eems appropriate to use a seasonal exclamation borrowed from Dr. Frankenstein to express the general delight and surprise that the Varsity Theatre is being reanimated and could open by late November. (See Page 3 of this week's *Citizen* for more details on the turnaround for this much-missed venue.)

The quickening of the new Varsity mirrors the subtle yet definite signs of life in the downtown economy. Several new spots have opened up, filling some rather obvious and long-running GAPs in storefronts.

And while many remain worried about the liveliness of downtown (we have one friend who refers to the south side of the 100 block of East Franklin Street as "Death Row"), the addition of new retail and restaurants and evidence that major projects are moving forward seems to indicate that we are on the other side of the downturn that put so many plans and dreams on hold.

In a few years, we could see a much different picture in downtown Chapel Hill and Carrboro – from a new, expanded Kidzu atop the Wallace Parking Deck to



a new home for Cat's Cradle and an upfit to The ArtsCenter. Toss in projects along the stretch between them, like 140 West Franklin and a rebuilt and redesigned University Square, and you have the makings of a new day for the heart of both towns.

These changes will not come about without controversy and conflict. As the old joke "How many Chapel Hillians does it take to change a light bulb?" goes, there indeed will be many waxing poetic about how great the old light bulb was. And as the creature that the university, local governments and entrepreneurs have cobbled together comes to life, we expect some villagers will be fearful and a few to reach for their pitchforks and torches. But if done right, expect a good many more to return and join in reifying a dear old friend.

TOURING THE ARTS IN ORANGE COUNTY

The Orange County Artists Guild will hold its 15th annual open studio tour on Nov. 7-8 and again on Nov 14-15, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the Saturdays and noon to 5 p.m. on the Sundays. There also will be an opening reception with exhibitions this Friday at the ArtsCenter from 5 to 7 p.m.

This event offers an opportunity to get to know some of our own local artists and to see not only their art, but their methods. Browsers and buyers both are welcome. Visitors will be able to inquire about commissions for larger pieces, serials, portraits and installations. In many cases, artists allow prospective buyers to take a work home for a few days on approval.

The Orange County Open Studio Tour was begun in 1995, when Monnda Welch, a fine-jewelry maker, wanted to introduce the community to the faces behind the county's artists. Since then, the Open Studio Tour has been funded by artist member fees and donations from the community. Featured this year will be a variety of mediums, including painting, photography, prints, ceramics, along with metal sculpture, jewelry, wood and glass. Some artists make their own paper, weave cloth and work with appliqués and other fabric crafts, while others carve from stone and wood.

One of the more popular aspects of the Open Studio Tour is the opportunity to see the context in which the artist works. Just as a home may reflect the personality of those who live in it, the studios reflect the temperaments and personalities of the artists. For many, it makes the art come to life. For others, the tour offers a source of inspiration. And the craftsmen themselves enjoy the chance to talk to people and demonstrate the means by which they create.

HUES ALL AROUND



Early November is the traditional time for peak fall color season in the Piedmont. Whether it's for the gallery tour, a jaunt to Chatham or just a trip to the interstate, there are a few dozen roads that will take you both to your destination and through some of the Piedmont's prettiest countryside at the height of fall color.

If you're headed up to Hillsborough or to jump on I-85, try Orange Grove Road or pick up Old N.C. 86 in Calvander. If you're going to Pittsboro, consider the Jones Ferry Road/Hamlet Chapel Road route.

For a lovely side trip that ends up on the front porch of an ice cream parlor, we recommend heading out Dairyland Road to Maple View Farms.

If you want to see the colors up close, here are a couple of events

coming up you may want to add to your calendar:

- Fall Color Hike A guided walk through the Occoneechee Mountain State Natural Area in Hillsborough. The walk is on Saturday, Nov. 7, starting at 1 p.m. Visit ncparks. gov/Visit/parks/ocmo/main.php for more information
- Peak of Autumn Hike A guided hike through the Pennys Bend Nature Preserve. Remnant prairies and rare plants along with mature forests with spectacular color are on display. The walk, sponsored by the N.C. Botanical Garden, is on Saturday, Nov. 7 from 1 to 4 p.m. The fee is \$8 with directions and information available when you pre-register by calling 962-0522.

This is that time of year when our local farmers' markets make a shift in hours. If you're like The Eater, you might find it a bit confusing to keep up with the new hours, times and, in some cases, locations.

In Carrboro, the Wednesday market ended last week. The hours for the Saturday market

will stay put at its outdoor spot near A Southern Season.

In Hillsborough, the Eno River Market continues to operate Saturdays from 8 a.m. to noon at the Public Market House and is featuring a crafts showcase through the holiday season.

While we're on the subject of farmers' markets, please note that the Carrboro Farmers' Market is holding its seventh annual Thanksgiving Market, Tuesday, Nov. 24 from 3 to 6 p.m. The market will feature more than 25 vendors to help you get ready for the holiday. You'll find an array of items, from cheeses for appetizers to vegetables for side dishes to pre-ordered, pastured heritage-breed turkeys to cranberry relish and the pie for dessert.

PUTTING RUMORS TO REST

Ila Swain and her beloved "Genl" must finally be resting in peace, now that their legacy is no longer besmirched by the rumors that have dogged the Southern belle and her Yankee husband for almost 150 years. It's all thanks to *Undaunted Heart*, a new book by Suzy Barile, which tells the story of the Chapel Hill marriage of the daughter of UNC president David Swain and Union Gen. Smith Atkins, shortly after the end of the Civil War. And it's an enthralling tale.

Barile, great-great granddaughter of the couple, has wanted to tell their story ever since 1991, when she found two packets of letters among her late mother's effects. The letters were written by Ella Swain and other members of her family, and in them Barile found evidence that would help her dispute the vicious stories circulating about Ella and the general: that they fled North with jewelry and silver belonging to other Chapel Hillians, that Ella was disowned by her family, that UNC's closure in 1870 was due to the marriage.

That rumors would arise in Chapel Hill after the couple's engagement is understandable, given the fact that Atkins was part of the force that occupied the town after the war, and given the bitterness that war engenders among the defeated. But the real misfortune is that the rumors managed to obscure the true story of Ella and her general. Luckily for us, Barile has now succeeded in redressing that wrong in her unsentimental account of the bitter Illinois winters; the difficult separation from North Carolina loved ones; and the unrelenting pain at the loss of children, siblings and parents endured by Ella and Smith Atkins. Barile pays homage to their legacy with her portrayal of the abiding love and mutual respect that sustained Ella and the man she called her life's "greatest blessing" throughout their all-too-brief marriage.

Barile received a degree in journalism and mass communication from UNC and, after working in the newspaper business for 25 years, now teaches English and journalism at Wake Tech. Her training is evident in *Undaunted Heart*, which is well-researched and deftly written and deeply moving. All those with an interest in Chapel Hill, UNC or Civil War history should check it out.

So what's next on Barile's plate? Another of her ancestors is Richard Caswell, first governor of North Carolina following the signing of the Declaration of Independence, and Barile is working on a collection of his letters with another descendant, who's a new-found cousin. It seems history is in the author's blood.
