TOUR D'ART

Feel like tooling around Orange County in search of some great art? Want some insights into how your favorite local artists go about their work?

This month you'll have a chance to see art and the life of artists, during the Orange County Open Studio Tour.

The tour, sponsored by Orange County Artists Guild, is now in it's 16th year and includes paintings, sculpture, pottery, woodworking, jewelry, textiles, iron, glass and photography by 68 of the county's top artists.

The tour is held during two consecutive weekends, Nov. 6-7 and 13-14, with studios open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays and noon to 5 p.m. Sundays.

There also are two exhibitions, one at FRANK Gallery in down-town Chapel Hill and one at the Burnwell School in Hillsborough, for previewing the artists' work, from Oct. 29 through Nov. 15.

FRANK (frankisart.com) hosts the opening reception this Friday from 6 to 8 p.m. along with several meet-the-artist talks by Orange County Artists Guild members, including painters Emily Weinstein, Hillie Taylor and Luna Lee Ray (Oct. 28); Dale Morgan, Marilyn Strother and Eduardo Lapetina (Oct. 30); glass artist Trudy Thompson (Oct. 31); photographers Jim Haberman and Peter Filene and basket-maker Lois McAlpine (Nov. 3); and collagists Sandy Milroy and Anita Wolfendenne (Nov. 4).


SPOTLIGHT FILM

SPOTLIGHT A HALLOWEEN SURVEY



Maybe someday the grownups will squeeze all the fun out of Halloween; but until then, all you freaks (preferably of local origin) are hereby invited to cram into downtown Chapel Hill on Sunday evening Oct. 31 to gawk at each other and make some noise.

The official rules – some of them, anyway – are listed below; but in general, don't bring a big stick or a broadsword and be polite to the people dressed up as law-enforcement officers.

If you're looking for some Halloween fun but aren't into making the trek down to Franklin Street, there is plenty to do closer to home. Following are some of the highlights from the weekend's events:

CARRBORO

The Youth Performing Arts Conservatory is hosting the 2nd annual Fright Night for teens at The ArtsCenter on Saturday from 8 p.m. to midnight.

The evening features teen bands The Verge and About Gravity along with a DJ and dance party, a creepy café, a photo booth and classic horror movies all night. Tickets are \$5 in advance or \$6 day of the shindig.

On Sunday night at the Carrboro Century Center, there'll be a showing of the 1922 horror classic Nosferatu with an accompanying original score by the band Vamplifire.

CHAPEL HILL

Now remember, it's like when we beat Duke or win the East Regional, so behave yourselves and don't set anything on fire.

Since reaching a peak at 80,000 partiers in 2007, the town has moved to make this a more "homegrown" event. At the same time, it's Halloween in a town with 20,000-plus people between the ages of 18 and 22. The result is a curious mix of accommodation and restriction aimed mainly at making it difficult to get a vehicle downtown and then damn impossible to park it.

Following are a few salient points:

- This year, the town's official policy is go home early. Really. Police plan to reopen Franklin Street at midnight;
- Lane and street closures into downtown start at 7 p.m. and downtown streets will be closed to traffic at 9 p.m.;
- Vehicles parked on streets to be closed will be towed beginning at 6 p.m.; and
- No shuttle buses, but Safe Ride routes will operate

This is the official list of what you can't bring: "Alcoholic Beverages, Weapons, Glass Bottles, Paint, Fireworks and Explosives, Flammable Substances, Animals, Coolers, Items, even as part of a costume, which can be used as weapons or could reasonably be mistaken as weapons will be confiscated. This includes items made of wood, metal, cardboard or hard plastic." Sorry, Darth.

HILLSBOROUGH

Friday night features the Spirits of Hillsborough Halloween Tours through the town's haunted historic district; the annual Spooktacular for kids at the Central Recreation Center; the arrival of "Vlad the Impaler," a mysterious black cat at the Hillsborough Presbyterian Church; the Haunted Hallways of Coldwell Banker HPW on West King Street; a talk and signing with Dan Gordon, co-author of Field of Screams: Haunted Tales from the Baseball Diamond, the Locker Room, and Beyond at the Masonic Lodge; and a showing of Nosferatu with accompanying music by Vamplifire.

On Sunday, it's the 2nd annual Halloween Bash at The Myers House with Halloween memorabilia giveaways, costume contests, a carved-pumpkin contest and outdoor showings of Judith, Halloween and Trick 'r Treat. Bring your own lawn chairs, blankets and a flashlight.

SCRAPEL HILL RECEPTION

ORANGE COUNTY ARTS **GRANTS DEADLINE**

The Orange County Arts Commission has set Nov. 30 as the deadline for arts grants applications for the fall

cycle. Arts grants are available to nonprofit organizations, schools and individual artists. Fall arts grant categories include:

- Arts Program Grant up to \$1,500 available to nonprofit organizations coordinating arts projects benefiting the citizens of Orange County;
- Arts in Education Grant up to \$1,000 available to public or private schools or parent and teacher organizations in Orange County coordinating arts programs;
- Arts in Education Coalition Grant up to \$5,000 available to three or more Orange County schools or parent and teacher organizations coordinating arts programs; and
- Artist Project Grant up to \$1,000 available to professional artists coordinating arts projects benefiting the citizens of Orange County.

The fall cycle of grants will fund arts activities taking place from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31.

Applications must be turned in

by 5 p.m. at the Arts Commission office at 501 W. Franklin St. in Chapel Hill.

The rather-large TerraVITA "Grand Tasting on the Green" at Southern Village on Oct. 16 saw a nice turnout amid splendid weather.

It was a small-sample event, so lots of sweet/savory pairings on crunchy things. Of special note were the N.C. shrimp pierogies from J. Betski's chef Todd Whitney and Southport

Seafood's Jason Stegall of Raleigh and a beautiful plate of collard dolmades from chef Vivian Howard of Chef & the Farmer in Kinston.

Howard's take on the traditional stuffed grape leaves featured ginger-sage sausage with farro, pecans and cranberries neatly wrapped in lightly cooked collard leaves and served on sweet potato yogurt.

So that's how they roll in Kinston these days. Who knew?







WRITER AND MENTOR PAR EXCELLENCE

ill McCorkle grew up surrounded by storytellers. As a kid, she was very interested in her family's

"People were always talking, and disagreeing about how it *really* happened," she says.

So it's not surprising that the Hillsborough author discovered her love for writing early on, embracing it as a means of trying to capture the voices of the people around her.

But it wasn't until McCorkle left her hometown of Lumberton to come to UNC that she began to consider writing as a possible way of making a living. The guidance and encouragement of her teachers, Max Steele, Lee Smith and Louis Rubin, played a key role; Rubin's Algonquin Books published McCorkle's The Cheerleader and July 7th, on the same day, when the author was only 26. And that precocious debut was no fluke. McCorkle has since written three more novels and four short-story collections, for which she's received numerous accolades and awards.

Her mentors' influence also inspired McCorkle's career as a writing instructor. She's a professor in the creative writing MFA program at N.C.

State, and has taught at UNC, Tufts, Brandeis, Harvard, Bennington and Sewanee, which has given her her own list of published former students (including Chapel Hill author Sarah Dessen). McCorkle can well be proud of passing along "the great gift of that benefit" that was conferred on her in her student days.

Teaching does limit the time an author is able to devote to her own writing, however, which perhaps explains the scribbled notes on loose scraps of paper that McCorkle devotes herself to organizing when she can find the time these days. And it may help explain, as well, the fact that McCorkle's most recent books have been short-story collections rather than novels.

"I love to have the draft of a short story that I carry around in my purse," she says; "you can't carry around a novel."

Fortunately, McCorkle's grasp of the short-story form is masterful. Her most recent collection, *Going Away Shoes*, contains 11 stories that are mostly focused on women in difficult transitions. "PS" is a letter written by an almost-divorced woman to her former marriage counselor; "Another Dimension" is the story of a sister confronting

her adult brother about a long-ago lie; and "Driving to the Moon" concerns a reunion between a married woman and her also-married dying former lover.

McCorkle sees a happy ending as "one where a character does accept a truth or reality," so while these stories don't tend to end in a conventionally happy way, the power of their insights, and the wry humor with which they're told, make them a joy to read.

And a joy to listen to, as well. So come to McIntyre's Fine Books Oct. 30 at 11 a.m. to hear McCorkle read from *Going Away Shoes*. It'll be a delight.



McIntyre's presented another delightful event at Fearrington on Oct. 12, the Floating Island Writer's Workshop. The workshop featured a panel on cookbook publishing and asked the question: With so many recipes now available on the Internet, with iPads in so many kitchens, what's the future of traditional cookbooks? Panelists,

including Frances Mayes (author of *Under the Tuscan Sun, Every Day in Tuscany*), Andrea Reusing (chef/owner of Lantern restaurant) and Sarah Foster (cookbook author and owner of Foster's Market), concluded cookbooks can continue to thrive – as long as they have a really good voice.

Kim Sunee, the workshop's founder, pointed out that "food is very emotional and evocative," which helps explain why her plans to write a cookbook turned into a "memoir with recipes" called *Trail of Crumbs: Hunger, Love and the Search for Home*.

Mayes described the genesis of her own memoirs-with-recipes: "You can't write about Italy without writing about food." And Reusing told how she discovered she wasn't passionate about the restaurant cookbook she'd been planning to write when she realized that she was more worried about ways to feed her kids. The book she ended up writing, *Cooking in the Moment*, emphasizes recipes that anyone can cook, and comes out this spring. We can't wait.

So if you do it right, you can eliminate the middle-man and make leaps and bounds beyond conventional methods, losing very little original energy in translation.



BRIAN CORUM OF LONNIE WALKER

TC: What did you dream of being when you were a kid? How 'd that turn out?

Corum: When I was in daycare, I used to draw my own comic-book characters. I'd give them superpowers and tape four pieces of paper together to create a huge battle scene with all of them fighting each other. I was super young, but at that time I thought I wanted to be a comic-book illustrator. I also remember wanting to be an oceanographer at one point because I was so intrigued by the ocean. When I was playing hockey, I fantasized about being a pro hockey player. And when I was playing Sega Genesis all the time, I wanted to be like Sonic the Hedgehog. I used to spike up my hair as a kid so that I could look as cool as Sonic. As far as the "how did it turn out?" part, I never really ended up doing any of the previous things mentioned professionally. I also never turned into Sonic the Hedgehog, but the future is still uncertain and anything can happen.

ROB RUIN OF WILD WILD GEESE

TC: Who/what are a few inspirations or influences that would really surprise people?


