis, while the outer gimbal of the FDAI ball allows rotation of the ball about the Z-axis. A similar difference exists with the middle gimbals, which allow stable platform rotation about the Z-axis and ball rotation about the X-axis. The inner gimbals of both allow rotation about the same axis. The GASTA is also a signal conditioner which takes $26 \mathrm{~V}, 800 \mathrm{cps}$ signals from the Inertial Measuring Unit (IMU) of the Primary Guidance and Navigation System (PGNS) and converts them to $15 \mathrm{~V}, 800 \mathrm{cps}$ signals.

Signals may reach the attitude indicator from the two possible sources. The primary source is the IMU (stable platform) and the secondary source is the Abort Guidance System (AGS). The primary signals must be routed through the GASTA: but since the AGS has its own GASTA Function Unit, its signals are sent directly to the FDAI.

The RATE meters are fed from the Stabilization and Control (S\&C) rate gyros in either mode of operation. Inputs to the ERROR meters (when metering computer/attitude error) are from either PGNS or AGS, depending on the mode selected. The Rendezvous Radar (RR) shaft angle is fed to the PITCH ERROR needle and the RR trunnion angle is fed to the YAW ERROR needle (when metering RR).

### 1.5.1 Thrust/Translation Controller

The translation controller is functionally an integrated translation and thrust controller used by the astronaut to command vehicle translations by the reaction jets and to throttle the descent engine between $10 \%$ and $100 \%$ maximum thrust magnitude. Physically, it is a three-axis, tee-handle, left-hand controller mounted with its longitudinal axis approximately $28^{\circ}$ from a line parallel to the vehicle Z-axis. Two controllers are installerd in the LEM, one available for each astronaut.

Due to the controller's mounting position, vehicle translations correspond approximately to astronaut hand motions. Motion of the controller to the left or right will command translations along the $Y$-axis, and movement of the cortroller forward or backward will result in translations along the Z-axis. To afford the integrated thrust/translation control capability, a manually operated two-position lever is located on the controller. Controller up or down motion will command translations along the $X$-axis when the lever is set to the JETS position. With the lever in the THROTTLE position, up or down motion results in varying the thrust magnitude of the descent engine. Regardless of lever setting, the controller has translation command capability along the Y and Z axes.

A pair of detent switches are located about each controller axis and a transducer is positioned along the longitudinal axis. The detent switches provide a discrete signal to the IGC when the astronaut moves the controller out of its neutral or detent position. The discrete signal commands the computer to issue translational change commands in accordance with the controller motion. The transducer provides an electrical output proportional to controller displacement when the lever is at the THROTTIE position. These signals are routed to the descent engine throttle servo to command proportional thrust magnitude control.


TRANSLATION CONTROLLER


Vehicle attitude changes can be commanded manually by the use of either one of the two three-axis, pistol-grip, righthand attitude controllers. One attitude controller is used by each astronaut. The attitude controller is installed with its longitudinal axis approximately parallel to the LEM X-axis so that vehicle rotations will correspon to astronaut hand movements. Clockwise or counterclockwise rotation of the controller about its longitudinal axis will command vehicle yaw left or yaw right rotation about the X-axis. Forward or backward movement of the controller will command vehicle pitch-down or pitch-up rotation about the Y-axis. Movement of the controller to the left or right will command a roll-left or a roll-right rotation about the Z-axics.

A position transducer, a pair of detent switches, and a pair of limit switches are located about each controller axis. The transducer provides an electrical output proportional to controller displacements and is used to command proportional vehicle angular rates. The detent switches provide a discrete signal to the LGC when the astronaut moves the controller out of its neutral or detent position. The discrete signal informs the computer to issue attitude change commands to the RCS via driver electronics in accordance with the controller displacement. Additional switches are used with the ATCA to command direct or pulsed reaction jet firing while the controller is displaced off center. The limit switches at the "hardover" position are hardwired to the secondary RCS jet solenoids and enable the astronaut to fire the reaction jets directly, regardless of flight control mode or controlling system.

Mounted on the front of the attitude controller handle is a push button. This is the push-to-talk (PTT) switch for the astronaut's audio system.

### 1.5.3 ECS Manual Controls

The Environmental Control Subsystem (ECS) has a bank of manual valve and regulator controls located on a unit in the rear section of the crew compartment on the System Engineer's side.

These controls (OPEN - NORM - EGRESS - CLOSE), in OPEN position, permit unregulated flow of oxygen into the suit circuit. The NORM position regulates oxygen flow into the suit circuit to maintain a pressure of $5.0 \pm .2$ psia. This mode is selected during normal pressurezed cabin operations. The EGRESS position regulates oxygen flow into the suit circuit to maintain a pressure of $3.7 \pm .2$ psia. This mode is selected during lunar egress operations and at any other time the cabin is unpressurized. The CLOSE position prevents oxygen flow to the suit circuit. The CIOSE position is selected only when one of the regulator valves fail open. The OPEN position is selected if both the normal or egress automatic regulators have failed to supply oxygen to the suit circuit.

This valve (OPEN -AUTO - CLOSE), in the OPEN position, permits direct, unregulated flow of oxygen into the cabin from the oxygen manifold. The AUTO position enables the valve to respond to inputs from the cabin pressure sensor. The valve fully opens whenever cabin pressure drops past 4.6 psia, and closes as cabin pressure rises past 4.8 psia. If both $7-\mathrm{H}-1$ and $7-\mathrm{H}-2$ are in any position other than NORM or EGRESS, the automatic mode of 7-H-3 is disabled. The CLOSE position mode of $7-\mathrm{H}-3$ is disabled. The CLOSE position prevents oxygen flow into the cabin from the oxygen manifold.

This valve (OPEN-CLOSE), in the OPEN position, permits flow of oxygen to the primary oxygen storage tark in the PLSS. The CLOSE position prevents flow of oxygen to the PISS oxygen storage tank.

These valves (OPEN-CLOSE), in the OPEN position, permit flow of oxygen from their respective oxygen tank to the oxygen manifold. The CLOSE position prevents flow of oxygen. In order for the ascent oxygen valves to be placed in the OPEN position, the descent oxygen valve must be placed in the CLOSE position. A mechanical interlock is in the system to prevent ascent oxygen from flowing to the empty descent oxygen tank. In the event that the Descent $O_{2}$ valve will not close, an override of the mechanical interlock is provided so that the Ascent $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ valve can be opened.

These controls (FACEPEATE OPEN - SUIT DISCONNECT FACEPLATE CLOSE) are located at the junction of the suit umbilical and the ARS and are rotatable collars with three positions. They are operated in conjunction with a suit $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ flow control mounted directly on the suit which will be referred to as the Body Flow Valve. In the FACEPLATE CLOSE position the Body Flow Valve will be in the open position, thus permitting half of the suit oxygen flow to pass directly into the body of the space suit at the waist and half of the flow to pass to the helmet and down over the astronaut's body surface and into ducts at the four suit extremities. From here, the oxygen will flow through the extremity ducts to the exhaust umbilical.

NOTE: When operating from the PLSS, the Body Flow Valve on the suit will be in the CLOSE position, thus allowing the PLSS flow to pass entirely to the helmet and then similarly as above. There will be no oxygen flow directly into the waist as before.

NOTE: When operating from the PLSS, the Body Flow Valve on the suit will be in the CLOSE position, thus allowing the PLSS flow to pass entirely to the helmet and then similarly as above. There will be no oxygen flow directly into the waist as before.

The SUIT DISCONNECT position will prevent suit circuit oxygen flow to the space suit at the connector and the flow will bypass the suit and flow directly to he downstream portion of the suit circuit. In the FACEPLATE OPEN position the Body Flow Valve will be in the CLOSE position. The suit circuit gas flow will pass through the four extremity ducts and out into the space suit. The gas will then flow over the astronaut's body surface and out the faceplate into the cabin. 7-H-6 controls flow through the CDR's suit and 7-H-7 controls flow through the SE's suit.

This control (PUSH: OPEN - PULL: CLOSE), in the PUSH:OPEN position, permits the gas flow in the suit circuit to pass into the cabin. This is done during open-face plate operation so that the suit circuit will provide sufficient air flow to maintain the oxygen level of the cabin within limits. This valve has provision for automatic closure by a signal from the cabin pressure sensor whenever cabin pressure drops below 4.6 psia. This valve will also close automatically whenever $7-\mathrm{H}-1$ and $7-\mathrm{H}-2$ are in the EGRESS position. In the PULL:CLOSE position the gas flow in the suit circuit is prevented from passing into the cabin.

This control (OPEN - AUTO - CLOSE) prevents the over pressurization of the suit circuit and the spaœ suit. The AUTO position permits the valve to be operated by an aneroid device in response to suit circuit pressure. The valve is fully open with a suit pressure of 4.4 psia or greater, and fully closed whenever the suit pressure is less than 4.1 psia. The OPEN position manually overrides the automatic mode to open the valve fully. The CLOSE position manually overrides the automatic mode to close the valve fully.

This control (PUSH: SEP 1 - PULL: SEP 2) permits the selection of either of two water separators which separates the condensed moisture in the gas and vents this water to the primary water boiler. The PUSH: SEP 1 position selects the \#1 separator and the PULL: SEP 2 position selects the \#2 separator.

These controls (CLOSE - AUTO - DUMP) provide the dual function of cabin depressurization and cabin pressure relief. There is one control on each LEM hatch. The normal position for this control is the AUTO position, which allows the valve to act as a pressure relief device. An aneroid sensor within the valve causes the valve to open at a pressure of 5.8 psia or greater, thus bleeding off excess cabin pressure. The CLOSE position permits manual override of the automatic position and serves to close and lock the relief valve so that no gas escape is possible in the event of failure of the automatic feature. The DUMP position also overrides the AUTO position and permits the crew to dump the cabin pressure. A squeeze trigger on the Dump Valve Control handle must be depressed to unlock the control handle before it can be moved to another

position. This same dump valve, also has a twoposition control handle on the outside of the hatch. This outside handle has the legend, PULL TO DUMP and is spring loaded to close. Pulling and holding the handle out for approximately 90 sec . will dump the LEM cabin pressure. This "out" position of the outside hardle is comparable to the DUMP position of the inside handle. The spring loaded "in" position of the outside handle is comparable to the AUTO position of the inside handle.

This control (MAX HEAT - NORMAL - MAX COOL) is used to regulate cabin temperature through adjustment of the temperature of the glycol supplied to the cabin heat exchanger. In the NORMAL position the temperature of the glycol is automatically adjusted to maintain a cabin gas temperature of $70 \pm 5^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. Should cabin temperature exceed these limits or should a lower or higher temperature be desired, movement of the control in either the MAX COOL (clockwise) or MAX HEAT (counterclockwise) direction will automatically divert glycol of higher or lower temperature respectively into the coolant flow by changing the set point for regulation.

This control (OPEN - CLOSE) is used to control water flow for drinking and food preparation. The OPEN position supplies water to the water hose and the CLOSE position prevents water flow to the water hose.

This control (DES - ASC - EMER) in the DES position selects the descent water tank to provide water for the primary water boilers, and for the PLSS and DRINK WATER VALVES for the period between manning and pre-lunar ascent. Upon manning, the primary water feed valve is opened allowing water from the descent tank to flow to the primary water boilers. The ASC position selects both ascent water tanks to provide water to primary boilers and water valves. To place $7-\mathrm{H}-14$ in the EMER position a safety trigger near the handle must be manually tripped. This position: (1) prevents all water flow from water tanks to the primary water boilers, and water valves (2) diverts all water from the water separators to the emergency water glycol boilers and (3) ruptures the water isolation valve disc, thus providing an accumulator action for the emergency coolant system loop.

This control (OPEN - CLOSE) provides an emergency means of cooling the suit circuit. In the OPEN position this valve allows water to flow to the emergency suit water boiler. The CLOSE position prevents flow of water to the boiler and is the normal position for this valve.

This control (OPEN - AUTO - CLOSE) provides for the return of cabin gas back into the suit circuit under normal operations or provides suit circuit integrity under rapid cabin decompression. In the OPEN position cabin gas is fed back into the suit circuit for revitalization. The AUTO position allows gas flow into, but not out of, the suit circuit. This is accomplished through the use of a one way check valve. The CLOSE position provides an override of the one way check valve, thus insuring suit circuit integrity during unpressurized cabin operations.

This control (OPEN - CLOSE) provides a flow of water to the emergency glycol water boiler to maintain temperature limits for the emergency glycol loop. The OPEN position permits full water flow to the boiler. The CLOSE position prevents water flow to the emergency glycol water boiler and is the normal position for this valve.

This control (PRIMARY - SECONDARY), in the PRIMARY position, allows the suit circuit gas to be filtered through the primary LiOH canister thereby removing $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ and noxious gases from the suit circuit gas. Selecting the SECONDARY position permits the suit circuit gas to be filtered through the secondary LiOH canister while changing the primary canister.

This control (DECREASE - INCREASE) permits the regulation of suit circuit temperature by varying the temperature of glycol through the heat exchanger. When the handle is turned in the INCREASE direction (clockwise), glycol of higher temperature is diverted to the suit regenerative heat exchanger in order
. to increase suit circuit gas temperature. Turning the handle in the DECREASE direction (counterclockwise) diverts glycol of a lower temperature to the suit regenerative heat exchanger in order to decrease suit eircuit gas temperature.

These pushbuttons (PUSH - TO VENT) are associated with the primary and secondary LiOH canisters respectively. When the button is depressed the gas within a canister is vented thus diminishing the internal pressure within the canister and facilitating removal of the canister from the suit circuit. Note: $7-H-19$ must be placed to the opposite canister. position from the one which is to be replaced before the push-to-vent pushbuttons should be actuated.

This control permits the flow of water from the water manifold to the primary water boiler. When the LFM is first manned, the valve is placed in the OPEN position, thus permitting water feed to the primary water boiler. Placing the valve in the CLOSE position will shut off the flow of water to the primary water boiler.

This control (OPEN - CLOSE) supplies water for PLSS recharging directly at unregulated descent water tank pressure. The OPEN position supplies water to the hose and the CLOSE position prevents water flow to the hose.

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The Alignment Optical Telescope (AOT) is a unity power 60 degrees field-of-view optical instrument similar to a periscope. The AOT is operated manually by the astronauts with mark commands initiated by the astronauts while viewing stars through the AOT. The AOT line-of-sight may be rotated to one of three viewing positions with a fourth position used for storage. The AOT is mounted in the forward part of the LEM with the shaft axis parallel to the LEM $X$ axis and the center of the field-of-view approximately $45^{\circ}$ above the $X$ axis and $60^{\circ}$ to either side of the $Z$ axis or on the $X Z$ plane. The purpose of the AOT is to provide angular data from star sightings for use in stable platform alignment via the LGC to a reference coordinate system.

Mounted to the right side of the AOT is the computer control and reticle dimmer assembly. Located on this control box is a thumbwheel which provides the astronaut the capability of adjusting the brightness of the AOT reticle light when taking a star sighting. The MARK-X and MARK-Y pushbuttons are also located on this assembly and are used by the astronaut to send discrete signals to the LGC when making star sightings for an IMU inflight alignment. A REJECT pushbutton is also available should an invalid mark discrete be sent to the IGC.

This lever moves the eyepiece toward or away from the eye of the observer.

Depression of this pushbutton sends a signal to the LGC indicating that the star is aligned on the X reticle position.

Depression of this pushbutton sends a signal to the IGC indicating that the last Mark signal was incorrect and no action is to be taken until a new Mark signal is received.

This continuous rotary (OFF-BRIGHT) controls the brightness of the AOT reticle.

This continuous rotary control associated with $3-\mathrm{M}-7$ rotates the AOT Reticle in order to measure the elevation angle of a star.

This six-position rotary switch (LR - L -$F-R-R R-C L)$ controls the rotating prism. The prism can be rotated to cover any of five $60^{\circ}$ sectors from left rear (LR), left (L), forward (F), right $(R)$ and right rear ( $R R$ ). In the CL position, the rotating prism is stowed under a protective cover.

This four-digit indicator displays, in degrees, the rotation of the Reticle Control Knob. The extreme right digit displays tenths of degrees.

1.6 Controls \& Displays Panel and Function Reference

### 1.6.1 Panel I - (Engine/Thrust Control)



## Function

This three-position toggle (ASC - OFF - DES) provides arming signals to the engines. The ASC position provides an arming signal enabling firing of the ascent engine while simultaneously signalling the LGC that the engine is armed. In the OFF position the arming signals are removed from the engine valves and the IGC. In the DES position the descent engine is armed and the IGC is notified that the engine is armed. However, regardless of the position of this switch, the appropriate engine will be armed if $1-S-13$ or 1-S-14 are actuated.

This two-position toggle (4 JETS - 2 JETS) selects the number of jets that will be utilized in X-axis translation maneuvers. This control can only be used with the AGS system.

This two-position toggle (ON-OFF) selects either balanced pairs of RCS jets in a couple or unbalanced X-axis RCS jets for use in maintaining pitch and roll attitude during the ascent engine thrust phase when the AGS is in the gui dance loop. This switch is normally in the ON position (balanced couples) during the initial phases of lunar ascent. This two-position flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates the open (GREY) or closed (BARBERPOLE) status of the latch-type solenoid-operated fuel and oxidizer ascent interconnect valves as controlled by $8-5-20$.

## Function

This four-way toggle (UP - RIGHT -DOWN - LEFT) slews the trunnion and/or shaft servos positioning the Rendezvous Radar antenna for manual acquisition of the target and subsequent automatic tracking. Two antenna slew rates are available through 17-S-2. Target acquisition is determined from $17-\mathrm{M}-1$ and AUTO TRACK is enabled through 17-S-3. The position of the Rendezvous Radar antenna (shaft and trunnion) can be determined from either the Commander's or Systems Engineer's FDAI (9-M-1 or 9-M-6) pitch and yaw error needles when the Rate/ Error Monitor switches (9-5-2 and 9-5-7) are positioned to RNDZ RADAR.

This two position toggle (HI-LO) provides two rates for manually slewing the Rendezvous Radar antenna. The HI slew rate is $9^{\circ} / \mathrm{sec}$, and the LO slew rate is $1 \% \mathrm{sec}$. The HI slew rate is used for quick, coarse adjustments to guide the antenna in the direction of the target. The LO slew rate is used for slow, fine adjustments to drive the antenna toward maximum signal strength as monitored on 17-M-1 thus enabling the subsequent initiation of auto track thro ugh 17-S-3.

This three-position rotary (AUTO TRACK - SLEN - LGC) enables control of the Rendezvous Radar antenna drive. In the AUTO TRACK position, track is maintained by comparing the received radar signals from the shaft and trunnion channels; the resultant error condition signals are used to drive the antenna servos thus maintaining track. the Rendezvous Radar antenna drive is controlled manually from $17-S-1$. In the LGC position the computer automatically drives the antenna towards the target. Once the target is acquired the Radar will automatically maintain track and the NoTrack component caution light (17-DS-1) will extinguish. The system is capable of maintaining automatic track only when 17-S-9 is in either the XPNDR or SKIN positions.

This three position toggle (AUTO - DES - HOVER) in the AUTO position enables the LGC to position the Ianding Radar antenna appropriate to a particular mission phase. Prior to the HOVER point the antenna is in the descent position. At HOVER, the antenna is positioned by the IGC to the HOVER position. The DES and HOVER positions provide an override of the antenna position drive signal in case of IGC/Antenna interface failure. The DES position is also used to reposition the antenna after testing.

This three position toggle (RNDZ - OFF - LDG) provides signals to the Rendezvous and Landing Radar's test circuitry. In the RNDZ position test circuitry is enabled and Rendezvous Radar performance is determined by monitoring $17-\mathrm{M}-1$, the Altitude/Range meter (9-M-9), and the XPointers ( $9-M-2$ and $9-M-3$ ) after the appropriate positioning of 17-S-8.

## Function

This six-position rotary (LDG RADAR PWR: ALT XMTR - VEL XMTR; RNDZ RADAR: AGC - XMTR PWR SHAFT ERR - TRUN ERR) selects either Landing or Rendezvous Radar test data or flight performance data for monitoring on meter $17-\mathrm{M}-1$. In the ALT XMTR position, the altitude transmitter power output is displayed on $17-M-1$ during testing and flight operations. In the VEL XMTR position, the velocity transmitter power output is displayed on 17-M-1 during testing and flight operations. In the AGC position, during testing, a specific value of receiver signal strength will be di splayed on 17-M-1; however, during flight operations the signal will vary. In the SHAFT ERR and/or TRUN ERR positions, during testing, angle error signals will be displayed as needle fluctuations with equal amplitude on $17-M-1$. During flight opera-
tions these error signals will be displayed as needle fluctuations which represent the smoothness of servo tracking, and will usually be unequal in amplitude.

This three-position toggle (XPNDR - SKIN - SURFACE) selects the operational tracking mode of the Rendezvous Radar. In the XPNDR position the radar interrogates the transponder, and the radar tracking error correction signals drive the antenna to maintain track. In the SKIN position the radar transmitter's signal is reflected by the target and the radar's tracking error correction signals drive the antenna to maintain track. In the SURFACE position the AUTO TRACK capability of the radar is disabled and the LGC or crew must continually drive the antenna (17-S-3 can be in either the LGC or SLEW position) to obtain

The illumination of this light indicates that the Rendezvous Radar has broken track (data-not-good) in any one of the three tracking modes.

The Signal Strength Meter displays Landing Radar and Rendezvous Radar data as selected by 17-S-8 for test and flight operations.

## Function

This three-position toggle (POS RT - OFF - NEG RT) enables a test signal to be applied to the rate gyro selected by ll-S-7. It is maintained in the OFF position and momentarily held in the other two. When this switch is held in the POS RT position, a $+5^{\circ} /$ sec attitude rate will be indicated on the appropriate arate needles of the Flight Director Attitude indicators ( $9-M-1$ and $9-M-6$ ). ## Function

These three Attitude Control Switches (MODE CONTPULSE - DIR) are used, normally only with the AGS, in conjunction with switch 11-S-6 to establish vehicle attitude control. All three switches will normally be placed in the MODE CONT position. In this position, vehicle attitude control about the appropriate axis is determined by ll-S-6. If the AGS has been selected on the Guidance Control switch (9-S-6) and if one of the three Attitude Control switches is in the PULSE or DIR position, attitude about that axis can only be controlled manually. If the PGNS has been selected on 9-S-6, the PULSE position is inoperative (attitude commands are generated by the IGC and vehicle attitude control is automatic), but the DIR position will permit ACA operation of reaction jets. When PULSE is selected, two jets in the appropriate axis are pulsed at a constant rate for as long as the attitude controller is displaced. When DIR is selected and the ACA's displaced, the two jets are activated continuously instead of being pulsed. When.11-S-6 is in the OFF position, only the DIR position is operative.

This three-position rotary (OFF - ATT HOLD - AUTO) affects the outputs of the Attitude Controllers the Translation Controllers and the Selected Guidance Computer. In the OFF position, the Attitude Controllers are only operative (1) in the "hardover" position and (2) when one or more of the Attitude Control switches is in the DIR position, which provides the crew with 2 -jet direct attitude control of that axis. The translation outputs of the $T / T C A$ and the computer attitude commands are also disabled when $11-S-6$ is in the OFF position, but the main

attitude commands are also disabled when $11-S-6$ is in the OFF position, but the main engine throttle command outputs are not affected. However, with this switch in the OFF position, main-engine off signals from the IGC and the AGS are not enabled and the main engines can only be turned off manually.

In the ATT HOLD position the crew can command an angular rate proportional to the displacement of the ACA. This mode is implemented to operate with either the PGNS or AGS. When the ACA is in the neutral position, the rate command goes to zero and the vehicle attitude will be held. In the ATT HOLD position, the RCS translation outputs of the T/TCA are enabled. When the Guidance Control switch is in the AGS position and the AUTO position is selected, attitude error signals are sent to the Control Electronics Section from the Abort Guidance Section. The resultant signals control the firing of the reaction jets through the selectable deadband. When the Guidance Control Switch is in the PGNS position, rate compensated steering errors are generated by the LGC and ON/OFF commands are fed to the jet drivers. In the AUTO position the RCS translation outputs of the T/TCA are enabled. The T/TCA throttle outputs and the ACA "hardover" outputs are unaffected. Attitude Controller proportional commands will normally be ineffective in this mode.

## Function

This three-position toggle (ROLL - PITCH - YAW) associated with ll-S-l, selects the rate gyro which is to be tested. The test output is displayed as described for switch 11-S-1.

These three-position toggles (AUTO - OFF - MAN) are used primarily during lunar stay to control temperature of the four RCS quads. In the AUTO position each heater will automatically maintain the temperature of its respective quad within the preset limits. If a malfunction occurs in the automatic control, the operator can select the MAN position, which will provide heat continuously to the quad; or the OFF position, which will turn off the heater. The temperature of a quad may be monitored by selecting the appropriate position of $18-S-10$ and reading the value displayed on $18-M-1$. If the temperature of any of the quads exceeds the range $40^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $180^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ the (HEATER) caution light will illuminate.

This seven-position rotary (RADAR: RNDZ - LDG; RCS: QUAD 1-QUAD 2 - QUAD 3 - QUAD 4; S-BAND) selects the rendezvous or landing radar antenna assembly, the RCS quads, or the S-band antenna assembly for temperature monitoring.

This indicator displays the temperature, in degrees Fahrenheit, of the radar antenna assemblies or RCS quads or S-band antenna assembly selected by switch 18-S-10.


## Function

This five-position rotary switch (DOCK-OFF; TRACKING: DIM-MEDIUM-BRIGHT) controls the docking and tracking lights. In the DOCK position the docking lights are turned on. In the DIM, MEDIUM and BRIGHT positions, the tracking light is turned on at $1 \%, 10 \%$, and $100 \%$ brightness respectively. The OFF position interrupts power to either docking or tracking lights. The LTA-1 panel configuration does not show a MEDIUM position.

This three-position toggle (ON - OFF - PARTIAL) turns on all the floodlights in the ON position. In the PARTIAL position, only the two overhead floodlights, fitted with reflectors (which can be rotated), are turned on. In the OFF position, all floodlights will be turned off. This two-position toggle (ON-OFF) provides ON/OFF control of the SE's side panel EL illumination. ## Function

This eight-position rotary (OFF - ALARM/TONE C/W 1 - ENG PB and C/W 2-C/W $3-\mathrm{C} / \mathrm{W} 4$ COMPNT - OFF) is used to perform the following test functions. In the ALARM/TONE position, it tests the lamps in the Master Alarm buttons ( $6-S-2$ and $6-S-3$ ) and the Audible Tone ( $6-T-1$ ). In the COMPNT position the lamps in the Component Caution lights and lunar contact lights are tested. OFF positions are located at each end of the switching sequence. This will permit the switch to be placed in an OFF position, without recycling through the test position.

1.6.4 Panel IV (Primary Guidance and Navigation Subsystem)

The Bottom Center Panel, (Panel IV) accessible to both crew members, is called the Display System and Keyboard (DSKY). The DSKY, a part of Guidance, Navigation, and Control, is used to exchange information between the crew members and the LFM Guidance Computer (LGC), The keyboard has 19 pushbuttons. These are used to program digital information into the computer. The 14 annunciator lights and the 6 digital displays provide the crew with answers from the LGC. Such information as Alignment Optical Telescope sightings, times, mode changes, etc., may be set into the LGC. It may provide the astronauts with times, angles temperatures, and will even show them when they have made an error.

## Function

This pushbutton provides a manual override capability for immediate firing of either the descent or ascent engine, depending upon the position of l-S-l. Once actuated, the engine fire command continues and the button is illuminated red. Activation of l-S-3 or l-S-4 interrupts the override function and extinguishes the light.

This pushbutton (1-S-3) sends a discrete stop signal to the descent and ascent engines independent of the position of 1-S-1. When actuated, the button remains depressed and is illuminated red. It is reset by depressing it a second time.

This switch enables the establishment of a vehicle rate of descent under PGNS authority. Each switch actuation provides a discrete pulse changing the rate of descent by 2 feet per second. This pushbutton is located at the Commander's station. When it is held in the depressed position it provides 4 jet translation in the +X direction by energizing the RCS secondary coils. Upon release of the button the signal is removed from the coils, terminating the jet firings.

## Function

This three-position toggle (RESET - UP - DOWN) is used to reset the Event Timer and select the direction in which the timer will count. A sixteen pushbutton (12-S-1 through 12-S-16) keyboard gives the Systems Engineer the capability of entering data into the AGS computer. The "OPERATOR ERROR" Light (12-DS-1) will light, should the crew member make a mistake. Mistakes recognized by the DEDA are such things as failure to push the "+" or "-" key before entering numerical data, or pressing too many pushbuttons before the data are entered. 1-S-4 - Engine Stop Switch (SE) - Same as l-S-3.

## Function

This three-position toggle (TANK 1 - BOTH TANK 2) selects the squib valves of either Ascent Helium Tank l or 2, or both, for firing by use of $2-5-4$.

## Function

This three-position toggle (ICS T/R - OFF - ICS RCV), in the ICS $T / R$ position, routes mike amplifier outputs to the ICS bus and from there to the headset. In the OFF position the intercom capability is disabled. In the ICS RCV position voice signals on the ICS bus are routed to the headsets.

## Function

This flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates, in the GREY position, that the tape is moving and that voice recording is taking place. Conversely, the BARBERPOLE position indicates that the tape is not moving and that voice recording is not taking place.

## Function

This three-position toggle (AUTO - OFF - SLEW) selects the control mode by which the S-band steerable antenna is positioned. In the OFF position, power to the antenna drive motors is interrupted. In the SLEW position the steerable antenna is positioned by using $14-\mathrm{B}-1$ and $14-B-2$ to peak $14-M-1$. In the AUTO position, the earth sensor is activated, which will automatically keep the antenna pointed at earth, provided the antenna is oriented to within $\pm 10$ degrees of the earth.

This four-position rotary (1 - 2 - SLEW - LUNAR STAY) provides selection of any of the four S-band antennas for communication with earth. The 1 and 2 positions select \#l and \#2 omni-directional antennas respectively, for use in the event of S-band steerable antenna failure. The SLEN position selects the steerable antenna, and the LUNAR STAY position selects the S-band erectable antenna for use during lunar stay. A lock mechanism is incorporated in this rotary knob to prevent inadvertent selection of the LUNAR STAY position in the absence of an antenna load at the connector.


## Function

This four-position rotary (PISS TEST - 1 - 2 - EVA) provides selection of any of three VHF antennas for communication with the command module or the extravehicular astronaut. A fourth position, PLSS TEST, is used in conjunction with a hardline connection to the portable life support system to checkout EVA two-way voice communications and telemetry transmission prior to LEM egress. The 1 and 2 antennas are used for communicating with the CSM, and the EVA antenna is used for communicating with the extravehicular astronaut during lunar stay. A lock mechanism is incorporated in this rotary knob to prevent inadvertent selection of either the PLSS TEST or EVA position in the absence of an antenna load on them.

Each of these rotary controls actuates a synchro transmitter which generates position command signals to the antenna drive assembly in the pitch and yaw axes, when $14-S-3$ is in the SLEW position. Positioning these controls transmits corresponding position commands to the antenna drive assembly in two axes, and position signals from the antenna assembly drive the panel indicators ( $14-M-3$ and $14-M-4$ ).

This indicator displays the intesity of S-band signals received from the earth. It is utilized in conjunction with $14-B-1$ and $14-B-2$ to manually establish signal contact with the earth. When peaked, it indicates that the S-band steerable antenna is pointing at the earth. It can be used as an indication of the pointing accuracy of the steerable antenna or erectable antenna, or it can indicate which of the two in-flight antennas is providing the best link to earth.

## Function

These indicators display the pitch ( $14-\mathrm{M}-3$ ) and yaw ( $14-\mathrm{M}-4$ ) angles of the S-band dish antenna. The antenna pitch limits are $255^{\circ}$ above and $75^{\circ}$ below a plane parallel to the vehicle Y-Z plane. The antenna yaw limits are $75^{\circ}$ to the left and $75^{\circ}$ to the right of a plane parallel to the vehicle $X-Y$ plane. The initial pitch and yaw angles which will orient the antenna toward earth are obtained from a computer readout. Then, the antenna is positioned to the desired pitch and yaw angles by using $14-\mathrm{B}-1$ and $14-B-2$, and by reference to the antenna pitch and yaw indicators.

## Function

Each three-position toggle (ON -- OFF/ RESET) controls the high voltage power output from one of the four descent batteries. Selecting the ON position will place the battery high voltage tap on the line. Selecting the OFF/ RESET position disconnects the high voltage battery power tap from the line. Prior to selecting the ON position, the OFF/RESET position must be selected so that the electronic control assembly contactors will be set to enable battery power application to the DC Bus. The electronic control assembly controls battery connection to the DC bus. In the event of over current in a battery, the ECA will trip this battery off the line. ## Function

In the event of over current in a battery the ECA will trip this battery off the line. Positive feedback of the tripped status of each battery is provided by $4-\mathrm{FL}-\mathrm{l}$, 4-FI-2, 4-FI-3 and 4-FI-4.

This three-position toggle (CONNECT DEADFACE) enables power interruption of the descent batteries feed path to the ascent stage. The switch is normally in the CONNECT position, thus allowing power flow from the descent batteries to the ascent stage. Selecting the DEADFACE position initiates the deadface relays thus isolating the descent batteries upstream from the staging guillotine (ascent side). ## Function

Positive feedback of the tripped status of battery \#5 and battery \#6 is provided by $4-F I-5$ and $4-F I-6$ respectively.

These three position toggles (ON -- OFF/ RESET) control the ascent battery \#5 and ascent battery \#6 power feed path to both busses. Selecting the ON position will place the battery on the line. Selecting the OFF/RESET position disconnects the battery power from the line and sets up the contactors in the ECA for overcurrent protection. In the event of battery \#6 failure or battery \#5 feeder line failure, 4-S-12 will be placed to ON. The ECA controls battery connection to the DC bus and will disconnect the battery in the event of an overcurrent. Positive feedback is provided by $4-\mathrm{FI}-7$. In the event of battery \#5 failure or battery \#6 feeder line failure, this switch will be placed to ON. ## Function

Selecting the INV 2 position permits the \#2 inverter to supply power to the AC bus. Positive feedback of AC bus status is supplied by $4-\mathrm{M}-2$.

This ten-position rotary (OFF - 1-2-3-4-5-6-CDR-SE-AC) enables voltage-current monitoring of batteries 1 through 6 and voltage monitoring of the CDR, SE or AC busses on meters $4-M-2$ and 4-M-3. Additionally, over-temperature and current fault isolation capability is enabled whenever the switch is in any position 1 through 6 and that particular battery is, in fact, in an over-temperature, reverse or over current condition. This condition is indicated by illumination of either the over-temperature component caution light ( $4-$ DS -1 ) or the current fault component caution light (4-DS-2). Selecting the OFF position de-energizes the EPS displays.

This two-position toggle (ENABLE - INHIBIT) controls the automatic switch-over feature, whereby the two ascent batteries energize the busses in the event of failure of two or more descent batteries. The switch is normally in the ENABLE position so as to allow the two ascent batteries to energize the busses when an overcurrent condition trips two or more descent batteries off the line.


## Function

The INHIBIT position is used during the unmanned portion of the mission providing the capability of powering the LEM from the CSM. If after automatic transfer to ascent power it is desired to use the remaining good descent batteries the INHIBIT position will be utilized. Positive feedback that the ascent power automatic transfer has taken place is provided by 4-FI-5 and 4-FI-6.

This meter will indicate the voltage of any of the six batteries, the SE, the CDR or AC bus depending on the position of 4-S-15.

This meter will indicate the current of any of the six batteries depending on the position of 4-S-15.

Each flag (GREY - LO - BARBERPOIE) indicates that the battery High Voltage Tap is on the line when the GREY position is in view. The Low Voltage Tap is on the line when the LO position is is in view. The battery is off the line when the BARBERPOLE position is in view.

This flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates that battery \#5 is powering the Systems Engineer's bus when the GREY position is in view. In the BARBERPOLE position, battery \#5 is not feeding the Systems Engineer's bus through this normal feed path.


## Function

This flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates that battery \#6 is powering the Commander's bus when the GREY position in view. In the BARBERPOLE position, battery \#6 is not feeding the Commander's bus through this normal feed path.

This flag (GREY -BARBERPOLE) indicates that battery \#5 is powering the Commander's bus when the GREY position is in view. In the BARBERPOLE position, battery \#5 is not feeding the Commander's bus through this backup feed path.

This flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates that battery \#6 is powering the Systems Engineer's bus when the GREY position is in view. In the BARBERPOLE position, battery \#6 is not feeding the Systems Engineer's bus through this backup feed path.

This flag (GREY - BARBERPOLE) indicates whether the descent deadface has been accomplished. The GREY position indicates that the descent batteries are connected to the ascent stage. The BARBERPOLE position indicates that the descent batteries have been disconnected and deadfaced.

This light illuminates to indicate a particular battery over-temperature, ovèr-current, or reverse current condition when $4-S-15$ is placed to that battery position and an over-temperature condition exists. A battery over-temperature, over-current, or reverse current condition will illuminate the (BATTERY) caution annunciator (6-DS-27) and cause the astronaut to seek out the battery problem by using 4-S-15.

The LEM lighting consists of exterior and interior illumination. The choice of illumination is based upon vehicle performance, crew visual tasks, operator fatigue, interior contrast relationships and interiorexterior environmental relationships. The lighting system must give optimum performance and maximum reliability and yet be compatible with electrical power and vehicle weight restrictions.

### 2.1 Interior Iighting

The LFM interior illumination shall consist of integral lighted components and flood lighting devices.

### 2.1.1 Integral Iighted Components

There are three types of integral lighted components: Panel areas, Displays, and Caution and Warning (C\&W) annunciators. These integral lighted components utilize either electroluminescent (EL) or incandescent devices. Provision is made for manually controlling the brightness of an integral lighting components in a continuous fashion. All nomenclature on the display and control panels is integrally lighted by white electroluminescent lamps in conjunction with suitable overlays. The displays have electroluminescent light sources contained within the display enclosure. The information contained in the display consists of white illuminated markings on a non-illuminated background. The non-illuminated pointer travels over an illuminated background. Numeric EL Displays have illuminated green or white digital markings on a non-illuminated background. Provisions are made for manually controlling the brightness continuously from the maximum. Caution and Warning (C\&W) and component caution annunciators and numeric displays are dimmable on the same control.

### 2.1.2 Flood Lighting

Flood lighting is provided as a secondary means of illuminating all display and control panel areas. In addition, illumination is provided as necessary within the crew compartment for the performance of crew duties or tasks. Panel flood lighting fixtures are provided for each of the forward display panels and provides even illumination of the panel areas. No panel area depends solely upon one lamp for its illumination. The color of the illumination is white.
2.2 Exterior Lighting
Exterior illumination consists of docking and tracking lights on the LEM to provide orientation cues to the crew of the CSM.

### 2.2.1 Docking Lights

Docking lights are provided for visual orientation cues and gross attitude determination during rendezvous and docking. These lights shall be on/off controlled by the onboard crew during the lunar docking phase. Provision is made to illuminate these lights automatically prior to the trans-lunar docking maneuver.
2.2.2 Tracking Iight
A tracking light is provided to allow visual tracking of the LEM by the CSM. This light is on/off controlled and dimmed by the LEM.
2.3 Self-Luminous Devices

### 2.3.1 Switches

The switch position of toggles is illuminated by means of self-luminous devices. These devices enable the crew to visually check the switch position during the low ambient illumination conditions.

### 2.3.2 Docking Target

A self-luminous docking target is provided which will aid the crew in visually aligning the CM to the LEM during the final docking maneuver.

### 3.1 Extravehicular Mobility Unit

The extravehicular mobility unit (EMU) is a multilayered unit that consists of a liquid-cooled garment, a pressure garment assembly, a thermal meteoroid garment, a portable life support system, an emergency oxygen subsystem, biomedical and environmental sensors, and dosimeters. To accomplish a safe, manned mission, the EMU is constructed as an anthropomorphic, closedcircuit, pressure vessel that envelops the entire astronaut. With the portable life support system attached to the pressure garment assembly, the astronaut has a livable envelope that can sustain his activities in the LEM or in the Iunar environment. Inside the EMU, the astronaut is supplied $100 \%$ oxygen. The normal operating pressure of the EMU is 3.7 psia; it weighs approximately 120 pounds.

### 3.1.1 Liquid-Cooled Garment

The liquid-cooled garment (LCG), the innermost component of the EMU, is worn by each astronaut during all LEM operations. It maintains body temperature at a comfortable level while the astronauts are in the LEM and on the lunar surface.

### 3.1.2 Pressure Garment Assembly

The pressure garment assembly (PGA) includes a torso and limb suit, a helmet, and a pair of intervehicular gloves. The PGA is worn during all LEM operations. The PGA is the basic item of the life-support system. It aids in shielding the astronauts from the thermal-vacuum environments of outer space and, if the thermal meteoroid garment is worn, enables them to leave the LEM in free space to perform various functions. The PGA also provides emergency backup protection if cabin pressure is lost. The materials of which the PGA is made resist the abrasive and radiation environments of free space and the lunar surface and minimize the possibility of damage to the PGA during astronaut ingress and egress via the forward or upper entrance hatches. The PGA permits the astronaut to enter and leave unaided through either hatch during the mission. Manipulation of the feet, hands, legs, forearms, arms, head, and torso is possible. The astronauts are able to walk, climb, crouch, and rise from a supine to standing position. The use of tools and LFM controls, voice and telemetry communications, and sightings (inside and outside the LEM) are included in the EMU's performance capabilities. The torso and limb suit is an anthropomorphic pressure vessel that covers the
body and limbs, except the head and hands; intervehicular boots are part of the suit. A helmet and a pair of intervehicular gloves can be attached to the suit to complete the astronaut's enclosure within the normal 3.7 -psia atmoshphere. The intervehicular boots provide thermal insulation protection; the bottom of the boots is covered with Velero-hook material, which, in conjunction with the Velcro-pile material on the cabin floor, provides additional restraint for the astronauts. Assembled to the torso and limb suit, the boots become part of the closedcircuit pressurized envelope provided by the PGA. The primary function of the helmet is to protect the head against high-impact loads and to provide a life support environment. Separate glare visors are attached to the exterior of the helmet, permitting the astronaut to read vehicle and space data under a wide range of illumination. A microphone and earphones are in the helmet. Helmet construction is compatible with physiological needs and permits eating and drinking. The intervehicular gloves provide adequate finger dexterity in all pressurized environments. A wrist seal in the sleeves of the torso and limb suit permits replacing damaged gloves with extravehicular gloves while the suit is pressurized.

### 3.1.3 Thermal Meteoroid Garment

The thermal meteoroid garment (TMG) includes a thermal meteoroid suit, extravehicular gloves and thermal mittens, and extravehicular boots. These items do not become part of the pressurized envelope provided by the PGA; they are worn over the PGA. The main function of the TMG is to insulate and protect against harmful thermal radiation and protect against micrometeoroids. The thermal meteoroid suit provides thermal insulation against the lunar-surface environment. It is worn over the PGA, but does not cover the helmet or gloves. It is a loosefitting, two-piece, multilayered, pajama suit with an aluminized outer coating that renders the suit reflective. The astronaut can don the suit, unaided, in the LEM. Fach astronaut has a pair of extravehicular gloves. A lanyard permits the gloves to be attached to, or removed from, the PGA sleeves. The extravehicular gloves provide insulation protection and are worn during the lunar stay. The wrist seal in the torso and limb suit permits emergency replacement of the intervehicular gloves with the extravehicular gloves while the suit is pressurized. Wearing the extravehicular gloves does not hinder the astronauts in performing emergency and maintenance tasks or in manipulating and erecting mission task equipment. Each astronaut also has a pair of mittens that are worn over the extravehicular gloves. The mittens can be removed for short intervals for added dexterity.

Each astronaut has a pair of extravehicular boots for use on lunar surface. These boots are worn over the intervehicular boots to provide additional insulation. The extravehicular boots, like the thermal suit, have a reflective outer coating. The astronaut can don the boots, unaided, in the LFM before descending to the lunar surface.

### 3.1.4 Portable Life Support System

The portable life support system (PLSS) is a self-contained, rechargeable system that provides limited-time life support for an astronaut exposed to extravehicular free space, a decompressed LEM, or the lunar-surface environment. The PLSS consists of subsystems components that provide primary oxygen supply storage; control of contamination, humidity, pressure, ventilation or recirculation, temperature, and electrical power; voice communications facilities; and telemetry transmission facilities. Each PLSS includes a pressurized oxygen reservoir that supplies pure oxygen to satisfy body needs for normal and emergency situation. Each reservoir filling provides a maximum supply of approximately 4 hours of oxygen. A 3-hour supply of oxygen is used for completing the mission, with a l-hour supply of oxygen for contingency. Primary oxygen maintains a steady 3.7 -psia operating pressure within the EMU. The ventilation or recirculation system conditions and recirculates the oxygen in the pressurized PGA for cooling, decontamination (solid and gaseous), and dehumidification. Electrical power is supplied by a PLSS battery to all EMU equipment for activity outside the LEM. A VHF system provides simultaneous two-way communication between the astronauts on the lunar surface and the LEM, between two extravehicular astronauts in EMU's, or between the astronaut on the lunar surface and the CSM transmitter and receiver. The communication system microphone and earphones are in the PGA helmet. Telemetry transmits environmental and biomedical data via VHF to the LEM.


EXTRAVEHICULAR MOBILITY UNIT


PGA waste management devices include provisions for temporary stowage and subsequent removal of urine. The LFM waste management section (WMS) uses the controlled pressure differential between the PGA and the cabin as the force to transfer waste fluid from the PGA waste management devices to the LEM waste fluid collector assembly. Operation of the WMS is started and stopped with the waste control valve. The waste control valve also protects the astronaut from excessive negative pressure differentials. One operational cycle includes evacuation, transfer, and stowage of the waste fluids. The WMS can transfer and evacuate waste fluid from the PGA under the effects of zero-gravity spaceflight and of 1/6 -gravity lunar-surface conditions. The waste fluid collector assembly can be removed at intervals and replaced with an unused collector assembly.

Support and restraint equipment is provided at the crew stations in the forward cabin section. During flight operations, the constant force reel assembly provides the astronauts with a zero-g tiedown force of approximately 25 pounds, in combination with the Velcro-hook (intervehicular) boots and the Velcro-pile material on the cabin floor. The support and restraint equipment includes a handgrip and two elongated, U-shaped, shock-attenuating armrest assemblies for each astronaut. When leaning on these armrests, the astronauts have sufficient freedom of motion for operation of the LFM controls and (after the reel is manually locked) protection against negative g's.


Prepared food suitable for eating in space environments is supplied to the astronauts. The menus include liquid and solid foods of adequate nutritional and caloric value, with low residue-producing characteristics to minimize biological wastes. Reconstituted food can only be consumed with the helmet removed. To prevent spoilage and conserve space, dehydrated food is sealed in pliable plastic packages. To reconstitute the food, the water umbilical hose is attached to the inlet end of the water dispenser (water gun); the outlet end of the water dispenser is inserted into the neck of the food package. Squeezing the trigger of the water dispenser regulates the flow of water into the food package. The astronaut then kneads the food and water until they are thoroughly mixed. Squeezing the bag forces food into the mouth. The water dispenser is also used for drinking water. Reconstituted food will not be eaten in a pressurized PGA. Special puree-type food in tubes is provided for emergency eating.

### 3.5 Medicine

Medical supplies (GFE) planned for the mission consist of six capsules. Four capsules are Darvon (pain killers); two are Dexadrine (pep pills). The package of capsules is to be attached with Velcro-pile to the interior of the food compartment, readily accessible when the compartment is opened.

## G.S.E.

There exists at present a requirement for two units of Ground Support Equipment (GSE) which have interface with Crew Systems. These units are:

### 4.1 430-42020 Waste Management System Leak Test Unit

After assembly and during pre-launch checkout of the LEM, a requirement exists for leak checking the WMS using helium gas. The Leak Test Unit shall be capable of pressurizing the WMS with helium to 10 psig and detecting leaks of helium with the Leak Test Unit's portable leak detector.
4.2 410-42100 Displays \& Controls Test Station (Bench Test Maint. Equip. (BTME)

The D \& C Test Station will be capable of the following:
Measure the required parameters to an order greater than the specified requirements. Supply a minimum of $25 \%$ more power than required. Generate stimuli with tolerances and accuracies greater than the specified requirements. Isolate a malfunction to the lowest replaceable level. Perform complete section tests and/or independent assembly tests. Register the accumulated operating time on the unit under test.
