To achieve National Board Certification as an Adolescence and Young Adulthood/English Language Arts (AYA/ELA) teacher, a candidate must earn a total scaled score on the assessment that equals or exceeds 275.

Your performance on each of the ten exercises (portfolio entries and assessment center exercises) of the AYA/ELA assessment was scored by one or more assessors. Please refer to the enclosed Scoring Guide for details. Each assessor used a scale that ranged from a minimum possible score of (1-) to a maximum possible score of (4+). For purposes of deriving the raw exercise score, scores on the (1-) to (4+) scale were converted to values between (0.75) and (4.25). Your raw score on each of the ten AYA/ELA exercises is given in the table below. Your raw score on each exercise was then multiplied by a weight. The weighted scaled scores were then summed to compute a total scaled score, and a uniform constant (12 points) was added. The weights assigned to each exercise were determined through a rigorous process, which is briefly described on the reverse side of this score report. The table below shows how your total scaled score was computed.

All candidates whose total weighted scaled scores sum to less than 275 are eligible to resubmit any individual entry in the portfolio or retake any exercise from the assessment center on which they achieved an average raw exercise score of less than 2.75. (Please note that the Sum of Scaled Scores has been rounded to the nearest whole number.) If you are eligible, those exercises of the assessment that you may resubmit or retake are marked with an asterisk(*) in the table above. A full explanation of how you can take advantage of this option is contained in the Handbook on National Board Certification, which is included in this envelope.

The weights for each exercise in the National Board assessment were set by a panel of teachers who participated in the development of the assessment and scoring system. In arriving at the weighting decision, the panelists considered the content of the assessment as a whole, the nature of the evidence available from each exercise of the assessment, the nature of inferences about a candidate's practice that would be possible based on this evidence, the authenticity of the tasks, and the breadth and depth of the relevant standards assessed by each component.

The standard for certification was determined by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Board of Directors, who considered as part of their decision the judgments made by the teachers who served as assessors, the experience gained in prior National Board decisions, and the vision of the National Board for promoting accomplished teaching.
