WATER FROM THE SKY

e may just exit September having notched the average rainfall for the month – all of it coming in the past few days.

The dry spell we've experienced, along with a stretch of 90-degree days that went relatively uninterrupted from June to last Sunday, made the break in temperatures all the more pleasant and revived ancient memories that water occasionally falls from the sky.

The rain-triggered burst of lush green going into fall belies some of the damage done. This has been a tough year for gardeners and growers. Many of us lost a good many plants and even a few trees.

At our homestead, the dogwood off the deck, which I've written about many times for its colorful heralding of the change of seasons, turned brown and dry a couple of months ago. At this time of year and again in spring, it was the most colorful thing in view from the windows of my

typing room. Now it is covered in damp dark leaves and serves mainly as a perch for wrens and a route to the squirrels' rooftop Acorn Festival.

This summer has taken its toll. Even those of us who traditionally revel in it took to complaining. For a few days last week, time seemed to stand still while we waited on the rain and performed various rituals – leaving the car windows down, not bringing in the laundry or the porch-furniture cushions and so on – to guarantee its arrival.

Unlike the past few months when what few storms there were seemed to split up and bypass southern Orange County, Sunday's rain was the real thing, and a good, slow

And while there was widespread disappointment that the music festival was shy a few outdoor venues, the coolness and the soaking were welcomed throughout the parched lands of the eastern Piedmont.


Also part of the revival has been the return of Festifall, which turns West Franklin Street from Graham Street to Mallette Street into an arts and music midway. See for yourself this Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m., when the festival promises another dazzling afternoon of fun for the whole family.

There'll be dozens of artists with works on display, samples from five downtown restaurants – Carolina Brewery, Vimala's Curryblossom Café, 411 West, Kildare's and Sugarland – and plenty of interesting booths to browse through.

And all day long, you're invited to do some dancing in the streets. Katherine Whalen & the Fascinators, Holy Ghost Tent Revival and salsa orchestra Charanga Carolina are the featured acts for the main stage, which is located near Local 506. Semi-Formal, The Drowning Lovers, the 18-piece Durham Jazz Orchestra and Above Gravity (the all-girl rock band and winners of the 2010 Orange County High School Battle of the Bands) perform at the Showcase Stage near McDonald's.

Park-and-ride services are available throughout the festival and parking is free at downtown lots on Rosemary Street.




REMEMBERING HALLOWEEN



END OF SEASON

Two of the happiest people The Eater has seen of late are Peregrine Farm's Alex and Betsy Hitt, who announced with big smiles at Saturday's Carrboro Farmers' Market that this was their last market of the year. There's still plenty to do, as they also grow for local restaurants. But their elation at saying

good bye to this hot and dusty season was quite evident.

For the last few markets,

Alex has been showing folks what to do with an abundance of lateseason peppers, utilizing some kind of former composting contraption and a gas burner. Whether you want to get this fancy or not, pepper roasting is a great way to hang on to those summer flavors.

PINE NUT WOES

Freezing pesto is another common way to stash away some of the season's bounty, but be aware that The Eater has heard of a handful of local cases of pine mouth, a taste disturbance experienced after eating pine nuts. 


PEPPER FESTIVAL







A TELLER OF TALES REMINDS US WHERE WE'VE BEEN

very town needs keepers of its history, especially towns that exist in a constant state of change and towns that have come to be the focus of aspiration and dreams. Those towns in particular are in need of clear-eyed historians who will notice, and point out, the worm in the apple, while also fully appreciating the apple's beauty.

So we're very fortunate to have in our midst Daphne Athas, whose just-released Chapel Hill in Plain Sight: Notes from the Other Side of the Tracks tells the unvarnished truth about an often- mythologized place. The essays in Athas' book begin with her own story of moving from a mansion in Massachusetts to a drafty, rat-infested shack "in the colored section," at the corner of Merritt Mill Road and Cameron Avenue, and go on from there to examine the lives of professor Horace Williams, writer Betty Smith (A Tree Grows in Brooklyn, Joy in the Morning) and founder of the Intimate Bookshop Ab Abernethy.

Athas elucidates the origin of the town's "Communist Hill" moniker, and

reminds us of a shameful past, when Carrboro rednecks threatened to kill novelist Richard Wright if he ventured into "their" town. She recounts the story of the rape and murder of 72-year-old Rachel Crook, a family friend and owner of a fish and nuts store in the building that now houses Crook's Corner, and then proceeds to celebrate the nearby bicycle path that now connects Chapel Hill and Carrboro.

Much of this is territory covered in Athas' highly-acclaimed 1971 novel Entering Ephesus, which is set (pseudonymously) in the Chapel Hill and Carrboro of the late 1930s and early '40s. That book's unflinchingly honest portrayal of adolescent intellectual and emotional awakening parallels Athas' own youth in Chapel Hill, beginning with her arrival in 1938. Athas sees the Chapel Hill of that time as having helped shape her development as a writer: "(B)ecause there were writers here, and because there was this marvelous spirit of inquiry, it made it exciting and much easier to follow that path. It was filled with people who were tolerant and ahead of their time."

Athas in turn helped shape the local literary landscape, both by the attention her success as a writer brought and her 41 years as a lecturer in creative writing at UNC, where Will Blythe and Randall Kenan were among many who benefited from her guidance. With *Chapel Hill in Plain Sight*, she helps to shape our sense of ourselves, as well as that of our everchanging surroundings.

Athas values what has gone before without disparaging what replaces it. She points out that, "Geography has more influence than we think. But once it has been turned into something absolutely other, the past thing is wiped out. People forget. Is that bad or good? It is both." So when asked if she regrets the many changes in Carrboro, the town in which she's spent most of her life, she quotes Edith Piaf: "Je ne regrette rien," "I regret nothing."




Readers who missed Daphne Athas' recent appearances at the Regulator and the Bull's Head still have several opportunities to meet her. Athas is scheduled



Ashley Melzer writes the Gimme Five! column for The Carrboro Citizen's MILL blog (carrborocitizen.com/mill/tag/gimme-five), in which she asks local bands five probing questions. Below is a selection of favorites from the column to date.

ROB RUIN OF WILD WILD GEESE

The Citizen: Describe the last time you totally geeked out about a song.

Ruin: As any of my friends can tell you, I was the obnoxious, music-pusher friend, cranking a car stereo and forcing passengers to suffer through whatever I was obsessing over at the time. Recently, it has been this track "Ocean City" by Kurt Vile, a warbling, stripped-down acoustic pop gem that cross fades into an ambient, spaced-out keyboard line. Two instruments, vocals, perfection.

PHIL BLANK OF GMISH

TC: What are a few inspirations or influences that would really surprise people?

Blank: Most of my inspiration comes from local traditions to which I was not "kin" but was lucky enough to experience in raw, unamplified and casual contexts. Seeing my wife sing gospel music from her youth and seeing her relationship to it was a demonstration of the emotional potential of that music and an inspiration for me to never (never never ever) try that myself. Hearing David Long play Bill Monroe-style mandolin helped me understand the blunt overpowering punch that can be in traditional music. It is something that doesn't always come across on recordings and seems to be rapidly fading. I once watched my friend Ben Hartlage listen to the Stanley Brothers and I heard the resolute male humility and regret in Carter's voice (I was always distracted by Ralph's part). I've been lucky enough to have dozens of these moments and they really gave me an ear for hearing things in klezmer and other music from the same period in history.

JOE NORKUS OF EMBARRASSING FRUITS

TC: What can listeners expect from the new album?

Norkus: Aural orgasm.... No, but seriously – there's more collaboration. Our bass player has been writing more and singing/playing guitar on some stuff. A lot of it has a more classic rock feel, mixed with the '90s sounds on some of our earlier records. We worked really hard on little lead guitar things. We recorded it to tape too, so there's a bigger, warmer sound.


