

he bright-orange sculpture of a floating girl by artist Cecilia Lueza titled "Landing" disappeared from its exhibit location in front of the Chapel Hill Museum last week and a \$250 reward is offered by the Chapel Hill Public Arts Office for its safe return or information leading to its safe return, no questions asked. The missing sculpture is an orange-andyellow urethane form mounted on a steel pole, 6 feet tall by 5 feet wide and 2 inches thick. It depicts a girl in a dress and striped stockings jumping or floating. "Landing" was reported missing July 21. The sculpture is temporarily on loan from the artist and is exhibited as part of the 2009-10 Sculpture Visions outdoor exhibit, which places art in public places around Chapel Hill. Ask a few people what they think of Vimala Rajendran's cooking and the most common response is something to the effect of, "It's all good."

Vimala built her reputation over the past few years by word of mouth and leveraged it through a savvy bit of social networking. She took it to the masses mainly through a regular Friday night gig at Johnny's.

Now, with the opening of Vimala's Curryblssom Cafe, she's finally got a storefront, at The Courtyard on Franklin Street, and a busy one at that. The opening party on July 17 was packed and set the pace for a busy first month.

Johnny's owner Brian Plaster, who got to know Vimala's cooking during her tenure at his place, was one of those polled who had a hard time deciding.

"I can't say there's anything of hers I haven't liked," Plaster said. While he's plenty fond of

the chicken curry, vegetable dishes like eggplant, lentils and peas are still

memorable, he said.

TALES OF THE TIDEWATER

river runs through Belle Boggs' life. Actually, two rivers. One is the Haw: Boggs lives very near its waters and will be teaching English to 10th, 11th and 12th grade students at Hawbridge School, on the Haw's

banks, next fall. The other is the Mattaponi River in Tidewater Virginia, where the author grew up fishing and boating and listening to the creaks and groans of river ice in winter. Though Boggs left Virginia to live in California, New York, Durham, Washington, D.C., and Chatham County, the Tidewater area stayed with her, and has inspired her debut collection of short stories, *Mattaponi Queen*.

The stories in this collection were written over a couple of summer vacations. Though she never intended to be a teacher, Boggs became a New York City Teaching Fellow after getting an MFA from the University of California at Irvine, and found herself with a classroom of first-graders in Bedford-Stuyvesant. Since leaving New York, she's taught everything from kindergarten-to-fourth grade writing lessons to GED courses. Which left her little time to submit her stories to magazines, journals or contests. She could muster little enthusiasm for that process anyway, since her efforts at selling the novel she'd written as an MFA thesis had left her pretty disheartened. But her husband, Richard Allen, submitted the stories – without telling her – to the Breadloaf Writer's Conference Bakeless Prize 2009 competition, and they won.


Belle Boggs is a gifted writer who doesn't shy from challenges, as with her portrayal of Marcus, a young black athlete from Bedford-Stuyvesant who comes to Virginia to live with his grandmother after the other adults in his life go to prison for drug dealing. That Boggs succeeds in making this character believable, despite the vast differences between his life and hers, is tribute to her empathy, and to her substantial talent. Empathy and compassion shine throughout Boggs' stories. Because she cares about the people she describes so well, we care about them too. We root for Skinny, the alcoholic ex-drug addict, in his effort to mend fences with his kids before he dies. We find ourselves unable to condemn Jeremy's dad for getting thoroughly drunk at the Bob Dylan concert he takes his son to, or the people who steal Cutie's ancestral silver. We even (kind of) forgive Cutie her imperial grumpiness.

Since winning the Bakeless Prize, Boggs has been shortlisted for the 2010 Cork City-Frank O'Connor Story Award for the best original collection of stories published in English. Quite an honor when you consider that the list consists of only six authors. We'll be pulling for Boggs when she goes to Ireland in September. After you read *Mattaponi Queen*, you will too.



Featuring interviews with Larsson's close friends and relatives as well as leading actors and professionals from the films, the movie will be shown at Flyleaf this Saturday at 6 p.m. It's suitable for all ages.

GIMME FIVE











Ashley Melzer writes the Gimme Five! column for The Carrboro Citizen's MILL blog (carrborocitizen.com/mill/tag/gimme-five), in which she asks local bands five probing questions. Below is a selection of favorites from the column to date.

MATT DAMRON OF BRIGHT YOUNG THINGS

The Citizen: Describe your typical band practice.

Damron: Typically our practices start an hour later than they were supposed to.... Cameron, our lead guitarist, evangelizes about his newest favorite band (currently Dr. Hook and the Medicine Show) and we run through a few songs to get everyone in the right mindset. If there's a new idea, I'll play through it and ask for some insight, then we'll run with it, hoping for some lucky spark. Once we're satisfied with what we've covered (or the beer fridge is emptied out), we move on – usually to a bar.

ERIC HIRSCH OF ORQUEST GARDEL

TC: If your band were a kitchen appliance, what would it be?

Hirsch: Definitely a Cuisenart food processor. Its power is restrained by its simple design and the careful attachment of the variety of accessory parts. You can cut things up many ways, but at the end of the day you're just making salsa. And everyone likes salsa.

SETH MARTIN OF SINFUL SAVAGE TIGERS

TC: Who/what are a few inspirations or influences that might really surprise people?

Martin: The name of the band comes from a stray line in a BBC radio comedy from the 1950s called *The Goon Show* that I became obsessed with when I was 12 or so. I believe very strongly in the idea of counterweights in songwriting. If we're working in a very rural Southern genre and with folk arrangements, I wanted to have a seemingly alien point of reference for the lyrics and concepts for the songs. A lot of my writing begins with ideas or notions pulled from postwar British radio and teleplays, even if they don't end up in the finished song. Kind of like hitting a tennis ball against a backstop; it's fun to see how your ideas get thrown back at you.

SKYLAR OF SKYLAR GUDASZ AND THE UGLY GIRLS

TC: What did you dream of being when you were a kid? How'd that turn out?

Gudasz: Then, two of us wanted to be musicians. One of us wanted to be a school bus driver. One of us wanted to be an astronaut, pirate, actress, Peter Pan or a scientist who lived in Antarctica – but especially an astronaut.

Now, four of us are musicians. Three of us are/have been baristas and one of us is in school getting ready for a Real Job. All of us are pirates.

JUAN HUEVOS

TC: Describe the last time you totally jammed out to a song.

Huevos: I was working on a song with Missy Thangs and we were laying down keyboard parts. We were super hype on what we were coming up with and we couldn't stop bopping around. We haven't worked on the song since, but we were dancing our asses off.
