- 4. In what way has Roger Chillingworth changed? How is he regarded by the townspeople?
- 5. Pleading passionately to keep her child, whom does Hester appeal to for aid and sympathy? Why?
- 6. Summarize the argument Mr. Dimmesdale uses to convince the Governor to allow Hester to keep her child.
- 7. What tender incident took place between Pearl and Mr. Dimmesdale?
- 8. Read the following excerpt and explain its inherent symbolism.
- "Hist, hist! ... wilt thou go with us tonight? There will be merry company in the forest..."
- "Had they taken her from me, I would willingly have gone with thee into the forest..."
- 9. Mr. Dimmesdale comments, "... if Providence should see fit to remove [me] it would be because of [my] own unworthiness to perform its humblest mission..."
