



## CHHS **Educational Grant** Connecting with Chapel Hill Students

Bob Brogden, recipient of the Society's Educational Grant in 2006-07 brought 20 of his students from East Chapel Hill High School to our May 2007 meeting. These students, part of the grant-funded project "Changes in Our Community," made videos and presentations that tracked changes in Chapel Hill over the last 30 or 40 years through interviews with long-time residents, existing oral histories and other sources of information. Topics included Traffic in Chapel Hill, the Music Scene, Black-White Relationships, Restaurants in Chapel Hill, and the Japanese influence in the area. Bob showed videos developed by the students to describe the changing patterns in Chapel Hill.

This year, Bill Melega, a history teacher at Chapel Hill High School, has been awarded the 2007-2008 Educational Grant. His students will explore connections between Hawaii and Chapel Hill's hometown heroes during World War II.
