Explanatory Notes.

The summaries which follow are based solely on information relating to Japan's war potential and intentions included in reports from U. S. Milliary Attachés and Milliary Observers during the period beginning I Japanary 2007 and ending T December 1941. These intelligence documents, a descriptive estallague of which follows the yearly summaries, are represented in the Eastern Documents, Volumes 4-XV. In most cases sangiant times have been added to the documents to indicate sections pertinent to the subject.

Marginal references in the yearly summaries indicate the documents from which the information is extracted. For instance, "Fil 1" refers to the first far Mastern document. Where several sources contain essentially the same information, they are indicated in the margina but not always referred to
