THE ASIDE BAR

n late January, I was on a long-awaited Florida vacation with my husband LChris enjoying some warmer climes, winter golf, and a few days to contemplate and relax. I'm a huge fan of the many pristine state parks and preserves of Florida, and we enjoyed sojourns in the places that don't appear in the tourist brochures. The 21st century fell away for awhile; away from the condominiums, the political primary that was happening that week, and all the other pasty sun-seekers like ourselves. Walking along the palmetto-flanked paths in the footsteps of Seminole Indians and Spanish explorers took us back in time, until coming to a placard on a bird sanctuary. It read:

SPECIALISTS AND GENERALISTS

It then proceeded to describe these two labels as they relate to preferences of the bird population, such as behavior, diet, and habitat. The specialist, such as the wood tern, has certain conditional requirements. They are sensitive to disruption, such as environmental or human impact, which affects their reproduction. Generalists, such as the ibis, can tolerate changing variables. As a result, generalists endure or are found in greater numbers.

Of course the mere mention of these terms reminded me of librarianship, and the fact that in this profession, we tend to be generalists in terms of subject matter. This is due to the nature of the business we are in, that can be any topic in our own discrete universe. I then began to think of it in terms of skill acquisition, flexibility, and openness to new ways of thinking. Due to the great change that the news industry is facing, this requires a great deal of adaptability, innovation, and the ability to take advantage of changing conditions.

This also reminded me of an ibis we had seen at another state park a few days earlier, which had been perched in a tree. This all made sense after reading the placard. Along with the pleasant memory, it was an important lesson to bring back to my approach to daily journalism - that generalists will survive.

We've been talking for a few years about how librarians are open to change, and how they see it as a learning experience. As we look ahead to this year's conference, I'm sure we'll be doing things we never thought we would have a year ago, or even six months ago.

So while I wish I could give you the Florida sun, instead you have this parable of the ibis.

Rather than be overly concerned about acceleration of evolution, bring this little white wading bird's better attributes to your work. And take a few minutes each day to get out from behind the computer monitor, and open your eyes a little wider to the natural world. Enjoy this Winter Issue.

Research librarian wins special award
