(B) Copy of tentative operations. 11 Inclosures: During the recent visit of the Commander-in-12 Chief, U. S. Fleet, to Washington and on Cotober 10, the Secretary told the Commander-in-Chief that the President 15 was considering, in connection with possible retaliatory measures taken by Japan against Oreat Britain upon opening of the Burma Road, the following: 16 (a) Reenforcement of the Asiatic Fleet as a peace-time move. 18-A (b) Declaring a complete embargo on shipments to and from Japan. 19 (c) Attempting to stop all trade between Japan and the Americas. To accomplish this latter measure, he (the Fresident) proposed 20 establishment of patrol lines of light forces from Honolulu westward to the Philip-20-A pines and a second line roughly from Samoa to Singapore, "in support of" the first line. The impracticability of this and other suggestions was explained to the Secretary, 21 and, after some further conversations deal-22 ing with eventualities and at the direction of the Chief of Naval Operations, the Com-mander-in-Chief, and his War Plans Officer in conjunction with the War Plans Division 23 of the Chief of Naval Operation's office, submitted a memorandum (Enclosure A) of assumptions outlining the situation presented by the Secretary and a brief outline sketch of operations (Enclosure B) by the U. S. Fleet to meet the assumptions in a more prac-75 95 ticable manner. This was submitted to the Chief of Maval Operations on Setaber 11 for

2. To date, the Commander-in-Chief, U. 3. Fleet, has had no further word in regard to the memorandum referred to above, but received a despatch today from the Chief of Naval Operations directing that a copy be forwarded to you via the HUNDON. It is believed that further study in the Department and in the Fleet will result in some modifications in the operations proposed for the Fleet, particularly as regards distribution of patrol planes and cruisers.

3. The further operations indicated in paragraph 9 of Emolosure (B) are measures for the reduction and coupation of the Earshall Islands, or a feint in the Eid-Pacific which will be initiated when a train is assembled and transports are ready. Due to the situation in the Atlantic, the Department did not feel that our main Fleet should get too far in the acific, as it wish be necessary to call it back on short notice. It was felt, however, that active operations against ORANGE possessions might have a deterring effect on GRANGE full scale operations in the South China Sea and Butch East Indies.

4. It will be noted that the above operations marallel very closely the present OKANGE Plan, wedified by the despatch of an Advance Force to the Asiatic inffurther modified by the restriction of main First operations to the Mid-Pacific area.

time, there was discussion of assembling a train and transports in West Coast porte and holding a full dress rehearsal of operations against an stoll, as a fleet exercise, utilizing Christmas Island as a site. Steps are being taken for the acquisition and conversion of the necessary transports, etc., to be ready around that time. If this is done, the reenforcement of the Asiatic Fleet may take place coincidently with this exercise, the idea being that Japan will be impressed by this evidence of United States determination to protect its interests. I presume you will be further informed of this eventuality as plans are more fully developed.

# MEASURES AND OPERATIONS TO BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE U.S. FLEET

- 1. Mobilize U.S.fleet, in accordance with Grange Plan.
- 2. Redispose forces now in the Atlantic as follows:
  - a.Move 2 heavy cruisers and one division of 4 Old Destroyers to Southern Brazil - Vruguay, and Argentine ports, basing locally or on Falkland Islands in order to interdict ORANGE trade and protection of V.S.Shipping.
  - b.Move 2 heavy orusers, one aircraft carrier, and 4 destroyers (from Facific) to cover west coast ports of South America, basing locally or at Panama.
  - g. Move 18 Old Destroyers to Pacific for local defense and protection of U.S. Shipping as follows:-
    - 9 to Puget Sound and Alaska
    - 5 to San Francisco
    - 4 to Hawaii
  - d.Move one aircraft carrier, one light craisor, two transports, one destroyer tender, all new destroyers, one Destroyer transport, plus let Marine Brigade (now at Guantanamo), and three new submarines, and three old submarines to West Coast.
  - e.Move PatWing 5 (\_\_\_planes) with tenders to San Diego for local cosstal defense (relieve PatWings 1 and 4).

- 3. Take measures for defense of Almska as follows:
- d. Dispatch two submarines and small tender to Dutch Harber.
- b. Reenforce Marine garrison at Dutch Harbor by remainder of defense battalion, housing them in vessels chartered for the purpose.
- Dispatch one squadron (6 planes) of Patrel Pienes, plus tender;
   to Dutch Harbor, and one squadron (6 planes) and tender to Kediak.
- consisting of # CA, 1 CV, 9 DO, # AND, (Deediv 51), 1 AC, # AD. This force will reenforce U.S. Asiatic Fleet units which will have retired to this area, and will operate in donjunction with British and Dutch Naval Forces. In addition, if sent prior to the completion of readiness measures for the operation of the main body in the Mid-Pacific, it must be realised that war may result with this valuable force exposed and unsupported. The same is true of the Asiatic Fleet.
- 5. Dispatch promptly from Namaii a detachment consisting of carrier, cruisers, and destroyers to excep North Pacific waters between Hawaii and Aluetians for Jepanese commerce, or Japanese raiders. To be fitted in with mobilisation requirements.
- Assemble transports and train and embark 2nd Reenforced
  Marine Brigade in West Coast ports.

- 7. Take measures for defence of Pacific Ssiands as follows: -
- Am Reenforce MIDWAY With remainder of Defense Battulion, 2 Patrens, U OSS, 1 ASR.
  - b. Operate 2 \$5 for defense of WAKE.
  - operate 2 SS and 1 Patron with tender from JOHNSTON ISLAND, provide shall Marine listening post.
  - d. Sperate 6 VP, 1 AVP, and 2 55 for defense of CANTON ISLAND.

## ASSUMPTIONS.

- 1. The Gravity of the situation existing today is intensified by the opening of the Surma Road by Great Britain.
- 2. The Japanese announce or indicate that the opening of the Burma Road is an act unfriendly to Japan.
- 3. The Japanese undertake retaliatory measures to enforce cooperation with Japan by Great Britain in the Far East.
  - 4. Japan undertakes positive aggressive action to enforce full cooperation by the Dutch East Indies.
  - 5. The United States problaims complete embargo on shipments from the United States or United States possessions to Jupan and non-intercourse with Japan.
  - 6. The United States undertakes by diplomatic and mayal action to prevent Japanese trade, in Japanese Ships and in Ships of other nations, with the Western Hemisphere.
  - 7. The United States will support British forces in the Western Pacific, in Australia and Singapore, and Dutch Forces in the Dutch East Indies in stopping Japanese trade south of Chica Sea Colebes Sea area.
  - 8. The United States is prepared to accept war if the measures taken cause Japan to declare war.
  - 9. Great Britain will prevent any maval aggression in the Western Atlantic against the Western Hamisphere by the Axis Powers.

10. The situations and decisions by the United States assumed herein may arise 17 October, 1940.
