Yogic therapy best for mentalilis

WRINKLES on the forehead of a young man were counting high. He was tense, as he felt his heart'was sinking, a pain alarmed him, as numb ness was spreading from his left arm to the heart region. He complained of "electrical sensation" and pain in head and abdomen. He was anxious about his family. This 25-year-old man (let us call him Shankar) had undergone two years of medication without much results, until he was referred to the behaviour therapy unit of Dr R. M. L. Hospital (Willingdon) where he was treated with yogic therapy, phased in four schedules followed in sequences. Eleven asanas, including Savasana one Mudra and four Pranayamas were the overall structure of the schedules.

Dr R. N. Naug, a noted behaviour therapist, who treated Shankar, said the patient was apprehensive, lest exercise may damage his heart, but in view of all clinical investigations being normal, he agreed to practise the sche-dules on trial basis. With improvement

Amongst many yogas "Hatha" yoga is prominent as ther-apeutic technique. It is conducive to health and longevity. The practice of Hatha Yoga regulates the action of heart, lungs and brain. Furthermore it promotes digestion and circulation of blood and kidney, liver and other in-ternal viscera work efficiently.

practised to control breathing and is an integral part of Yoga. Paranayama is exercised as it tends to produce calmer, deeper, and slower b reathing, resulting in steadiness of mind.

Classic Yoga began with the usher-ing in of Sankhya dialect. It says that owledge cannot by itself lead man to Mukti (emancipation). It prepares the ground, and emancipation must be conquered by sheer force. In this regard Dr. Naug explained that Yoga techniques are based on a formal system of psychobiological disciplines. In Yoga therpeutic procedure physiological techniques are followed by psychological ones. Through yogic exmental circuits can be controlled. He explained that "One can gain nothing without acting and with-out practising the lietmotive of Yoga".

Y gic physical exercises are unlike the Western technique of physical culture and does not make a pretence of merely developing the superficial musmerely developing the superficial mus-cles of the body. It thelps to tone up muscles of the body. It tunes all the involuntary organs of the body which help the process of digestion, evacula-tion, circulation, respiratory functions Yoga is mainly concerned with the to-ing up of the invisible activities of the body including the mind which re-ulates the whole body through the tricate nervous system. tricate nervous system.

Dr Naug summarised the whole pro cess of yogic therapy as he stated "asa-nas and pranayamas" are aimed at reeducation, re-conditoning and habit training which are fundamentals of behaviour therapy

Furthermore, Dr Naug cited some case studies wherein the patients suffered neurotic disorders and were cured through yogic therapy. In the cured inrough yogic therapy. In the course of therapy, I asanas were included. And those techniques were adopted from authentic sources of Yoga and writings of Sivandana, Yogendra and Rele. Dr Naug said . four schedules were made after a "... four schedules were made and a detailed study of main exercises and keeping in view the practical limita-tions of the patients in a hospital situation for learning and practice of the schedules". About food habit, moderation was adopted in order not deprive the patients their favourite food, but restrictions were put in the cases of over-eating.

Amongst the many cases referred to the behaviour therapy unit, one 43year-old Yashpal was suffering from severe weakness and debility complained of pain and aches all over and
