# CHANGES AHEAD FOR THE ARTS

fter a couple of months in search of a replacement for executive director Jon Wilner. who announced his retirement in July, The ArtsCenter found what Wilner himself described recently as "a real find."

On Aug. 24, Ed Camp stepped out of his year-long role as general manager of University Mall and into his new role at the helm of the Carrboro-based performance, studio and education center.

Camp, a Madison native and Carolina graduate, said he is delighted at the move and looking forward to playing a leading role in helping The ArtsCenter prepare for the future.

"It's wonderful to be a part of an organization that is an important part of the arts community." The arts and the community of artists and supporters, he said, are an integral part of the area.

Since landing in Carrboro, Camp says he's had a full schedule, starting with oneon-one meetings with "the team" to get a vision of their future needs and hear concerns about their respective areas.

"Right now, we're gathering information



to help us put together a comprehensive development plan," Camp said.

Part of that is consideration of an expanded board of directors and possible additional advisory boards. The center is also working on a refinancing plan for its property.

And although Camp is a fairly new returnee to the area, one of his local connections has already paid off - The ArtsCenter has started offering classes at a new spot at University Mall.

# EATER'S GUIDE

A lot's happened since last year's annual restaurant issue. But before we list some of the bigger changes and quote a few accolades, let's have a few huzzahs for what's not all that different in food around here. The most important thing that hasn't changed is, for lack of a better word, our trajectory. We're still headed in the direction of more and better local food.

A couple of the most visible examples

are the proliferation of farmers' markets and the increasing mention of local farms on restaurant menus. This is not some random

event, but the result of years of rebuilding a small-farm food economy. The success of these efforts is due in no small measure to a strong local ethic among local chefs and their willingness to go beyond just purchasing local food and actively collaborate.

This has not gone without notice outside the area; the past year was dotted with some damn impressive notice.

Late last fall, a Bon Appétit headline declared a kind of vague geographic region

encompassing Carrboro, Chapel Hill, parts of Durham and farms in Alamance and Chatham "America's Foodiest Small Town." The article not only detailed in living color the growth and invention of the local market, but delivered these effusive kudos: "Imagine a place where foodies not only have a favorite chef, but also a favorite farmer; a place where the distance between the organic farm and the award-winning restaurant is mere miles;

a place where a sustainable future is foreseeable." Not long after those words hit the newsstands, the economy tanked

and the foodiest small town in America was struggling like the rest of the pack to keep the seats filled in the dining rooms. In a lot of places, it was a long, slow summer.

# A READ ON THE LIT FESTIVAL

he just-released schedule of the North Carolina Literary Festival is a subject of some frustration for me. Since I can't be in more than one place at once, how to decide between Dorothy Allison, Elizabeth Edwards, Will Blythe and Allan Gurganus? Or Rick Bragg, Daniel Wallace, Nic Brown, R.L. Stine, Elizabeth Spencer ... The truth is, there isn't a session I wouldn't be interested in attending. And it's all a gift to the people of North Carolina, from the libraries of UNC, Duke and NC State, with additional support from N.C. Central University and many other sponsors.

The fifth in a biennial series that was started in 1998 and rotates among the three campuses, this year's festival will include 100 authors – local, emerging and nationally known. It includes a children's area for the first time, featuring *Goosebumps* creator R.L. Stine and Carrboro writer Clay Carmichael. Since the festival is funded entirely by gifts



and grants, all events are free, though keynote events at Memorial Hall require tickets obtained in advance from the box office.

For a great overview of the North Carolina literary scene, check out one



of the Sunday sessions featuring author readings from Long Story Short: Flash Fiction by Sixty-Five of North Carolina's Finest Writers. A compendium of "short-short" (less than 2,000 words) stories, Long Story Short is a fascinating portrayal of the diversity of writing talent our state has produced. Running the gamut from Russell Bank's depiction of an aging couple on a final road trip, to Bekah Brunstetter's searing monologue about a sister's reaction to her brother's Iraq deployment, to Will Blythe's quirky multiple-obituary, the stories range from witty and ironic to painfully sad. The one constant is that they're all beautifully written, and riveting.

And don't miss Carrboro's own Erica Eisdorfer, in a Saturday session with friends Allan Gurganus and Wells Tower.

Erica's novel, The Wet Nurse's Tale, made its debut last month. It's a finely crafted peek into a part of Victorian English society that is seldom on view: the lives of the wet nurses who fed the babies of both the rich and the notso-well-off. The novel's uneducated protagonist, Susan Rose, is lumpy and crude, and also smart, compassionate and very, very funny. As engaging a heroine as you're likely to come across, Susan tells the gripping story of her journey to recover the son who was taken from her as an infant. Despite her lies and schemes, readers will find themselves rooting for Susan all the way.

Festival attendees will want to line up early for Elizabeth Edwards' Saturday interview on her book, *Resilience: Reflections on the Burdens and Gifts of Facing Life's Adversities.* Though the events in Edwards' life that have demanded resilience of her are well known, fewer people know about the background that has made her a gifted writer. Three years as an English graduate student at UNC (where one of her classmates was Clyde Edgerton) engendered in Edwards an appreciation for great literature — and helped counterbalance the legal career that taught her to "write a convoluted sentence as well as anybody."

Writing comes fairly easily to Edwards, and she describes it as solace, "like weeding" – though she also acknowledges it can be a wrenching challenge. Because she wanted *Resilience* to have a conversational tone, she read every page of it aloud. She hopes the book will help those who encounter hardship and challenges to face their new reality. And if it turns out she's not around long enough to teach her children resilience by her own example, she hopes her book will be a way to give her own kids wings.

For those who miss the *Long Story Short* sessions at the festival, or just want to hear more, the 50th anniversary celebration of the Chapel Hill Public Library will feature readings from Sarah Dessen, Daniel Wallace, Lee Smith, Haven Kimmel, Michael Malone, Jill McCorkle and Will Blythe, as well as live music from the Carolina Chocolate Drops and Midtown Dickens.
