Toys for Tots 2005 Final Report

The year 2005 was a very good year for the TWA Toys for Tots program. It was the twentieth year that the TWA has supported the Marine Corp Reserves Toys for Tots program.

There were more than sixty members that produced just over 2,300 toys for the children in need. Many of the members attended multiple workshops as well as made toys in their own workshops.

We had an additional dimension to the program thanks to Ed Karlack who was contacted by parishioners at the United Methodist Church of Fuquay-Varian. They were loading a truck with toys to take to the Mississippi hurricane victims. We had offered a token of 100 toys, but the Marines convinced us to split our donation in half. The need for toys this year is huge. We should all feel great that we have been able to bring cheer to so many children.

It is really hard to recognize all the support we had for the program, but let me make a stab at it by listing the workshops and attendees as well as listing the individual that did work in their own workshops. (see below) It is quite possible that I missed someone because I got the word some were sneaking in and working without being

on the official "Fred" list. A special thanks to all of you that did so!

Many of the host and individual toy makers presented their work at our annual Toy for Tots show and tell social which was made more colorful by the presence of the Marine Corp members in dress blues.

It is appropriate that I give special recognition to what has become a dynasty of toy makers. Many of the "old" members remember the late Bill Eckard who was a part of the program in the early years. His wife Sue and daughter Diane quickly picked up the banner and have been active for many years. Diane was also the TWA president from 1999 until 2002. Also active in all the workshops have been Nicole and Adam, two of Diane's children.. As they have grown to become young adults their contributions have grown with them.

Our TWA dynasty not only had two scheduled workshops, but also picked up the slack when Home Depot dropped out at the last minuet. In addition to the four formal workshops other weekends were busy with help from Boy Scouts, Church friends and anyone else they could muster. This effort resulted in producing more than half the toys for the year.

I would also like to thank my unofficial committee. I called in Pete Hodges and Fred Haskin as they have not been members for a year or two but are two of the best workshop organizers I know. Cecil Raynor also stepped in to help recover the Home Depot withdrawal. Although we had to move to Diane's and Sue's workshop his organization along with Pete Hodges made the event more productive than past Home Depot efforts had been

Woodworking Symposium in Atlanta

I received the following letter from a woodworking guild outside of Atlanta, and thought I would share it with our club membership. It is close enough that several members might like to share a ride and attend.

Dear Fellow Woodworkers;

We invite you to attend the Woodworkers' Guild of Georgia 2006 Woodworking Symposium, being held April 8 & 9 2006. This is a great opportunity to associate with other woodworkers and participate in lecture/demonstrations by our speakers.

This year's symposium includes 2 very well known speakers:

- **Ernie Conover:** A man whose name is well known to a whole generation of woodworkers. He is a prolific author, with seven books, four videos and hundreds of articles to his credit. He is an award-winning craftsman, lecturer, consultant and expert witness, among his many talents. He also teaches and provides academic oversight for the Conover Workshops, a craft school founded by the Conover family.
- **Garrett Hack:** Uses his civil engineering background in designing joinery and in every way trying to design and build furniture with lightness and elegance. Garrett divides his time between making furniture - almost entirely commissions with each piece unique, writing books and articles, and teaching across North America.

Topics of discussion include:

- The Balance between Hand and Power Tools: Why you should be using hand tools in a machine age.
- How hand planes can solve your woodworking problems: Why you need a cupboard full of hand planes even though you own thirty-four routers.
- The Dovetail: Why a set of chisels and a back saw is better than a dovetail jig for anyone building furniture.
- The Mortis and Tenon Joint: Why you should make them by machine but know how to cut them by hand.
- Turbo charging your hand plane. Tuning planes and what that's all about, choosing the right tool for the task, and then getting the best work from it.
- Sharpening, what is the difference between sharp and SHARP. What are the differences between the various systems and how to get the best results.
- Scratchstocks, simple tools for sophisticated work — inlays, cockbeads, side beads, and other small moldings.
- Shaping wood with planes and spokeshaves. How to shape and smooth a variety of curves — such as a drawer face or chair leg.

This two day event includes 8 sessions, 2 meals, snacks and beverages. The price for admission is \$110 before 3/13/2006 and \$130 after. Rooms are available at the hotel where the event is being held for \$59 per night. I have included several brochures for your members who might be interested.
