Carrboro High School: A future with promise

When talk first started about a new high school for one of North Carolina's top districts for high school education, those charged with building, designing and, ultimately, operating the school faced a tough challenge.

What would the district's first 21st Century school look like and feel like?

Schools are not designed and curriculum chosen in a vacuum and so it is not surprising to see a school that is forward-looking in the way it uses technology and with a focus on a world becoming increasing interconnected and interdependent.

Like the district's other high schools, CHS will host an academy — a district-wide program that offers participants a focused leaning experience around a specific subject or course of study. Carrboro will be the home of the new International Studies Academy (see description page 6).

But Carrboro High School is much more than a step into the future, it is also an acknowledgement that a school is a community and is linked with the communities around it.

So while there was an effort made to make sure the school had the latest in environmental design and technological interconnectivity, there was also "Without a legacy, we have the opportunity to create one, to innovate, and to explore new ideas."

an effort to make sure that the students themselves were well connected as well — connected to each other, to the school and to their community.

In a growing district, with pressures to grow even faster, it was a bold step to build a small school.

"The idea is to make the high school experience more personalized," Neil Pedersen Chapel Hiil-Carrboro City School Superintendent said in a recent interview. The school was designed to hold roughly 800 students. It has dual two-story classroom wings and is designed so that a third two-story wing could be added and capacity could rise to 1200 students.

"Even at 1,200, it's a fairly small school for the Triangle," Pedersen said.

Building the community

Carrboro High is already a place where the small school ideal is taking form. Daniel Matchar, student government co-president, has spent much of his summer as an organizer for the Junior Advisory Guides — the JAGs for short. The program pairs up juniors with a group of five incoming freshmen. The older students' mission is to help ease some concerns and nervousness and help the new class find its way around the school and learn about clubs and activities that are offered.

For the past couple of weeks, the JAGs, have been contacting their assigned freshmen and Matchar said the JAGs are reporting some positive results. "I think the freshmen appreciate having another student contact them."

And, it's not just students collaborating on

Jeff Thomas: Man in motion

Around here, folks are most likely to recognize Jeff Thomas from Chapel Hill High, where he spent five years as an assistant principal. Don't expect to see too many similarities between the schools, however.

As Carrboro High's first principal, Thomas is eager to try out new ideas at the new school, and he's been brainstorming with his team to craft a vision for the school.

"We have a lot of different initiatives that we're trying here," he said.

Thomas took the reins as principal of Carrboro High last fall, and has been planning for the opening of school ever since.

It's immediately apparent that Thomas is hard-working. He gets stuff done. He's soft-spoken, gentlemanly and clearly very finely attuned to what's going on around him.

"I lead by example," he said. "I'm here every day. I work long hours.

"I try to be a good listener. I operate from the perspective that we have to have mutually respective relationships. I'm one to ask people to do things,

rather than tell people to do things."

Thomas grew up in Pennsylvania, and moved to North Carolina in 1984. He spent 15 years teaching in Wake County Schools before moving into administration as an assistant principal at New Hope Elementary in Wilson and later at Cooper Elementary in Clayton. Combining his prior experience and ingenuity, Thomas has already developed some new programs and ideas that will launch when school starts.

For example, every third Friday of each month students will take part in different activates during the last period of the day. Planned activities include student recognition assemblies, pep rallies, talent shows for faculty members and students, cultural awareness celebrations and more.

In addition, Carrboro High students will have a 25-minute period on Wednesdays that will be devoted exclusively to club meetings.

Thomas is a firm believer that student participation in extracurricular activities helps lead to success in the classroom.

But his top priority is making sure his teachers have everything they need to do their jobs successfully.

"From my perspective, the teacher's job is the most important," he said. "I try to make sure that the teachers have the needed resources and the emotional support, the physical support that they need."

"Having taught 15 years, I hope I have established a lot of credibility with the teachers," he continued. "I hope that I don't lose perspective of what it's like to be a teacher."

"This is going to be a great place. It's going to be a place that's conducive to learning. It's going to be a place to establish traditions and create history." Students, he said, will receive the

Students, he said, will receive the support they need from teachers, counselors and other staff members. "It's just going to be a really nice family place to be."

Julie Hennis: Hometown pride

When asked what she wanted Carrboro High students to know before the opening of school, assistant principal Julie Hennis didn't talk about schedules or academics.

"I'm hoping that we can instill a sense of pride," she said. "Giving them a sense of something to be proud of."

She reiterated: "I would like for [the students] to take pride in the school."

Hennis seems relaxed on the eve of the opening of the new school. it's the ninth hour of a planning session for the opening of school and she shows not a hint of anxiety.

More importantly, she seems like someone a 15-year-old could comfortably sit down and talk with.

Perhaps her easygoing manner stems from strong roots.

Although Hennis was new to the

Chapel Hill-Carrboro school district last year, she's no stranger to the area. She grew up in Chapel Hill and graduated from Chapel Hill High in 1979. After graduating from Meredith College, she moved to Southern Pines, where she spent 18 years raising her family. She spent time in the restaurant business, then became a high school English teacher.

Education work clicked for Hennis, and she pursued a career in school administration.

"I wanted to be someone who can help not just the children, but the teachers," she said. "I taught, and I know what it's like when you feel like someone's listening to you."

While Hennis worked toward getting her master's in school administration, something was drawing her back to Chapel Hill.

"I just missed a lot about what was here," Hennis said. "The culture that's all around, the diversity."

She returned to Chapel Hill in Au-

gust of last year and worked as assistant principal at Chapel Hill High until February, when she accepted the assistant principal position at Carrboro High.

"I wanted to see what it was like to start a school from the ground up," she said. "I thought that it would be a good opportunity."

So today she's moving furniture, picking out fabrics and planning for the arrival of the students in August.

Hennis said that once the school year starts, one of her goals is to make sure that teachers and other staff members are involved in the decision-making process.

"Once it works for them," she said, "I'm sure that it will work for the students."

PTSA to focus on community

This year at Carrboro High, teachers, students and parents alike will band together to form the school's inaugural Parent-Teacher-Student Association.

Carrboro High PTSA members have been especially busy this summer, working to craft a vision for the association while recruiting new members, planning events and writing newsletters.

"First impressions are so important," said Mitch Strobin, PTSA president. "We all want to come out of the gate in a positive way."

Strobin — who has three kids, one who will be a 10th grader at Carrboro High this year — said because the group is brand new, there are high expectations, but at the same time the group is starting from a clean slate.

"We're a new school. We have no legacy," he said. "That's a great opportunity."

Strobin added that he knows, though, that there will be challenges.

"Clearly we need to do some level of fundraising to support the programs," he said.

"We have the opportunity to be very unique and try new things. The thing that I'm keen on is innovation."

The PTSA already has several projects in the works, including a few that, according to Strobin, will be different than those at other schools. For example, the association has been working with the Carrboro High athletic booster club to plan a Carrboro High family tailgate party before the home football game against Cedar Ridge High School on September 14.

The PTSA also has planned the school's first open house, which is scheduled for September 27.

"We are very focused on community," he said, adding that he wants to get the Carrboro community involved with the school.

The association has already published its first newsletter, which will be distributed electronically once a week.

Strobin is ready to roll, encouraged by the level of support he perceives: "There's a lot of excitement, a lot of motivation."

School to host Academy of International Studies

To enhance the depth of high school education, the Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools has adopted a system of academies with concentrations in areas like heath science, social justice, information technology, business and finance, performing arts and international studies. Carrboro High School will be home to the district's International Studies Academy. Following are the district's introduction to the academy concept and an outline for the CHS academy.

What is an academy?

Academies provide a small learning community that focuses on quality instruction around a theme. Teachers work collaboratively to design and teach courses in order to create a community where students feel a sense of purpose, direction, security and contribution to the greater good.

How do students become a part of an academy?

Freshmen and Sophomores may participate in academy extracurricular opportunities and introductory courses. Students may apply to an academy in their Sophomore year of study in order to become academy members as Juniors and Seniors Applications are available online and in school counseling offices.

The International Studies Academy at Carrboro High School

The International Studies Academy prepares students to live and work in the increasingly small but diverse world. By analyzing different cultures, languages, world issues and business practices, students learn to successfully apply their education and skill sets in a global economy. Emphasizing a relevant approach to learning with seminars, in-depth research, service learning and guest speakers, students are involved in a rigorous course of study and develop strong professional relationships.

Academy study equips students for further study or employment in a variety of areas including: international business and sales; bilingual interpretation; environmental consulting; media and communications; foreign service or military service; intelligence and security; US Government and politics; international trade and shipping; economics; world languages education; and tourism.

GREEN FEATURES AT CHS

Carrboro High School will be the district's first building to apply for LEED certification from the U.S. Green Building Council. Included in the design for CHS are a number of energy and resource saving measures including:

• Rainwater collection system to provide water for flushing toilets or watering athletic fields;

• Daylighting throught the building (Many classrooms will be bright enough for academic work, even on cloudy days, without a need for additional lighting);

• Sensing switches that turn off lights in classrooms not in use;

- Reflective roof surfaces;
- Energy efficient heating and cooling systems.

The 162,185 square foot school will have an initial classroom capacity of 800 students. Core facilities — media center, cafeteria, gym and commons — have been designed to accommodate 1,200 students.

The design includes space to add an arts and auditorium wing near the main entrance and a third academic wing that would bring classroom capacity up to 1,200 students.

Strike up the band

Long before school had even started, Carrboro High School marching band members were busy learning how to make music together. The band has been practicing since mid-July, sometimes playing through the sweltering heat on the fields at Culbreth Middle School.

"The kids have been working really hard," said band director Frank Jones. "It's going extremely well."

Jones comes to Carrboro High from Johnston High School in Johnston County, where he taught music. Jones is also a freelance trombonist and teaches private music lessons.

Musically inclined Carrboro High students will have several options, including marching band, concert band and jazz band. In addition, Jones said he would like to start chamber groups as the band program grows.

He said he has high expectations for the band program, adding that about 25 kids are already involved with the marching band, which will perform at all home football games and possibly one or two away games. It's not too late to join the band, and Jones encourages interested students to contact him.

"This band program is establishing it's own identity," Jones said. At this point, what's important is "setting a really, really good foundation and building a strong band program."

Toward that end, the Carrboro High band booster club is already hard at work. Darryl LeBlanc, president of the club, said about 10 to 12 parents are already involved and they expect

more will join once the school year has begun.

"We really want to support the music programs however we can," LeBlanc said; "everything from fundraising - a big part - to passing out water bottles at band camp."

LeBlanc encouraged anyone who wants to support the music program to join the club. Parents and guardians are eligible to join as voting members for free and others are welcome to join as non-voting members for a small fee.

"We want to see the band members develop as musicians, learn about working together and accomplishing goals as a group, and have fun," LeBlanc said.

ideas for the new school.

In his opening letter in the inaugural edition of the school's Parent-Teacher-Student-Association newsletter, PTSA present Mitch Strobin noted that encouraging collaboration between parents, teachers and students is an important part of building a strong community. He notes that the opportunity to do so is unique. "Without a legacy, we have the opportunity to create one, to innovate, and to explore new ideas."

Going for the green

CHS also promises to be one of the greener schools around, with a number of energy and resource saving features like a highly efficient heating and cooling system and a series of cisterns to collect rainwater for irrigation and flushing toilets.

The location of the school itself is also aimed at saving energy.

The addition of a high school completes a loop for those residing on the southern side of the district. When Scroggs Elementary came on line, it greatly increased the number of students who could move through elementary and middle school and still stay close to home. Now with CHS, southern Carrboro and Chapel Hill offers a preK-12 education within a little more than a one-mile radius. The result should be reduced travel times, lighter cross town traffic and more high schoolers within walking and biking distance to school.

The location also means more possibilities for after-school participation and more opportunities for mentoring between students.

There's another practical side as well with the schools being able to more easily share resources. That was evidenced this summer when the practice fields at Culbreth Middle School became the proving grounds for the Jaguar marching band and sports teams.
