NC COMEDY ARTS FESTIVAL COMING TO CARRBORO IN FEBRUARY

In 2001, Dirty South Improv (DSI) produced the first North Carolina Comedy Arts Festival to give audiences and students at UNC the chance to experience workshops in the art of Chicago-style improvisation. Now, 10 years later, the festival has become one of the largest comedy festivals in the nation. As it continues to grow, the festival now features talent that has been seen on Saturday Night Live, MTV, Late Show with David Letterman, Comedy Central and on stages at Upright Citizens Brigade Theatre and Second City.

The festival has added two new weeks of sketch comedy performances and film screenings and will be held at six venues throughout the Carrboro-Chapel Hill area.

Damian Hess, better known by stage name MC Frontalot, is a San Francisco-based hip-hop musician and the self-proclaimed "world's 579th greatest rapper." OFF TO A FLYING START

amie Fiocco thought she was being extra cautious in buying 150 wineglasses for Flyleaf Books' Jan. 9 grand opening, figuring that the 75 or so people she expected to attend would surely not use more than two each. But on a night in which the temperature dipped to 18 degrees, 350 guests arrived to hear Daniel Wallace and Nic Brown read from their latest, unpublished fiction.

Much of the process that resulted in that grand opening has been surprising to Fiocco and her co-owners, Land Arnold and Sarah Carr. Like the serendipitous moment in November 2008 when she answered the phone at McIntyre's Fine Books (where she then worked) and Ron Strom was on the line. Strom's 18-year-old daughter, Hannah, had urged him to find a locally owned business, ideally something like a bookstore, to go into the empty space he owned on Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. And so Strom was inquiring whether McIntyre's might be interested.

After informing him that such a store didn't fit into McIntyre's business plan, it occurred to Fiocco, for the first time in her life, that perhaps she should open a bookstore. When she mentioned the call to Arnold, her co-worker and fellow lifelong booklover, he too became intrigued. As did their friend Carr, a stay-at-home mom and veteran local bookseller, who was finding herself in need of something to do as her kids got older.

But the trio had all been in the book business long enough to know the risks involved in opening a new store in tough economic times, and were of course also mindful of the competition today from online sellers.

So Fiocco was very cautious in developing a business plan, suspecting that that process would make the impracticality of the bookstore obvious. It didn't. The partners then approached banks, half-expecting to be laughed at, and were amazed that the bankers got it – they understood that a vibrant, literate community like Chapel Hill-Carrboro would clamor for the sort of downtown bookstore it had lost with the demise of the Intimate Bookshop. The first bank they approached, BB&T, extended them a loan.

"We did pretty much everything we could to not make this happen – it just kept working out," says Fiocco.

The renovation of the space was important to the partners: They wanted the materials used to be as environmentally friendly and as local as possible. They employed local marketers, architects and designers, and bought green lighting products, though cost forced them to compromise a bit when it came to lumber.

They also had a definite idea of how they wanted the finished store to look – comfortable and vibrant, with clean sight lines. Because book covers generally are well-designed, they wanted the store to showcase those covers, rather than pack as many books as possible onto shelves.

And they knew what they wanted the store to be. To effectively compete with online booksellers, Flyleaf had to be more than a place for people to buy books they already knew they wanted. It had to be a place where readers could come for advice on books they'd never heard of, where the owners would get to know their customers' likes and dislikes and where those customers would help determine the store's inventory.

It also had to be a place where the community could gather, to participate in reading and language groups and poetry, story and craft workshops. (The space is provided at no charge to groups with a literary tie-in, though others also are welcome.)

The result, as the 350 attendees of Flyleaf's grand opening can attest, is a resounding success.
