# A History of Events from 1959 to 2000

#### November 24, 1859

Publication, The Origin of the Species by Charles Darwin.

#### 1919

World Christian Fundamental Association is formed to oppose the teaching of evolution in American public schools.

# March 13, 1925

Tennessee law takes effect. Sometimes called the "monkey law," it provides that "It shall be unlawful for any public school teacher to teach any theory that denies the story of Divine Creation of man as taught in the Bible, and to teach instead that man was descended from a lower form of animals."

#### 1925

American Civil Liberties Union, only five years old, offers to defend any public school teacher who defies the Tennessee law.

#### July 10, 1925

John Thomas Scopes, public school teacher, goes on trial in Dayton, Tenn. for teaching evolution in a high school biology class. ACLU retains Clarence Darrow to defend Scopes. Famed orator and three-time Democratic presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan assists the prosecutor. A jury finds Scopes guilty and he is fined \$100.

#### 1927

Supreme Court of Tennessee rules law constitutional, but reverses the judgment against Scopes on a technicality, thus, preventing an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. (Scopes trial was the basis for the movie, "Inherit the Wind.")

#### 1968

Epperson v. Arkansas -- U.S. Supreme Court rules there is no secular reason for banning the teaching of evolution, as an Arkansas law had decreed. Court's decision thus raises questions about the constitutionality of similar laws banning the teaching of evolution in Oklahoma and Mississippi.

#### 1970

Institute for Creation Research (ICR) in San Diego, Calif. develops the theory for teaching the Balanced Treatment for Creation-Science and Evolution-Science.

#### 1971

 $\underline{\text{Lemon}}$   $\underline{\text{v}}$ .  $\underline{\text{Kurtzman}}$  establishes what becomes known as the  $\underline{\text{Lemon}}$  test that any law concerning religion must meet three conditions to be consistent with the Establishment clause of the First Amendment:

- 1.) Legislature must have adopted the law with a secular purpose.
- 2.) Statute's primary effect must be that it neither advances nor inhibits religion.
- 3.) Statute must not result in an excessive entanglement with religion.

# March 19, 1981

Arkansas Gov. Frank D. White (who had defeated Bill Clinton's bid for re-election in 1970) signs the ICR-sponsored Balanced Treatment Act into law after it had been introduced by a fundamentalist state senator, James L. Holsted, at the request of the Greater Little Rock Evangelical Fellowship.

# July 20, 1981

Louisiana Gov. David C. Treen signs into law the banning of the teaching of evolution after its passage by the Senate, 26-12 and the House, 71-19.

# Jan. 5, 1982

U.S. District Court strikes down Arkansas's Balanced Treatment Act as unconstitutional. But ICR and the Moral Majority of Arkansas ask attorney general not to appeal. They believe the Louisiana Balanced Treatment Act case (Aguillard v. Treen) has a better chance of surviving a constitutional challenge.

#### June 16, 1987

U.S. Supreme Court, in a decision written by Justice William J. Brennan, Jr., declares Louisiana's Balanced Treatment Act unconstitutional, writing in <u>Aquillard v. Treen</u>:

"Out of many science subjects taught in the public schools, the legislature chose to affect the teaching of one scientific theory that historically has been opposed by certain religious sects.

"The Act violates the Establishment clause of the First Amendment because it seeks to employ the symbolic and financial support of government to achieve a religious purpose."

But Supreme Court Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justice Antonin Scalia, dissent on Brennan's decision, saying their colleagues were wrong because they had "misapplied the Lemon test."

#### March 19, 1991

Supreme Court agrees to a request from President Bush's administration to re-examine the entire scope of <u>Lemon</u> test which Rehnquist and Scalia contended may be unconstitutional. In addition, Justices Sandra Day O'Connor and Anthony M. Kennedy had expressed doubts about constitutional validity of the <u>Lemon</u> test.

#### March 28, 1996

Tennessee state legislature repeats history by bringing up a bill which would confer scientific status on biblical creationism by outlawing the teaching of evolution and providing instead for the teaching of the Bible's version of human origin.

But state Senate defeats the bill, 20-13. Supporters of the bill, encouraged by their ability to get the bill out of committee promise to be back. Opponent of the bill, State Sen. Steve Cohen, agrees with their optimism.

"It's not over. This is a sample of things to come if people of tolerance don't get involved in the political process."

# August 15, 1999

The Kansas State Board of Education, proving the Thucydidean inexorability that history repeats itself, censored the teaching of theory of evolution by establishing new guidelines that no questions on evolution would be included in state standardized tests.

Thstead of banning outright the teaching of evolution in Kansas's 304 school districts, the state board of education compromised by opting to let local school districts decide what subjects should be included in their curricula.

Many biology teachers, however, publicly declared that they would continue to teach the theory of evolution in their classes until they are ordered to stop. "You cannot teach biology without including the theory of evolution," declared a biology teacher.

Kansas is one of 27 non-adoptive states that allow local school districts to purchase any books they choose, wthout restriction.

The other 23 adoption states develop lists of state-approved books from which local districts can select. Twelve southern states are among the adoption states.

In another Kansas subtle effort to skirt the creationism controversy, a small group of parents in Pratt (6,687) urged their local school board to include the book, <u>Of Pandas and People: The Central Question of Biological Origins</u> in the list of scientific textbooks.

Creationists had already tried unsuccessfully to introduce Of Pandas and People to biology book lists in Alabama, Idaho and Texas and districts in other states. But the National Association of Biology Teachers criticized the book as promoting the creation theory without including the Creator.

# September 3, 1999

In a <u>Wall Street Journal</u> Op-Ed Piece, "Creationism Lite," Thomas Petsinger, Jr., a <u>Journal</u> reporter and editor, reveals that "Practically all of history's greatest scientists were creationists: Galileo, Kepler, Boyle, Pscal, Newton, Faraday, Pasteur, [and] Kelvin. "

Even the distinguished genius of physics, Albert Einstein, once wondered: "I want to know how God created this world."

Finally, Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, a palentologist and Jesuit priest, concluded in his book, <u>The Phenomenom of Man</u>" (1955): "After close to two centuries of passionate struggle, neither science nor faith has succeeded in discrediting its adversary. On the contrary, it becomes obvious that neither can develop without the other. And the reason is simple: The same life animates both."

# July, 2000

In a state board of education election, board members who had voted to establish new guidelines that would exclude questions about evolution on state exams were all defeated by candidates who had favored including the such questions.

# February, 2000

In a national poll commissioned by People for the American Way, a liberal civil rights organization, an overwhelming majority of Americans, 83 percent, think that creationism should be taught along with Darwin's theory of evolution in the public schools.

But 79 percent of the respondents said the topic should be discussed as a belief rather than as a competing scientific theory.

Almost half the respondents agreed that the theory of evolution "is far from being proven scientifically" and 68 percent said it was possible to believe in evolution while also believing that God created humans and guided their devlopment.

"You can read the poll as half-empty or half-full," said Daniel Yankelovich, chairman of DYG in Danbury which conducted the poll.

# March 27, 2000

The latest and most reliable paleontological evidence linking man to a monkey is an <u>Eosimias</u>, the "dawn monkey," which lived 45 million years ago. "Its tiny fossilized ankle and foot bones [were] uncovered in central China beginning in 1995." So small that it could fit in the palm of a hand, <u>Eosimias</u>, according to a report in <u>Nature</u> cited in <u>TIME</u> magazine, "directly followed a significant branching of the evolutionary tree. One limb led to the prosimians, or lower primates, such as leums and bush babies, and the other to the anthropoids, or higher primates, such as monkeys, apes and humans. <u>Eosimias</u> may be the first species on the anthropoidal branch of the tree."

# August 8, 2000

In an op-ed article in <u>The Wall Street Journal</u>, "The New Fundamentalism," Gregg Easterbrook, senior editor of the <u>New Republic</u>, discussed the competing theories of the world's origins -- the **Big Bang theory** which enjoys almost unanimous support among cosmologists; the "RNA world" hypothesis (that life begins with a chemical relative of DNA); and the "intelligent design" theory that acknowledges the universe is indefinably old and that all living things are descended from earlier forms, but because it cannot be logically assumed that life created itself, some superior force provided guidance.

Easterbook deplores today's "evolutionary fundamentalism," because it "discourages students from the most fascinating question -- Why are we here?

"The obvious solution is to teach the controversy," concludes Easterbrook. "Present students with the arguments for and against natural and supernatural explanations of life, and the let them enter into this engaging, fertile debate"
