Lovette found guilty in Carson case

Although Laurence Alvin Lovette Jr. maintains his innocence in the murder of UNC student body president Eve Carson on March 5, 2008, it only took 12 jury members less than three hours to find him guilty.

After spending nearly a week and a half listening to the state present evidence and the defense attempt to devalue testimony from witnesses, the seven men and five women of the jury returned the verdict Tuesday morning that they were convinced beyond a reasonable doubt that Lovette was guilty.

"I knew we had strong evidence," District Attorney Jim Woodall said about the outcome of the case. "I never pretend to know what a jury will pick. But because the jury came back fairly quickly, I was pretty confident that they found him guilty on all charges."

Broun steps down, plans to remain outspoken



Charter school draws concern

The Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools Board of Education is concerned that a charter school proposed for the district could reduce diversity in schools, and they're not the only ones worried.

Robert Campbell, president of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro NAACP and chair of the Rogers-Eubanks Coalition, is also concerned about the impact of the charter school, and has said the NAACP does not support it as proposed.

"We believe at this time that a charter school is not the answer for our educational gap," he said. "Let us try to come together to do the right thing for our schools."

An application for the Howard and Lillian Lee Scholars Charter School cites the district's still-prevalent achievement gap and massive school overcrowding as reasons why the school is needed. Angela Lee, daughter of former Chapel Hill Mayor Howard Lee, is named as the applicant.

At the school board meeting last week, board members and Superintendent Tom Forcella expressed concern over the amount of money the school could take from the district and that it targets recruiting minority students, which could potentially reduce diversity in schools.

"Our minority numbers are not huge, and if this comes to fruition it could significantly decrease our numbers as far as minority students," Forcella said.

"I know that this district and community values diversity," he added.

In a letter Forcella sent to the N.C. Department of Public Instruction Office of Charter Schools on Dec. 7, he defended the district's efforts to close the achievement gap and alleviate overcrowding. Data cited in the application regarding the achievement gap reference only the 2009-10 school year report card, while Forcella included three years of data in his letter, outlining improvements in closing the gap.

All the more reason never to venture into a forest alone; you never know what you may encounter.

"Often planted in Chapel Hill lawns but now quite rare in the woods because of its abuse for

Stepping down from her post on the Carrboro Board of Aldermen - after 12 years on the job – "feels good"; actually, it "feels great" to Joal Hall Broun.

When Broun – never one to hold back her true sentiments - sought a seat on the board in 1999, she did so with purpose, something she's carried throughout her tenure on the board, which came to a close earlier this month.

"I felt like I could make a contribution," she said. Prior to her campaign for alderman, Broun, who had moved to Carrboro from Salisbury in 1992 for a job as a public defender, had spent six years on the OWASA board, from which she gained experience dealing with a large budget. Her education in the law and experience in the community rounded out that knowledge; plus, she likes to participate in Carrboro Branch Library. the development of policy.

So she threw her hat in the ring for appointment to a seat on the board, where she'd spend more than a decade, winning reelection three times, working to determine "how to leave the town in a better position" than when she started.

And with that, she's succeeded.

"Joal is all about the process and is thoroughly committed to the process being fair and equitable for all citizens," board member Randee Haven-O'Donnell said. "She is dedicated to that principle and consistent to that principle and without bias."

"I think that that's really important," Haven-O'Donnell added. "She always keeps an eye on the bigger picture as it relates to inclusiveness and that unspoken perspective, and I have always admired her forthrightness."

Mayor Mark Chilton notes in particular Broun's work related to the

We're going to miss her leadership on the board on those sorts of issues," he said.

"She certainly always has been a consistent voice for making sure that minority populations of our community are not left out of the discussion," Chilton added.

Broun has been vocal throughout the community's discussion of a freestanding Carrboro branch library. She's worked with the Friends of the Carrboro Branch Library for years, and plans to continue to serve on the group's board of directors.

There's no reason there shouldn't be a library branch in Carrboro. There should've been one 10 years ago," she said. "Libraries are a place where you can learn a new skill, you can improve your academic success, you can have a community meeting."

However, the board acknowledged there is still work to do.

"Obviously there is some level of demand for this school because we have not made as much progress as we would like to," board member James Barrett said.

Police arrest homicide suspect

The Chapel Hill Police have arrested Mario Dante Ramsey, 26, of 711 N. Duke St., Apt. 10, in Durham for one count of first-degree murder in the Dec. 11 shooting death of Drew Christopher Frasure.

Ramsey was taken into custody at his residence in Durham without incident. He was taken before the Orange County magistrate and was not given a bond.

County OKs library funding plan

The Orange County Board of Commissioners approved an agreement last week to increase the county's funding of the Chapel Hill Public Library.

The county will increase its funding for the library from \$250,000 to about \$343,000 for the next fiscal year and will continue to increase funding for the library by 3 percent each year until the amount reaches 30 percent of the total library operations budget.

Commissioners hope that this agreement will increase interoperability between the two systems. The Chapel Hill Town Council will vote on the agreement on Jan. 9.

• The Town of Hillsborough offices will be closed today through Monday.

• Hillsborough garbage collection scheduled for Friday will be collected today and collection scheduled for Monday will be collected Tuesday.

Library groundbreaking celebration

The Town of Chapel Hill celebrated the Chapel Hill Public Library Expansion Project at a groundbreaking ceremony last Saturday.

Chapel Hill residents approved a \$16.23 million bond in November 2003 to pay for an expansion of the library. The current 27,000-square-foot library was built in 1994.

The construction project is expected to be completed in January 2013 and will more than double the library's size to 62,500 square feet. It will provide 5,200 square feet of public meeting space, including two large meeting rooms, two large conference rooms, a quiet room and several study rooms.

The Chapel Hill Public Library is operating in a temporary location next to Cameron's in University Mall.

Schools consider solutions to crowding

While the Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools Board of Education is looking forward to elementary school 11 helping to alleviate overcrowding in schools, it won't open until fall 2013, and board members are hearing that something has to be

done now. Kevin Fuerst, coordinator of student enrollment for the district, presented to the school board at their Dec.15 meeting, outlining which schools are seeing severe overcrowding and what options are available.

Fuerst said projections show that next year there will be seven elementary schools over their Schools Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance (SAPFO) capacity and just three that will be under – Frank Porter Graham, McDougle and Rashkis elementary schools.

SAPFO requires that in order for new residential developments to be approved, adequate school ing the most overcrowding and a shortage of classrooms for instruction, Fuerst presented options for addressing the situation at those three schools only, warning that none of the options is perfect.

"These are not good options for any of these schools," he said. "We are really scraping the bottom of the barrel here."

Carrboro Elementary has a SAPFO capacity of 533 students, but is projected to see enrollment grow to 608 in 2012-13.

One option presented is to do spot redistricting for the next school year, while the second is to not redistrict until elementary 11 opens.

While the second option leaves students and teachers in a crowded situation, Carrboro Principal Emily Bivins has said they could make it work for another year.

"I support the recommendation if the principal thinks they could hold on," board member Jamezetta Bedford said.

The projected enrollment for room.

"The way it is operating right now is not sustainable, and the school should not be operating at that capacity," Todd LoFrese, assistant superintendent for support services, told the board.

Discussion from the board centered on redistricting kids from Glenwood to Rashkis Elementary, but concerns were raised about which kids to redistrict.

While options for Seawell also included waiting for elementary 11, there were two additional options for board members to consider: relocating the school's LEAP program or moving a pre-K classroom to another location. Seawell's SAPFO capacity is

The board directed staff to come back with plans to move possibly a fifth-grade classroom from Seawell to Smith Middle School, look into which classrooms they could put dividers into and come up with a budget for creating a pre-K mobile class-

Mental health center receives grant

The UNC Center for Excellence in Community Mental Health has received an \$850,000, three-year grant from The Duke Endowment to create a health home, integrating primary care into its mental health care programs for people in Orange, Person and Chatham counties.

The center is part of the department of psychiatry within the UNC School of Medicine and offers a continuum of care for people with severe and persistent mental illness.

Its programs include Outreach and Support Intervention Services (OASIS); the Schizophrenia Treatment and Evaluation Program (STEP); and its recently merged partner, XDS Inc.

"Many [people with severe mental illnesses] don't have access to primary health care to identify and treat their physical diseases," said John Gilmore, the center's director, "and mental illness can diminish a person's capacity to seek and manage their medical care.

"The newer medications used for serious mental illness sometimes exacerbate the problem by causing obesity and diabetes."

Individuals with schizophrenia and other severe mental illnesses have a high rate of chronic medical diseases and die 25 years sooner than the average person. More than 60 percent of the excess deaths are due to chronic medical conditions such as cardiovascular diseases, cancer, diabetes and infections.

The integration of primary and psychiatric care has been recognized as a way to provide better quality of life for persons with severe mental illness and lower the cost of their overall health care.

Capel returns successfully, despite loss



The upperclassmen players in



Carolina basketball players, other than who those played from Eddy Landreth 1998-2002,

who can full understand the extreme swings actually possible for UNC basketball.

Jason Capel is one of those. He played on a Final Four team in 2000 and a team ranked No. 1 in the country for a decent run in 2001.

Then the bottom fell out as it never has at UNC. Second-year coach Matt Doherty and the Tar Heels melted into an 8-20 morass. The team underwent a near-revolt after the season, and the seniors left and have rarely returned.

Capel made it back last Saturday and brought along his Appalachian State team. Following in the footsteps of his father and brother, Capel has become a collegiate head coach.

"I haven't been back here a lot," Capel said. "I came in '05. ... I came for the 100-year deal; I came to my wife's graduation. It was good to come back. It was good to see a lot of faces I know, familiar faces, people who meant a lot to me. It was good to be home."

The crowd showed its approval and gave him a nice ovation.

The Tar Heels won 97-82, as expected, but Capel's Mountaineers handled themselves well. Carolina would race to a big lead, only to have ASU fight back – all night. The Mountaineers actually outscored the Tar Heels in the second half, 50-49.

"You have to congratulate Jason and his club for continuing to play and doing a nice job defensively and making some shots," UNC coach Roy Williams said. "At times I thought we did a nice job defensively, but then in that had our biggest lead at 29, all of a sudden it was 15 or something like that."

Capel has had to rebuild this team from last season. He has six new players, and Appalachian State has gotten off to a rough start at 4-6.

But if the team responds to Capel and the challenge as it did on Saturday, the Mountaineers should be able to compete in the Southern Conference.

The Tar Heels provided the best collection of talent ASU will see this season, so the Mountaineers should now know they can compete if they listen to their coach and play hard for 40 minutes, just as they did against UNC.

"Nothing can prepare you for what you were going to see out there, but we tried to simulate as much as possible," Capel said. We're proud that we competed. We didn't just play hard. We competed. We didn't take a step back when they punched us in the mouth.

'We kept coming forward. We got down 29 and we stayed together. That is part of the process [of building]. We fought them tooth and nail and gave it our best shot. It's something we can build upon and carry over to our next game.

"Everything they ran, I knew it was coming," Capel said. "We tried to simulate all week how fast the break was going to be, Tyler Zeller. But nothing can prepare you for a 7-footer running that fast. It's just impossible to do."

Just as Saturday should have prepared his team, Capel said his career at UNC readied him for what life eventually throws at all of us.

"It prepared me for everything, not just in my profession but life," Capel said. "You work hard in life because you want to achieve great things. At the same time, things can go south on you.

'What are you going to do? How are you going to respond? It was a dream of mine to come here. Some great people recruited me here. People treated me pretty well. Those are people I will love forever."

Tunes' participation in the Share Your Holiday Program worthwhile.

"I run into so many wonderful people that sponsor kids, that give money," Garavaglia said. "People help in all kinds of ways. There's some people that don't have enough money to help buy things, so they'll shop for us. We have people that just do deliveries for us. We have people that just assemble bicycles for us."

Because the children are in protective custody and foster care, the sponsors do not actually deliver the gifts in person. The toys and gifts are deposited at designated toy drop sites, and

Lovette was found guilty of first-degree murder, which has an automatic sentence of life in prison without parole.

He was also found guilty of kidnapping and robbery, which will carry additional sentences.

"This case is such a tragedy," Assistant District Attorney James Rainsford said to the jury in his closing argument. "What the defendant did was greedy, miserable, cruel and useless, and that is what murder is."

With the trial at an end and media coverage surrounding the event winding down, Woodall said he hopes the Chapel Hill and UNC community can start to gain closure from the tragic death of Carson.

While reminders of Carson remain scattered across the community - a memorial garden dedicated to her on UNC's campus and both an annual 5K me-

then social workers deliver the gifts to the children.

But Garavaglia said she does not think this is necessarily a bad thing.

'The whole thing just gets to play out in your own head," Garavaglia said. "It's about the magic and the mystery of the season and caring for someone that you'll never meet [which] is a very swell thing."

Once Balloons and Tunes has helped set up sponsors for every Orange County child in foster care and protective custody, it then turns its attention to assisting the Toy Chest, another holiday program sponsored by DSS.

In closing arguments, the state went back through key evidence presented during the trial, including the ATM photo that prosecutors said shows Lovette driving Carson's car, video footage taken the night of the murder from outside a sorority house that they maintain depicts Lovette and

Demario Atwater and testimony from important witnesses, such as Shanita Love and Jayson Mc-Neil. Laurence Lovette

"The evi-

dence that has been presented in this case allows us to literally look back in time to March 5, 2008, and see these events unfold," Rainsford said.

This look back into what happened in the early morning hours of March 5 rendered pictures so vivid that on multiple occasions jurors were left in tears.

Witness accounts told of Carson's final moments before she was shot four times with a handgun and once in the head with a sawed-off shotgun.

In showing the ATM photo during closing arguments, Rainsford argued that Carson could be seen raising her hands in prayer, corroborating McNeil's testimony that Lovette said she asked him and Atwater to pray with her.

The defense tried to invalidate the statements of the state's witnesses, saying they had ulterior

in low-income households. The Toy Chest program collects toys and allows parents from these low-income households to choose two or three gifts to give to their children for the holidays.

"It's meant to be a supplement, hoping that the parents can buy them something [too]," Garavaglia said. "It's meant to supplement Christmas for them because these are very hard times."

More than 20 years ago, Balloons and Tunes responded to a DSS advertisement in the newspaper calling for holiday sponsorships for children, and that is how the business began its assistance with the program, Garavaglia said.

She said two or three years later, Balloons and Tunes was

testimony.

While the prosecutors admitted that some of their witnesses were not the most upstanding citizens, they argued that their testimony was nonetheless important and trustworthy.

"The State of North Carolina didn't choose those witnesses; the defendant chose those witnesses," Woodall said, indicating Lovette's mistake in telling his friends details regarding the murder and his involvement.

In their closing arguments, the defense claimed that the story told of what happened was incomplete, and that there were major witnesses missing in the case, namely Atwater.

Defense attorney Karen Bethea-Shields told jurors that Atwater "knows the secrets of what happened," and implied that the state had declined to call Atwater as a witness because his story would conflict with the state's evidence against Lovette.

sponsoring 10 to 15 children, and friends and community members wanted to help, so Balloons and Tunes would help them find children to sponsor as well.

"And it's just grown in that way," Garavaglia said. "Hardly anybody that does it doesn't do it the next year because it's really fun for them.

"It makes me very happy. I can't imagine Christmas without it."

"The state's burden was to give you everything you needed," Bethea-Shield told the jury. She maintained the prosecution had been unable to do so, giving the jury more than reasonable doubt.

But in the end, the jury had no lingering questions, and the state's case was sufficient for jury members to return a guilty verdict

Both Lovette's mother and Carson's parents were present during the trial and were in the courtroom when the verdict was read.

The Carsons have elected to not make a statement about the case and asked Woodall to tell the court, the jury and the police involved in the case that they were thankful for all the work they had done.

"I hope it gives some degree of closure, but I don't think there will ever be complete closure," Woodall said of the verdict. "I think it will be part of our collective history as a community."





HOUSE Calls

Practicing family physicians from the UNC Department of Family Medicine have teamed up with The Carrboro Citizen to bring you a weekly feature responding to your questions about health and medicine. Send your questions or comments to yourhealth@unc.edu

This week we respond to questions about losing a few pounds and hearing aids with pacemakers.

Dear HOUSE Calls, I am a 60-year-old woman in good health; I eat well, exercise regularly and drink in moderation. How can I lose the five to 10 pounds I have picked up over the last few years? It is really frustrating.

You are already doing many good things for your health. As you age, your metabolism declines, so if you have the same diet and exercise habits now as you did 20 years ago, you will likely gain a little weight. You have two choices – eat less or move more. Portion control is key for eating less and is the great lesson of diet programs like Weight Watchers. You can also try writing down what you eat to see what you can learn from it and where you can cut calories. Also think about your glycemic load. Foods high in simple carbohydrates (processed

flour, sugar, potatoes) will tend to make you hungrier than foods higher in protein, fat and fiber. Consider cutting beverages with calories (fruit juices, sweet tea, soda and alcohol). The other part of this equation is exercise. Can you add a workout or two each week or increase the duration of your workout? We encourage at least 30 minutes of moderate to vigorous exercise six times per week. Now if you are pressed for time, intensity is the other important part of this equation. Are you getting your heart rate up to 70-80 percent of your age-predicted maximum (112-128 beats per minute)? Can you add higher-intensity intervals to get as much as you can out of your workout? Consider a visit or two with a nutritionist and a personal trainer to tailor your diet and exercise program.

Dear HOUSE Calls, I have a hearing aid and was told that I have it too close to a pacemaker and it might be

dangerous. Is this really a problem?

Hearing aids often have a warning that you are not supposed to use them with a pacemaker. This is probably pretty safe. Some studies show that with a remote-style pacemaker, if the transmitter is within 1 inch of the pacemaker, it may interfere with the hearing aid but not the pacemaker. Many manufacturers recommend that you keep the transmitter 4 or more inches from a pacemaker to avoid a theoretical risk of interfering with the pacemaker. Similarly, iPhones should be 6 inches from a pacemaker. Even though this is probably quite safe, it seems like a small inconvenience to keep the transmitter out of your shirt pocket.





The war is over, again

It was nine degrees on the Saab's thermometer as we drove north on I-95 in the black predawn of Jan. 18, 2003. I had on every bit of warm clothing that this Southern boy owned.

Vicky, Anne, Patrick and I were on our way to Washington, D.C., to urge our president not to invade Iraq – just us and a couple of hundred thousand others with similar feelings.

The run up to this moment had, of course, begun in earnest on Sept. 11, 2001, when our country was attacked by a group comprised largely of Saudis.

We nearly froze that day out there on the Mall, but were warmed by our conviction that this war was wrong and had to be stopped.

As winter turned to spring, we continued to express, to no avail, our opposition to the Iraq War. Wednesday afternoons from 5 to 6 you'd find us on Market Square in Fayetteville.

Fayetteville was a tough place to be anti-war. While our protests were intended to prevent the unnecessary loss of military lives, we still received much derision from passing motorists; we were sworn at and saluted with middle fingers.

My sister, Anne, a member of the Fayetteville City Council at that time, probably took more abuse than the rest of us. I heard her sworn at and called a traitor. It was hard to take, but we stood there each week because of our conviction that this war was wrong.

Our convictions were right.

After more than 100,000 dead Iraqis and 4,802 coalition deaths, and many thousands more maimed, the last U.S. troops slipped out of Iraq under the cover of darkness on Sunday.

No "shock and awe," no grand pronouncements of "mission accomplished." No, we just left a place we should never have been.

The Associated Press quoted a departing soldier, Warrant Officer John Jewell, who said, "My heart goes out to the Iraqis. The innocent always pay the bill."

So now we leave Iraq to its own devices, and even now the country is slipping into chaos, paying the bill for the mess we made.

This feels a whole lot like the end of the Vietnam War when we ignominiously departed Saigon. Only then there was a strong central government, the North Vietnamese, ready to restore order to the chaos we left. WHATTER CLASS WARFARE! WARFAR! WARFAR!

Dangers of fracking unknown

"The majority is never right until it does right." Arthur Miller's prescient words, from his play *An Enemy of the People*, couldn't be truer than in the issue of fracking. These words are spoken by a doctor who discovers his town's "healing" springs are contaminated with harmful bacteria that could sicken many people. The town rejects his attempts to publicize the issue because of the effects on the town economy.

North Carolina lawmakers are hurrying to legalize fracking. The majority is not doing the right thing in this case, like in Miller's play. Although the economic benefits of fracking are attractive, the longterm effects on the environment and our health are not known. The EPA recently released a report on how fracking can lead to contaminated groundwater – who knows what else it might affect? Lawmakers should slow down the bill until we know more about the effects of fracking.

Things do not become ethical or right just because the majority is in favor of it. We need to look into the effects of fracking before moving the fracking laws any further. The shortterm economic benefits do not outweigh the long-term damage.

2011 was almost destined to be the year of the library flub, at least in southern Orange County where both towns went through their own tussle with the county over funding. Both the town council and board of aldermen had to suss out a way forward for library services amid an evertightening budget and a seriously strapped and at times recalcitrant

Yet here we are at the end of

the year with something resembling peace in the valley between the governing bodies, expansion underway in Chapel Hill and at least some working ideas for a way forward in Carrboro.

Let's take a look at how we got from A to B.

For Chapel Hill, the fight with the county has been going on for several years now, with the county maintaining a static level of monetary support while costs for operating the ever-busier Chapel Hill Public Library have gone up. Attempts to work out a deal have not gone smoothly.

When an issue that matters to a large swath of people lingers unresolved through several election cycles, a bitter history can build

Undoing that knot can prove to be the toughest challenge. Going into the year, things had gotten so bad that Chapel Hill was on the verge of starting to charge non-residents for library usage, a move that didn't make sense given geography, tradition, municipal borders and the makeup of the school system. It wasn't even a lateral move; funding would have surely dropped. But in the heat of the fight with the county it seemed to some members of the council that it was the only move available.

Thankfully, the fee schedule wasn't adopted, and after a long, hard slog, the talks recently bore fruit. Early next year, the council will vote on a plan adopted by the county to gradually increase

it reaches levels that make more sense, given the CHPL's contribution to library services in the county.

Chapel Hill also threw itself a curveball early in the year when it took a serious look at relocating to the mall in the space now occupied by a Dillard's store in full holiday shopping frenzy.

You could argue that it was a positive exercise in outside-thebox thinking, but it added a lot of anxiety to the already-nervous regular users of the Pritchard Park location as well as the cadre of library supporters who fought for passage of the 2003 bond referendum to pay for the expansion and then watched the project lose momentum and experience delays. No group was more relieved

library funding by 3 percent until when the gold shovels hit the ground last weekend.

To the west, the big library flub of 2011 started with the surprise choice by the county last year of a site near Carrboro Elementary School for its southwest library branch. That laid the groundwork this year for an uncomfortable and divisive tussle in which longtime advocates for a freestanding Carrboro library saw the site as a must while its neighbors saw it as disastrous.

It took the site's closest neighbors, Cray and Kathy Gunn, who run the kind of small business we love to cheer on around here, pouring their savings into a successful legal challenge that helped expose the problems with the site. They shouldn't have had to do that.

Now we're back to square one, but at least tempers have cooled a bit, and hopefully a more open and deliberate site search can move forward. The county's recent retooling of the site criteria for a southwestern branch was a good first step.

These are tough fiscal times, and with the towns filling in they are also difficult times to find the right location and design for a major public facility that will be in use for several decades or more. As people in Chapel Hill found out, even having a solid majority of voters on record in support is no guarantee that something will happen.

You can stamp these decisions by our elected leaders overdue, but at least they finally got around to turning them in.

But, she added, "Libraries on the whole are underfunded in Orange County."

A word (OK, a few) on development

When Broun was first seated on the board of aldermen, "We had a bad [Capital Investment Plan]," she said. "I thought we had to be more specific about what capital projects we were going to work on."

So she focused on the CIP, and along with other board members got the town going on projects like the Homestead Road fire station.

Broun is also proud of her work with the board on securing the town's purchases for open space, like the Adams Tract and the Martin Luther King Jr. property, as well as the joint efforts of the town and school system on the Smith Middle School fields, where her son now practices soccer.

But as Carrboro moves forward, Broun said, it's important that the board consider what types of development it envisions

for Carrboro.

"If you don't want a Shelton Station and you don't want a CVS, what do you want?" she said. "It's easy to say what you don't want."

Economic development, she said, should be the subject of ongoing discussions, involving the county and all of its towns.

In the '80s and '90s, Broun said, town leaders did a great job of drawing in the right kind of businesses to complement one another and support what was already there in Carrboro's downtown.

"People like Ellie Kinnaird and Mayor [Mike] Nelson had kind of a vision to make it happen," she said.

"These kinds of ideas we need to continue to see," Broun added. She'd also like to see more af-

fordable housing in Carrboro. "I think there are going to

be more pressures on reasonably priced housing," Broun said, adding, "I think that Carrboro should work hard so that we don't price ourselves out of diversity."

The challenges for the board going forward will be to determine where to put that economic development and affordable





ment gap, not charter schools.

Also included in Forcella's letter were the district's plans to open elementary school 11 in August 2013, which will help reduce school overcrowding.

Forcella explained that the intent in sharing this information was not to degrade the charter school but to help the office make a more informed decision when considering allowing the school to be built.

"The board's intent is not to refute the pedagogy, organizational scheme or vision of the proposed charter school, but rather the purpose of this correspondence is to provide accurate and at times more detailed information," Forcella said in the letter.

Administrators of the Howard and Lillian Lee Scholars Charter School plan to partner with the National Heritage Academies, a for-profit charter school management group that has schools in 71 locations in nine states, including North Carolina.

If approved, the charter school would open in August 2012 for 480 students in grades K-5 and would eventually expand to grades K-8, serving more than 700 students.

In addition to eventually removing 700 students from the district, according to Todd Lo-Frese, assistant superintendent for support services, the school could take up to \$7 million away from the district.

"To take money out of the school system to accommodate a for-profit school, this is not the right time," Campbell said.


This summer the state lifted the cap, previously set at 100, on the number of charter schools that can operate in North Carolina.

The Howard and Lillian Lee Scholars Charter School, which is named for the first black mayor of Chapel Hill and his wife, who was an educator, has advanced to the next stage in the state application process, and applicants will have an interview with the Office of Charter Schools in January.



Christmas decorations for over a hundred years, we would like to mention the Christmas holly (*llex* opaca)."

There are so many fine cultivars of American holly in nurseries that we should all plant one or more in our gardens for year-round beauty as well as to have one's own personal source of holly to bring indoors.

American "Christmas" holly is scattered about in the understory of local forests, but only now and then do we stumble upon an entire forest of this beautiful evergreen. Specimens such as the 200-year-old male hollies on the UNC campus and in front of Carrboro's new fire station are seldom found in the wild these days.

When I do find myself in a faras-the-eye-can-see holly forest, I have a sense that I've entered some enchanted place. That's why I refer to this particular holly forest as an "enchanted" holly forest.

This one is easy to locate. Traveling west on U.S. 64, look for the gated abandoned road on the right just past the Parkers Creek arm of the lake. Park along the edge and follow the old roadbed a few hundred yards and you'll spot an old logging road on the left. Walk there and soon you are engulfed in the "enchanted" holly forest.

This year there are only a few red berries on female trees. The birds have already feasted or it's just a poor fruiting year at this spot.

Take time out of this Christmas week to discover and explore the "enchanted" forest with family and friends.
