JIM MASSEY



Dr. Jim Massey is a retired botanist from UNC and the former curator of the North Carolina Herbarium. On the cover of this month's MILL is a rather exuberant example of elephant garlic photographed last year, just prior to the annual spring sale at Massey's Holly Hill Day Lilly Farm in Haywood. While the garlic's nice, what draws folks by the hundreds out to Holly Hill in early June are the thousands of unique lilies and crinums Massey has so carefully cultivated over the years. Many a garden around here has a Massey original. His farm is a work of art as well, with a unique assortment of garden art and unusual poultry. In addition to the blooms, the big attraction at Holly Hill is Massey's growing collection of folk art, housed in the former Haywood post office, which was moved to the farm a few years ago and refurbished. # Summer stuff

The cooler days of June are perfect for experiencing some of our area's adventures. And with gas prices what they are, this may be the summer of the short-hop adventure. Here are a few of our favorites on

the June calendar







Holly Hill Daylily Farm

The annual daylily sale is the main draw, but Jim Massey has turned his three acres into an art garden. His collection of folk art is housed nearby in the old Haywood post office. The farm is open weekends through June. Times and directions at hollyhilldaylilies.com

### Botanical Garden

If you can't get out among the lily pads on Ulake, you can still get up close with them at the water gardens at the North Carolina Botanical Garden. On a warm day, try a walk through the shady, cool mountain habitat. Something about seeing rhododendrons lowers the temperature. Keep your eye out for special programs for kids and families at ncbg. unc.edu. On June 8, for instance, naturalist Bob Palmatier hosts "The Secret Life of Turtles."





#### Fiesta Latina

For obvious reasons, this would be a good time to contribute to the coffers of the Hispanic Liaison of Chatham County. You can also have a swell time showing your solidarity by heading out to Shakori Hills on June 21 for their annual Fiesta Latina. It's kid friendly and the food alone is worth the trip. But stick around for the music, which can range from Brazilian guitars to Raleigh punk rockers to Norteño. Also returning is Galumpha, a world-famous acrobatics troupe. More information at evhnc.org

#### University Lake

Last year, the dry grassbeds that were once a thriving part of University Lake were a sad sight from the causeway on Jones Ferry Road. What better way to celebrate the recent rains than with a tour of the refilled reservoir by rowboat? The lake is open Friday through Monday from 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Recreation includes boat and electric motor rentals and fishing and a picnic area.

#### Snow Camp
