

FOREWORD:

- 1. Order of Battle information is vital to the Military Intelligence Service. This information received from many agencies scattered all over the world is carefully pieced together in the Order of Battle Section, Military Intelligence Service, in order to present to the combat commands of the United Nations the best possible estimates of the enemy situation. The decisions which involve the lives of thousands of American soldiers are based at least partially on Order of Battle intelligence.
 - 2. Order of Battle information is classified under two headings:

"Order of Battle - Strength"
"Order of Battle - Location"

3. "Order of Battle - Strength" is a careful tabulation of all of the units in the Axis Armies, and of those organizations of the other services, the Navy, and the Air Force, which operate with the field armies. An analysis of this information reveals:

Organization of enemy units
Composition of enemy units
Detailed identification of enemy units
Principles of employment (composition of special task forces)
Total strength of Axis armies
Strength of various arms of Axis armies
Changes in tactical or strategical procedure as evidenced by changes in organization.

- 4. This intelligence officers handbook, "The Order of Battle of the German Army", is published from the "Order of Battle Strength" records. This text enables the unit intelligence officers in combat to identify the enemy forces with whom they are engaged. Also included is all of the known information on organization, history, the names and qualifications of the commanders and staff officers, the composition, the insignia, and the combat characteristics of the enemy units.
- 5. "Order of Battle Location" gives the disposition of German units, and includes all information as to actual unit locations, movements, concentration areas, and changes in organization, equipment, and armament. A study of the dispositions, the terrain, and fortification activity, combined with a knowledge of enemy tactical and strategical procedure, will enable intelligence officers to assign priorities to enemy capabilities.
 - 6. The mission of the Order of Battle is:
 - a. To provide a sound basis on which military decisions may be made;
- b. To make available to intelligence officers in the field all information that will assist them to perform their duties efficiently.



- 7. The following constitute Order of Battle information:
 - a. Identifications of enemy units;
- b. Names and qualifications of enemy commanders and staff officers promotion lists published in papers are a good source;
 - c. Dispositions (locations of enemy units);
 - d. Movements:
 - e. Concentration areas;
- f. Types of units: the location of Panzer or tank units, mountain units, artillery concentrations, and other arms of offense is especially important.
- g. Insignia: This includes personal insignia, unit insignia, decorations, and the like. Sketches showing dimensions and colors are very helpful.
- h. Military symbols and abbreviations: These are necessary in order that captured maps and documents may be translated.
 - i. Captured maps, documents and other written material.
 - j. Maps of all kinds, especially new ones.
 - k. Lines of communications (changes in railways, canal systems, etc.)
- 1. All information on mobilization: Case history of individuals, especially when they are typical, is of great assistance. Observe the promotion rates for senior commanders for indications of an expansion.
- m. Armament: Watch for new weapons, or modifications of standard weapons.
 - n. Organization of enemy units (especially for particular operations).
 - o. Casualties.
- p. Auxiliary units (labor units, truck-driver or labor-service formations, etc., which operate under military jurisdiction).
 - g. Terrain.
 - r. Climate and weather.
 - s. Uniforms (particularly changes).
 - t. Types of personnel (with particular attention to specialists).
 - u. Special kinds of training.
 - v. Changes in equipment: For example, a new canister for gas masks.
 - w. Boundaries of zones of action, or sectors.
- x. Interest of Axis sources in special maps or special kinds of maps (indications of such interest are likely to occur in neutral countries).
 - y. Any special Axis staff activity.
- 8. The information outlined in paragraph 7 applies to air and naval units as well as to land organizations, especially those units which operate with the field armies.
- 9. Order of Battle information should be transmitted to the Military Intelligence Service as quickly as possible. If it arrives too late, it belongs to still another classification, "Order of Battle Historical".
- 10. Information pertaining to troop dispositions, identifications, movements, or anything which points toward a radical change in enemy procedure should invariably be cabled. Detailed information of all kinds, such as names of staff



officers, new insignia, description of fortifications, and lists of military abbreviations and map symbols, should be sent by air mail. If sufficiently important, a summary of detailed information should be cabled at the time of mailing.

- 11. Where the means are available, the location of enemy units should be posted by means of pins on mounted maps. This procedure assists greatly in evaluating Order of Battle reports at the information-collecting agency.
- 12. Well kept records of the data submitted by the various sources of information will enable the intelligence agencies to evaluate the reliability of the sources. This is important because some of the Axis powers intentionally plant false information (sometimes mixed with known reliable information) for our intelligence agencies to report.
- 13. The minute details are important. Some of these may have considerable significance when compared with information from other sources.
- 14. Officers and agencies should evaluate the Order of Battle information they receive and indicate their opinion of its reliability. The Order of Battle Section may not have any other means of evaluating the report.
- 15. Where practical, the source of the Order of Battle information should be indicated. If it is not desirable to mention names or sources in cables or reports, a list of code names to represent them can be transmitted to the Military Intelligence Service by secret letter.
- 16. As far as possible, exploit sources which are not available or known to representatives and agencies of the other United Nations.
- 17. Personalities are important. For example, the appearance at Gibraltar of Oberst (Colonel) Mikosch, the German Commander who captured Fort Eben Emael and who later broke the Maginot Line near Saarbrücken, may be extremely significant.
- 18. All Order of Battle information is normally classified confidential, unless for some special reason a particular message or report should be classified secret.
- 19. Intelligence officers expecting to be in combat with German forces should have the following texts in their possession:

The Order of Battle of the German Army
TM 30-450 Handbook of German Military Forces (a revised issue will
be ready for distribution about January 1, 1943).
TM 30-255 Military Dictionary (English-German; German-English)





Intelligence officers should be certain that they have a complete set of German military symbols and military abbreviations in their possession in order that they can read and interpret the meaning of captured maps, tables of organization, orders and other dispatches. Intelligence personnel should be able to read the German script.

- 20. All Order of Battle information on the German armed forces will be included in this text. The original issue is the basis for other information which will be distributed in the form of revision sheets as it becomes available. This volume is so bound as to facilitate placing in a loose-leaf binder.
- 21. The subject matter of this text has been initially divided into seven parts. Part A is devoted to a brief discussion of the main features of the German High Command, with particular reference to the High Command of the Army. Part B deals with the basic structure by which the German Army is maintained in the field, and Part C contains classified lists of its component organizations, adding details of their commanders (where known) and histories. Part D consists of lists of miscellaneous units of the GHQ pool, given as far as possible according to the German classification of arms of the service, with an alphabetical index of the types of unit in the form in which they are likely to be found in documents. Part E gives lists, arranged alphabetically within ranks, of senior officers of the German Army and also of the German Air Force (since the titles of the latter are indistinguishable, except in the case of full generals, from those of army officers). Part F gives a brief account of the SS, Police and other semi-military organizations, insofar as they may be found operating with the German forces in the field. Part G, to be issued later, will be a detailed list of all German units which have been identified to date. It will include all of the information which was originally issued in the book "Order of Battle of the German Army" (pink book) now obsolete.
- 22. Parts A to F of this text include the material for a detailed study of the German military system and the units which comprise it. Part G is a ready reference list of all of the German units which have been identified and will be of more immediate use for the identification of German units in combat.
- 23. Errors, corrections, or any suggestions for the improvement of this text should be sent directly to the Evaluation and Dissemination Branch, Military Intelligence Service, War Department, Washington, D. C. Constructive comment will be greatly appreciated.

PART A

I. INTRODUCTION.

- 1. In Germany the Army is both by tradition and of necessity the predominant service. But under the Nazi regime the need for the closest cooperation between all three services has been met by the creation of a Defense Ministry (Oberkommando der Wehrmacht, abbreviated O.K.W.—see Section II below), which controls all matters of inter-service policy and directs the conduct of the war, leaving to the service ministries the detailed working out of purely military, naval or air force matters.
- 2. Under this system, Army, Navy and Air Force are regarded as branches of a single service, the Armed Forces (die Wehrmacht). For operations, units of one often come under the immediate command control of another. Similarly, senior officers may be transferred in the same or equivalent rank from one service to another. For an explanation of the system of command and the use of the task force, see the Order of Battle of the German Army.
- 3. In effect, therefore, the German High Command is divided into four parts, as follows: -

Defense Ministry (Oberkommando der Wehrmacht, O.K.W.)
War Department (Oberkommando des Heeres, O.K.H.)
Navy Department (Oberkommando der Kriegsmarine, O.K.M.)
Air Department (Oberkommando der Luftwaffe, O.K.L.)*

As regards the general direction of the war, the O.K.W. is supreme, while the O.K.H. is responsible for all purely military matters.

- 4. In war time, each department is divided into two echelons. An advanced echelon (consisting of C in C, the Chief of General Staff, and the bulk of the General Staff) moves out to its war station, the location of which depends on the theatre of operations selected for main attention; while the rear echelon remains in Berlin.
- 5. The object of the department divisions is to leave the C in C and his staff as free as possible from the administrative matters which necessarily obtrude themselves in the ministry in Berlin. Such matters are entrusted to a senior officer, directly responsible to the C in C (see Section IV), while the advanced echelon is able to concentrate on the control of the forces in the field. The advanced echelon of the War Department will be referred to as Army GHQ and the rear echelon as War Department in the present work.



II. THE DEFENSE MINISTRY

- 1. HITLER himself is Minister of Defense and Commander-in-Chief of Germany's Armed Forces. His deputy, in both capacities, is Field Marshal Wilhelm KEITEL, who as such is decribed as Chef des Oberkommandos der Wehrmacht— in effect, Deputy C in C.
- 2. The General Staff of the Defense Ministry is known as the Wehrmacht-fuhrungsstab, abbreviated W.F.St. (Armed Forces Operations Staff). The Chief of this staff, General Alfred JODL, is believed to be HITLER'S principal adviser on strategy and planning.
- 3. KEITEL is HITLER'S chief guide on all inter-service matters, professional head of the whole Defense Ministry (including departments concerned with the coordination of production, supply and manpower) and controller of the three fighting services (for his authority over the army, see Section III below), JODL, as his Chief of Staff, has the dual function of immediate control of the W.F.St. and general supervision of the whole of the Defense Ministry.
- 4. Under JODL, the W.F.St. is divided into sections entrusted with particular functions. The most important of these sections is the Joint Planning Staff, under Lt Gen WARLIMONT, which is responsible for all strategical, executive and future operations planning—functions which are excluded from the scope of the three service ministries.
- 5. The war station of the O.K.W. is known as the Führerhauptquartier (i.e., HITLER'S GHQ). During the Polish campaign it was situated between Berlin and the Polish frontier, moving to the Rhineland for the campaign of 1940 and to East Prussia for the early stages of the attack on the U.S.S.R.
- 6. The O.K.W. selects the commanders for all operations, and decides what forces are to be allocated to them. It may give an officer of one service general authority over all three services within a particular area. In such cases Wehrmachts- will form part of his title (e.g., The GAF General CHRISTIANSEN is Wehrmachtsbefehlshaber or Armed Forces Commander in Holland. In a lower echelon, a Wehrmachtsnachrichtenkommandantur is a signal command the personnel of which is provided by more than one of the three services).
- 7. One section of the O.K.W. is solely concerned with inter-service communications. It provides a special network of land cables and maintains special channels for radio communications between HITLER'S GHQ and the Hq of army groups and armies, and the principal Hq of the German Navy and GAF. For this purpose it has at least two army signal regiments, which carry the distinguishing title of Führungs-Nachrichten-Regiment (see Part D). Other army or GAF signal units may come under its control.
- 8. The personnel of the W.F.St. and of the O.K.W. generally is drawn from all three services, but the army has the largest representation.



III. ARMY GHQ

- 1. Army GHQ, to which the advanced echelon under von BRAUCHITSCH (then C in C) moved from Berlin on mobilization in 1939, was originally distinct both in name and in place from HITLER'S GHQ. In consequence, however, of the supersession of von BRAUCHITSCH by HITLER himself in December, 1941, the two headquarters have now (it seems) been combined.
- 2. Field Marshal KEITEL is now Deputy C in C of the O.K.H. as well as of the O.K.W. In this capacity he has as Chief of Staff Col Gen Franz HALDER, who is regarded as an exceptionally able and self-effacing officer (for that reason he seldom appears in the news), and the main organizer of the German Army.
- 3. Under HALDER, the advanced echelon is divided into two parts, which correspond to the intelligence and operations and administration and supply groups on the staffs of German units. The intelligence and operations part (O.K.H. Genstb.d.H. High Command of the Army, Army General Staff) is subdivided into departments under Deputy Chiefs of General Staff (Oberquartier-meister, abbreviated OQu). OQu I is Director of Operations and OQu IV Director of Intelligence. OQu II (Training), OQu III (Organization) and OQu V (Historical), it is believed, remain with the rear echelon (see Section IV).
- 4. The head of the administration and supply group is known as the Generalquartiermeister (abbreviated Gen Qu). His function is to control, under the general direction of the C in C and C of S, all questions affecting the administration and supply of the armies in the field (but not in Germany itself, which comes immediately under the War Department).
- 5. Until recently General PAULUS (now commanding the Sixth Army) was OQu I. It is not yet known who has succeeded him as Director of Operations. The Director of Intelligence is Maj Gen MATZKY, formerly German Military Attache in Tokyo, who succeeded Lt. Gen v. TIPPELSKIRCH as OQu IV in the spring of 1941. The General quartiermeister General Eugen MÜLLER, a former OQu III and Commandant of the Staff College, has held the post of GenQu since the beginning of the war.
- 6. Army GHQ is responsible for the operations of all army forces in the field, under the direction of the O.K.W. It exercises that control through army group Hq or army Hq, not only by the normal chain of command but also through the General Staff Corps.
- 7. The German General Staff is at the same time a corps, to which officers may be permanently transferred from their original arm of the service, and a staff (at GHQ, with an echelon at the War Department in Berlin) the personnel of which is drawn from that corps. In consequence, the Chief of the General Staff, though immediately in charge of the staff, is also head of the whole corps and all General Staff Officers are responsible to him wherever they may be serving.

- 8. The number of GSOs is strictly limited (for a list of those known, see Part E). The rule holds good that a GSO has authority over all other officers holding appointments on the same staff, even though some of them may be senior to him in rank. For example, in each of the two sections of Military Intelligence, prior to the outbreak of war, the Head of Section was a Major, General Staff, and the officers subordinate to him included colonels on active duty.
- 9. The small number of GSOs at unit Hq may be shown best by some concrete instances. In November, 1941, there were only five GSOs at Hq of the Panzer Army of Africa (C of S, G-2, G-3, "Chief Quartermaster" and "First Quartermaster"). The subordinate African Panzer Corps included two only (Chief of Staff and G-3, and there were five GSOs between the three German divisions.
- 10. Not only do GSOs look to the C of GS as the head of their corps, but they have the right, and in certain conditions the duty, to report directly to him. In particular, the chief of staff of an army corps or any higher unit is in duty bound to report to the C of GS in writing, any major difference of opinion between himself and his commander. In such a case, the commander takes responsibility for the course of action decided upon, and the chief of staff complies to the best of his ability, but his opinion is on record.
- 11. It follows that the C of GS at Army GHQ, is kept in very close touch with the course of the war. But if he thinks it necessary he may go further, and send a GSO as special liaison officer to army group or army Hq, with the duty of sending daily direct reports on the course of events (if necessary, from personal observation, if sufficient information is not available at unit Hq) either by courier or by telegraph.
- 12. It is a commonplace that German commanders and chiefs of staff are expected to use their initiative. Individual responsibility for action is the German precept which officers of all ranks are required to observe. But Army GHQ is enabled, through the system outlined above to keep in the closest touch with the course of operations, and so to direct their subsequent course with full knowledge of the situation.

IV. THE WAR DEPARTMENT

1. On mobilization, when the advanced echelon of the War Ministry moved out to its war station at Army GHQ, the rear echelon, including all War Department branches and the whole basic structure (described in Part B) was placed under the command of a senior general, with the title Chef der Heeresrüstung und Befehlshaber des Ersatzheeres, commonly abbreviated to Ch H Rü u. B d E. The importance which the Germans assign to this office, and the system which it involves, may be measured by the fact that its holder, General Fritz FROMM, was promoted Col Gen and decorated with the Knight's Cross of the Iron Cross on the conclusion of the campaign in the West in 1940.




- 2. Under Col Gen FROMM are the Directors of Training and Organization (OQu II and OQu III), with the portion of the General Staff which remains behind in Berlin, and the main War Department branches.
- 3. The most important of these is the Allgemeines Heeresamt, abbreviated AHA (General Army Office), which controls all aspects of training, draft of personnel and supply within what may for convenience be termed the Home Command, both through specialist groups and through the inspectors of the different arms of the service similar to our former chiefs of branches. The present head of the AHA is General Friedrich OLBRICHT.
- 4. All matters concerned with the production of armaments and equipment are handled by the Heeres-Waffenamt, abbreviated WaA- (Army Ordnance Office), at present under General Emil LEEB (a younger brother of Field Marshal Ritter v. LEEB). The Heeresverwaltungsamt, abbreviated VA (Army Administration Office), under Lt Gen OSTERKAMP, is mainly concerned with those aspects of military administration which are assigned to officials (Beamten)—pay, rations, postal services, etc.
- 5. The Heeres-Personalamt, abbreviated HPA (Army Personnel Office) is set apart from the other sections and comes immediately under C in C, Army. Its head is General KEITEL, younger brother of the Field Marshal. This branch is responsible for the proper listing and promotion of all officers, and for the appointment of all except GSOs (who are appointed by the Central Department of the General Staff—Genstb.d.H./GZ), though appointments of officers to various specialist arms are made on the nomination of the heads of those arms.
- 6. As will be seen in Part B, the work of the War Department is considerably lightened by a large degree of decentralization to the military district Hq. Policy is laid down, and plans are drawn up, in Berlin, but much of the detailed work is left to the district Hq.
- 7. As Chef der Heeresrüstung (Head of Army Equipment), Col Gen FROMM is responsible for the provision and design of equipment of all kinds, both for the armies in the field and for all troops stationed within the area of the Home Command. As Befehlshaber des Ersatzheeres (Commander of the Training Army), he is responsible for the training system described in Part B, and in addition he command s such organizations or units of the field army as may be sent to Germany to rest or be reorganized.
- 8. He is also partially responsible for certain areas of occupied territory, in which training divisions and replacement training units are stationed (e.g., Denmark, Holland, Belgium and eastern France). The custom which has developed of forming new divisions in France has involved a further expansion of his sphere; but the military commanders in those countries are not subordinate to him.

PART B

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. The Germans try to relieve commanders in the field of as much purely administrative work as possible, and to provide as regular a flow as possible of trained recruits and of supplies to the field army. The method which they have adopted is the separation of the field army from the "Home Command" (to coin a convenient short title), and entrusting the whole charge of training, draft of personnel, supply and equipment to that command.
- 2. The German system is described in outline in the following paragraphs with special reference to the provision of recruits for the field army. Such parts of the organization as do not relate to that function are not referred to, but it should be noted that the provision of equipment (for example) is organized on similar lines.

II THE MILITARY DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

- 1. Germany is subdivided into seventeen military districts (there were only fifteen at the outbreak of the war), which in peace time contained the Hq and subordinate formations of the active Infantry Corps carrying the same Roman numerals (e.g., II Infantry Corps has its peace-time Hq at Stettin, in the II Military District). The military district is a territorial administrative command similar to our former corps areas. Many of its functions are identical to those of the corps areas. For a map of the Military Districts see Order of Battle of the German Army.
- 2. Before the war, there were also four Motorized Corps—XIV, XV, XVI and XIX—(in effect, staffs to control the organization and training of armored and motorized organizations) which had no corresponding military districts, but were served (as regards personnel and supplies) by the districts in which corps Hq or subordinate units had their peace stations.
- 3. In peace time, the commander of the Infantry Corps was also commander of the Military District; but because he was destined to take his corps into the field, his chief concern was to develop and maintain the fighting efficiency of the troops under his command. All administrative matters, therefore, were





assigned to the charge of a Second-in-Command or Deputy Military District Commander (General z.b.V.)—normally a general officer whose health or age rendered him unsuited for further active service in the field, while his seniority and experience qualified him for a post of great responsibility.

- 4. On mobilization, the commander of the Infantry Corps departed with his corps to join the field army, and thereupon the Second-in-Command assumed direct command of the military district. His staff was composed of reserve officers who lived near the Military District headquarters and who understudied their opposite numbers in peace time. These reserve officers worked out the details of the mobilization plans and have carried them into execution. The provision of trained draftees to all units of the field army mobilized in that district is one of the special concerns of the Deputy Military District Commander.
- 5. These units include the active units of the peace-time army which moved out with the active Infantry Corps and, in addition, all units formed on or after mobilization in the military district in question. To illustrate this point, a military district which contained the peace stations of three divisions under one corps staff might mobilize as many as four corps staffs and twelve or fourteen divisions for the field army.
- 6. It may be noted that at present the average age of the Deputy Military District commanders is about 64, while that of the known commanders of army corps in the field army is 54.

III WAR DEPARTMENT CONTROL

- 1. The War Department in Berlin retains close control over the whole system, but as much detail work as possible is decentralized. In general, policy is decided in Berlin, and the military districts are allowed a large measure of freedom to work out the plan decided upon.
- 2. All questions of supply, draft of personnel and training are directed by the "Head of Army Supply and Commander of the Training Army," who is in effect both:
- a. head of the rear echelon of the High Command of the Army (the advanced echelon being at Army GHQ), controlling all War Department sections on behalf of the C in C,
- b. specially concerned with the provision of drafts and equipment for the field army.
- 3. Under him, training and draft of personnel (including any reorganization of units temporarily withdrawn for that purpose from the field army) are looked after by the General Army Office of the War Department which issues such instructions as are necessary to the military districts.






1 4. The directives issued by the General Army Office insure uniformity of results. An additional assurance is provided by special staffs, under that branch, which keep close watch on any special program (such as the conversion of infantry to motorized or armored divisions), as well as by the Inspectors of the different arms (similar to former chiefs of branches), who supervise the training of units of those arms throughout Germany.

IV CONTROL OF MANPOWER

- 1. Within the military district, the supervision of manpower (from civil life into the armed forces, within the armed forces and back to civil life) is entrusted to Inspectors of Recruiting, each controlling an Area. For military districts the population of which is relatively small, one Area suffices, but others are sub-divided into two, three or (in two cases) four areas. The Inspector is a Major General or Lieutenant General, similar in his qualifications to the Deputy Military District Commander. He has the status and disciplinary authority of a divisional commander*.
- 2. Each Area is subdivided into Sub-Areas, which cover the area of a greater or lesser number of urban or rural local authorities, and are commanded by Lieut Colonels or Colonels, selected from the same class of officers whose suitability for active service in the field has ceased. They have the status of regiment commander.
- 3. As regards manpower, the duty of the Areas and Sub-Areas is to provide recruits to the replacement training units on such scale as may be called for by Berlin, and to select suitable officers and trained personnel to fill vacancies in the War Establishments of all units mobilized by the Military District concerned—in each case acting on instructions received from the Military District Hq.
- 4. An example will illustrate this point. When the 33d Infantry Division was being transformed into the 15th Panzer Division in the XII Military District during the autumn of 1940, its horses and the personnel which cared for them became superfluous, while the complete mechanization of the units selected for conversion involved the need for many NCOs with motor transport experience. Berlin laid down the use to be made of the bulk of the personnel and horses freed by the conversion (in this case the majority of the NCOs and men concerned were incorporation in the newly formed 129th Infantry Division); but the XII Military District disposed of the balance among its own units.

^{*} He is not necessarily a soldier. Some appointments of this type are given to senior officers of the German Navy and GAF the manpower for which is provided by the same organization.





- 5. Within the Military District, the training of recruits is entrusted to a parallel system in the Areas and Sub-Areas. The training system involves Replacement Training Divisions (normally two to each Military District) and Replacement Training Regiments(a varying number under each Replacement Training Division). The Germans place great emphasis on combined training. The various replacement training battalions are tentatively organized into regiments and divisions for this purpose. These units, called Replacement Training Regiments and Replacement Training Divisions, also have administrative functions.
- 6. The commanders and subordinate officers are largely drawn from the category of officers passed over for further service in the field, but there are a number of experienced officers drawn from the field army who in due course may return to it again.
- 7. Each Replacement Training Regiment supervises such replacement training units as are assigned to it (there is no constant number of such units), and provides drafts—as directed by the Military District through the Replacement Training Division—for one or two specific divisions of the field army. The subordinate replacement training units are affiliated to specific units of those field army divisions.
- 8. It should be noted, however, that this system (like most German systems) is not a rigid one, and affiliations may be changed if necessary. Thus the III and XII Military Districts specialize in training troops for service in Libya, and a unit originally mobilized in one of the other Military Districts will have its affiliation transferred to a replacement training unit in the III or XII on its departure to Libya.
- 9. Replacement training units are provided on a scale described in some detail in Section VII.

VI SUMMARY

- 1. It will be seen, therefore, that the German system involves decentralization to Military Districts of a maximum of administrative detail. Units of the field army are administered by the appropriate Military Districts and not by the War Department directly.
- 2. The provision of personnel and the training of recruits, are arranged by the Military Districts through Replacement Training Divisions and Replacement Training Regiments, which have the sole function of supervising replacement training units assigned to their charge.
 - 3. Following is a diagram of the organization of a Military District.



VII DRAFT OF PERSONNEL

THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF

1. The provision of trained drafts for divisions of the field army (in this context known as Felddivisionen) is organized through a system of special training staffs and units: -

Ersatz-Division Nummer . . (e.g., Div. Nr. 182): Replacement training division—a staff responsible for the supervision of training within part of a military district (Wehrkreis).

Infanterie-Ersatz-Regiment, abbreviated Inf.Ers. Rgt. or J.E.R. Infantry training regiment—a staff responsible for the administration of the replacement training battalions and companies which provide drafts for one or two specific divisions of the field army.

Artillerie-Ersatz-Regiment, abbreviated Art. Ers. Rgt. or A.E.R. Artillery training regiment—a staff responsible for the administration of artillery and artillery observation replacement training units within part of a military district.

Ersatz-Einheiten: Replacement training units (see the following paragraphs).

Marschbataillon z.b.V., abbreviated Marsch-Btl.z.b.V.: Personnel replacement transfer battalion—a nucleus of officers and enlisted men provided by the training division, to conduct trained replacements from the military district to the theater of war.

Feldersatzbataillon, abbreviated Feld-Ers.Btl. First line or forward reinforcement battalion—normally stationed in the rear areas which receives personnel replacements from the Marschbataillon and gives them further training until they are required by the division on the establishment of which the Feldersatzbataillon is shown.*

Feldersatz-Division: Field reinforcement division—a staff responsible for the administration of forward reinforcement battalions in the rear areas of a front on which extensive operations are in progress.†

2. Notes on the main features of the system are given in the following paragraphs. American terms are used as far as possible, on the basis of the military terms used above.

^{*} If casualties are heavy, there is no period of waiting, and the Feldersatzbataillon too becomes a personnel replacement transfer battalion.



VIII REPLACEMENT TRAINING UNITS: THE ORIGINAL ALLOTMENT

1. Every unit of the field army received replacement personnel as necessary from a replacement training unit stationed in the military district in which it was originally formed. The replacement training unit carried the same number as the field army unit to which it supplied personnel. In general, the replacement training unit was one degree smaller than the affiliated unit in the field army (for each regiment a replacement training battalion or equivalent unit, and for each non-regimental battalion or equivalent unit a training company). But there were two replacement training battalions for each regiment of the active (i.e. peace-time standing) army, and a training battalion in place of a company for each peace-time non-regimental battalion. This allotment of replacement training units may be made clearer by some concrete examples:-



- 2. Specialist sub-units (such as infantry gun cos, infantry AT Cos, mounted infantry platoons, etc.) were supplied with personnel on the basis of one replacement training sub unit per division, carrying the division number, and serving the corresponding sub-units in each of its regiments. For example, in the case of the 22d Inf Div the 22d Inf AT Repl Tng Co provided personnel for the 14th (AT) Cos of the 16th, 47th and 65th Inf Regts.
- 3. All replacement training units serving the division infantry regiments were controlled by an infantry training regiment which carried the same number as the division. Thus the 22d Inf Training Regt at Oldenburg controlled all replacement training units of the 22d Inf Div. Artillery training regiments were provided on a lower scale, one for each division of the peacetime army. Thus, the 22d Arty Replacement Training Regt controlled the training of personnel for both the 22d and 269th Inf Divs.
- 4. In general, at this stage, a replacement training unit of the same number served each unit of the field army, and the identification of either justified the assumption that the other existed. Similarly, an infantry replacement training regiment and an infantry division of the same number could be mutually inferred.*

^{*} There were one or two exceptions, e.g. the 157th Inf Replacement Training Regt served the 57th Inf Div.



IX SUBSEQUENT DEVELOPMENTS

- 1. The above system has undergone substantial modifications, especially after completion of the initial expansion program (August 1939—January 1940), when the proportion of replacement training to field army units was reduced. Some of the original replacement training units were transferred to the field army, receiving new numbers (161st-164th, 167th-170th, 181st, 183d, 196th-198th and probably 199th Inf Divs were formed from such units). In consequence, there are now many infantry regiments without similarly numbered replacement training battalions, and one infantry training regiment will usually supply personnel to two divisions of the field army.
- 2. Again, in some cases infantry regiments of the field army have been disbanded, or converted to motorized infantry, but their original replacement training battalions still exist under numbers which now have no field army counterpart. A new series of infantry replacement training regiments has recently been identified, carrying numbers in the series 601 and upwards and so corresponding to no divisions of the field army.
- 3. The result of these changes has been to complicate the detailed study of the replacement supply structure, but the following notes give a general outline of the system now in force.

X THE PRESENT ALLOTMENT

1. Panzer divisions.—Personnel for the motorized infantry brigade of the Panzer division are controlled by a motorized infantry replacement training regiment (Schützen-Ersatz-Regiment, S.E.R.) Those for the remaining division units are directly under training division or artillery training regiment. There is one motorized infantry replacement training battalion for each pair of regiments, one motorcycle replacement battalion for each pair of Panzer divisions, and there are also specialist replacement training companies under the replacement training regiment. Thus, the 5th and 11th Panzer Divisions of Wehrkreis VIII have the following replacement training structure under the 85th mtz Inf Replacement Training Regt:

13th Mtz Inf Repl Tng Bn (serving 13th and 14th Mtz Inf Regts of the 5th Pz Div),

110th Mtz Inf Repl Tng Bn (for 110th and 111th Mtz Inf Regts of 11th Pz Div)

55th Mtrcl Repl Tng Bn (for 55th and 61st Mtrcl Bns),

85th Sig Repl Tng Co and

85th Gun Repl Tng Co (for the specialist sub-units of 5th and 11th Mtz Inf Brig).



- 2. *Infantry divisions,—One infantry replacement training regiment may serve one or two field army divisions. The three infantry regiments of a division are usually served by two replacement training battalions. Similarly, a replacement training unit is likely, in most cases, to provide personnel for two units of the field army instead of only one as in accordance with the original system.
- 3. In general, it is intended that replacement training units should be permanently affiliated to specific field army units (for example, a proportion of the officers of the replacement training unit will have seen service at the front with the field army unit, and convalescent soldiers are attached to a Convalescent Co—Genesenden-Kompanie—of the replacement training unit before returning to the field). In times of stress, however, the system becomes less rigid.
- 4. If very heavy casualties are sustained by organizations in the field, the Replacement Training Command is called on for larger drafts than can be provided without improvization. In such cases, all the available men from each Wehrkreis are formed into personnel replacement transfer battalions, which receive either very high numbers (e.g., 2021) or double numbers (e.g., XIII/12—the twelfth battalion of a series provided by Wehrkreis XIII), and the men may be transferred from these battalions to whatever unit needs them most, even though its proper replacement training units are stationed in a different military district in Germany.

XI REPLACEMENT TRAINING UNITS IN OCCUPIED TERRITORY

- 1. In certain cases, the Germans have been able to effect a considerable economy in manpower by moving the replacement training units from one or more military districts into occupied territory, where they can combine training of recruits with assisting in maintaining internal security.
- 2. 1939-1940.—After the close of the Polish campaign, all replacement training units from Wehrkreise V,VI and XII were transferred to the Protectorate and to Poland (where the two new military districts XX and XXI had been formed).
- 3. 1940-1941.—After the Battle of France, the above units returned to their original districts, and replacement training units from Wehrkreis I (East Prussia) moved into the Protectorate. About the same time, many of the replacement training units from Wehrkreis X were transferred to Denmark, where Repl Tng Div No 160 (one of the two training divisions of Wehrkreis X) replaced a division of the field army.
- 4. 1941-42.—Once the attack on the U.S.S.R. had begun, the East Prussian replacement training units were brought back to Wehrkreis I from the Protect-
- * The replacement training structure for motorized, light and mountain divisions is similar to that of infantry divisions, with suitable modifications of detail.

orate, where their place has been taken by units from the adjoining military districts(IV, XIII and XVII). At the same time, most of the replacement training units from Silesia (Wehrkreis VIII) were transferred to Alsace-Lorraine, where they come under the administration of Wehrkreise V and XII. During recent months, replacement training units under the control of these two military districts have been moved still further west into France proper, so that a corresponding reduction in the field army forces in Eastern France has been effected.

- 5. In cases where the replacement training units are absent from their home district, the recruits from that district report, not at the unit replacement training center but at a central Wehrkreis-Ersatz-Depot, from which they are conducted in groups to their replacement training commander.
- 6. Trained recruits arriving in small groups from the Home Command are sent to a Frontsammelstelle (Front Assembly Point), which distributes them to the units where they are required.



XII MILITARY DISTRICTS (Wehrkreise)

The following section outlines the essential facts concerning the military districts of Germany, i.e., the commander, units mobilized, geographical structure and basic training organization. American terms are employed for convenience throughout, except in the case of area and sub-area Hq, where place names are given in their German form as they will most commonly be encountered in German documents. Where a more familiar form exists this follows in parentheses and underscored.







XIV THEATER OF WAR

1. In the theater of war the place of the Wekrkreis organization is to some extent taken by the L of C area command. Each army group has a Befehlshaber des rückwärtigen Heeresgebiets, and each army a Kommandant des rückwärtigen Armeegebiets (Commander of Army Group L of C area, Commandant of Army



L of C Area), whose main task is to supervise the administration of the L of C so that the army group or army commander can concentrate exclusively on the course of operations.

- 2. The commander of army group L of C District has the additional charge over "Sicherungs" (L of C) units--specially organized divisions and regiments formed to undertake "mopping-up" operations in the rear of the combat zone. He is also in charge of such administrative Hq as may be set up within the area assigned to him, and of all guard units and supply organizations of the GHQ pool stationed within the area.
- 3. His functions, therefore, correspond very closely to those of the military commanders of occupied countries and on the close of active operations he may in fact remain as military commander over the country or portion of a country which he has hitherto commanded as an L of C District.
- 4. The functions of the army L of C area commander are less wide, and his status compares more closely with that of the area commander within an occupied country.

PART C

I INTRODUCTION

- 1. This Part consists of classified lists of German units from army groups down to divisions, with the names of their commander (where known) and particulars of their composition, followed by brief notes on the campaigns in which they have taken part.
- 2. In the case of divisions, units the number of which can be deduced with certainty are included, even though they may not yet have been identified. English instead of German terms are employed for the different types of unit—in both cases the departure from the principles adopted in the text, "Order of Battle of the German Army," is deliberate, in order to make this Part of greater utility to the reader who is not a specialist, and who wishes to see, at a glance, the composition of any particular German formation. The latter book will serve as an index to the various units which are given under their divisions only in the following lists.
- 3. It should be noted that the ages shown in brackets after the names of commanders are those reached in 1942.
- 4. A German task force is a military force composed of the necessary arms and services under one commander for the accomplishment of a definite mission. Standard German organizations, such as divisions, corps, and armies, are the frameworks around which task forces are formed. Thus, in almost every case, the composition of a German unit in combat will be different, particularly in the larger organizations from the divisions upwards. The German method of organization for combat may be illustrated by the following diagram.
- 5. It must be emphasized that under the German system, command is extremely fluid and the Order of Battle of higher formations is liable to change from day to day during the course of active operations, in accordance with the needs of the immediate situation. Armies may be transferred from one army group to another, corps from army to army, divisions from corps to corps, and units of the GHQ pool from one formation to another. In particular, there is no standard equation such as "2 divisions=1 corps" or "2 corps=1 army."

PART D

I INTRODUCTION

A COMMENT OF THE PROPERTY OF T

- 1. In Part D the principal units of the GHQ pool are described as far as they are known. They are listed as far as possible according to the German classification (e.g., under Infanterie or Landesschützen-Einheiten, Sections II and XIV below). The only deliberate departure from that system has been to place the various types of parks at the end of the sections which they serve (e.g., Heergeräte-Park at the end of Section III below), instead of in a single group among the administrative units (Section XVI below) to which they are formally assigned.
- 2. For division units and corps troops, reference should be made to the current issue of "Order of Battle of the German Army".
- 3. There is one unit which defies classification, and must, therefore, be described here, namely Lehr-Regiment Brandenburg z.b.V. 800 (800th Brandenburg Special Mission Demonstration Regt). This unit was formed on the outbreak of war as Bau-Lehr-Bataillon 800) (800th Construction Demonstration Bn), and expanded to a regiment during the summer of 1940. Its home station is at Brandenburg (Wkr. III), where its recruits are trained, but detachments from it may be encountered wherever German forces are operating. Its primary function is sabotage (whether by companies, platoons or individuals). Its personnel contains a high proportion of Germans who have lived abroad and speak foreign languages fluently. Different companies of the regiment specialize in preparation for operations in specific countries. Its members often operate in civilian clothes, in some cases dropping by parachute in enemy-occupied country. Though they hold military rank, the unit is under the direct control of the Intelligence Branch of the Defense Ministry (O.K.W. Abwehr) as regards its policy and organization.
- 4. The following table gives an alphabetical list of the types of units described in PartD, with references to the sections and paragraphs under which they will be found. In this list, the most usual German abbreviation are employed. For the expansion of the abbreviation, and an American equivalent, reference should be made to the place in which it is described.



II INFANTRY (Infanterie)

White piping, the distinguishing color of the infantry arm, is also worn by Landeschützen units, Army AAA battalions and companies (but not batteries, which wear red--see Section V), and certain administrative units (see Sections X, XIV, and XVI). For division infantry reference should be made to the current issue of Order of Battle of the German Army. The following paragraphs outline various miscellaneous infantry units which may be encountered.

- 1. Infanterie-Lehr-Regiment (Infantry Instruction Regt). This regiment is normally stationed at the Infantry School at Doberitz (Wkr.III), providing demonstrations of tactics and carrying out experiments with new infantry weapons. It performs the same function as the 29th Infantry in connection with the Infantry School and the Infantry Board. It is possible that it may be found, in whole or part, on active service in the field.
- 2. Infanterie-Regiment "Grossdeutschland" (Greater Germany Infantry Regt). In peace-time this regiment was stationed in Berlin. It is a corps d'elite, its personnel being drawn from all over Germany. After a period of service in it, the personnel were normally promoted and transferred to other units. It is fully motorized, and includes a number of companies not found in the normal infantry regiment-reconnaissance, armored assault guns, antiaircraft and signal. In addition it has an artillery battalion, a heavy smoke company and its own supply columns. Recently, it was enlarged to a motorized division. This unit should not be confused with the SS Regiment Deutschland (in SS Div Reich). Identification: Gothic "GD" woven on the shoulder strap.
- 3. Sonderverband 288 (Special Unit 288). This is a small, self-contained group consisting of a Hq Co and 8 Cos as follows:

1 Rifle?	5 AT
2 Mtn Rifle	6 AAA
3 Rifle	7 Engineer
4 MG	8 Signal



The 5th Co includes an armored assault gun platoon and an armored car platoon. There are in addition (unnumbered), a medical detachment and a supply echelon. The unit was formed in the summer of 1941, and has seen service with the Africa Panzer Army.

4. Führersbegleitbataillon (Führer's Escort Battalion). This unit was formed after the Polish campaign, from picked personnel, to serve as Hitler's escort in the field. It is fully motorized, and consists of a Hq and three Cos as follows:

1 Wach (Guard) 2 Schnelle (Mobile) 3 schwere Sicherungs (Heavy Protective)

In addition, it has a supply column.


- 5. Infanterie-Bataillon z.b.V. (Special Duty Infantry Battalion) . An army Hq may have an independent, fully motorized infantry battalion for special duty (not at present definable). Units of this type so far identified carry the numbers 100 and 500.
- 6. Sicherungs-Regiment (mtz) (L of C Regiment). In addition to a number of converted infantry divisions, commanders of army group L of C areas have at their disposal, in some cases, special mopping-up regiments, which are controlled either by "Sicherungs" (L of C) division staffs or by special brigade staffs. Units of this type are numbered in a separate series (4 is the highest number so far noted), and have special war establishments, including cyclist companies and MT echelons. Identification: Latin "S" with an Arabic number on shoulder strap.
- 7. Jagdkommando (Raiding detachment). During the winter of 1941-42, a number of units of this type were formed for service on the Russian front. They are numbered in a separate series (5 is the highest number so far reported).
- 8. Maschinengewehr-Bataillon (mtz)(MG Battalion). For a list of identifications see Order of Battle of the German Army. MG battalions may be incorporated, for a greater or lesser period, in an infantry division, or employed as GHQ troops.
- 9. Heeres Infanterie-Geschutz-Kompanie or schwere I.G.Kp. (GHQ, Heavy Infantry Gun Co). Ten or twelve units of this type, numbered in the series 701-, have been identified. They are most commonly found attached to the mtz infantry brigade of a Panzer division. They are equipped with 150 mm (5.91 in.) guns mounted on Pz.Kw. II chassis.
- 10. Versuchs-Bataillon (Experimental Battalion). Details of the composition and station of this unit are not yet available.
- 11. Sonderbataillon (Special Battalion). This is a penal unit, to which soldiers guilty of certain offenses may be transferred. It was formed in the winter 1941-42 and sent to the area of Army Group North.



12. Infanterie-Park (Infantry Equipment Park). Each army has an infantry park, carrying a number selected at random from the series 501. The officers wear the color of their arm, but other ranks wear light blue piping, in each case with the Arabic number of the park.

It should be noted that the mtz infantry of the Panzer divisions are classified as Panzertruppen (see Section IV).

The following figures show the tactical signs for infantry units:-



Note: A complete list of German military symbols is in the process of preparation.

III CAVALARY (Kavallerie)

Yellow piping is the distinguishing color of the cavalry (including horsed and partly horsed cavalry regiments and cyclist battalions). It is also reported to be worn, in place of pink, by units of the 24th Panzer Division (recently formed by conversion of the former 1st Cavalry Division). It is worn by reconnaissance units (with the exception of the Panzer reconnaissance units of Panzer and motorized divisions, which wear copper-brown), which receive their personnel from the cavalry depot units. The following types of unit may be encountered apart from the division reconnaissance units (for which see Order of Battle of the German Army).


- 1. Kavallerie-Lehr-Abteilung (Cavalry Instruction Battalion). Stationed at the Cavalry School at Hannover (Wkr. XI), but potentially available for service in the field.
- 2. Aufklärungs-Lehr-Abteilung (Reconnaissance Instruction Battalion). Likewise stationed at the Cavalry School.
- 3. Kavallerie-Brigade (Cavalry Brigade): The former 1st Cavalry Division contained two cavalry brigades, each probably of two cavalry regiments. It is possible that there may still be a number of independent cavalry brigades in the



GHQ pool.

- 4. Kavallerie-Regiment (Cavalry Regiment, part mechanized) and Reiter-Regiment (Cavalry Rgt, horsed). For a list of identifications see Order of Battle of the German Army.
- 5. Radfahr-Abteilung (Cyclist Battalion): Some division reconnaissance units have been reorganized recently as cyclist battalions. In addition, there are some (numbered in the series 401-) in the GHQ pool, which may be found operating in the spearhead of the attack. The cyclist battalion includes a motorcycle company, so that motorcyclists may still be seen wearing yellow piping.
- 6. Heeresgeräte-Park (Heavy Transport Equipment Park). One such park with each army (excluding Panzer armies), serving its heavy transport columns as well as cavalry units. Such parks are numbered on the same principle as infantry parks, the officers wearing the color of their arm and other ranks light blue piping with the Arabic number of the park.

The following figures show the tactical signs for cavalry units:-



IV ARMORED TROOPS (Panzertruppen)


Tank units and antitank battalions wear pink piping, the latter with the addition of the letter "P" on the shoulder strap. Motorized infantry wear grass green, and Panzer reconnaissance units and motorcycle battalions copper brown. For division units see Order of Battle of the German Army. In addition the following types may also be encountered.


1. Panzer-Lehr-Regiment (Tank Instruction Regt). This regiment, stationed at the Tank School at Wünsdorf (Wkr. III) consists of I and II Tank and III Antitank Bns. Like other demonstration units, it is potentially available for service in the field.



- 2. Panzerabteilung Flammenwerfer (Tank Flame Thrower Bn). The GHQ pool includes a number of independent flame thrower tank battalions (series 100-) which will normally be found employed under Panzer corps in the spearhead of the attack.
- 3. Non-division tank units. The GHQ pool also includes a number of independent tank regiments and battalions, which may be found either under Panzer corps or under Panzer brigade staffs, or on occasion supporting or assigned to infantry divisions.
- 4. Schwere Panzerjäger-Abteilung, S.Pz.Jg.Abt. (Heavy Antitank Bn). Among the GHQ antitank battalions, several are classified as heavy. Such units are equipped in some cases with 75 mm (2.95 in) antitank guns, and in others with 88 mm (3.46 in) antiaircraft guns for use in an antitank role. The 75 mm gun in such cases, is on a self-propelled mount, while the 88 mm weapon is either tractor drawn or on a SP mount. Other GHQ antitank units are equipped with the 47 mm (1.85 in) gun (SPM) which is rated as a medium caliber weapon.
- 5. Eisenbahn-Panzerzug, E.Pz.Zug (Armored Train). Numbered in series 1-50 (half a dozen identified to date). The personnel wear pink piping with the letter "E" on the shoulder strap.

The following figures show the tactical signs for units in this category:-






Red is the color of the artillery arm, including armored assault artillery and army AAA batteries. Artillery observation (sound and flash ranging) units and survey and mapping units are distinguished, in addition, by the Gothic letters "B" or "V" as the case may be. For lists of identified artillery and artillery observation units, and for the employment of GHQ artillery, see Order of Battle of the German Army. The following paragraphs describe various miscellaneous artillery units which may be encountered.

- 1. Artillerie-Lehr-Regimenter (Artillery Instruction Regts). There are three of these regiments, all stationed at the School of Artillery at Jüterbog (Wkr III). No 1 is horse-drawn, No 2 mctorized (including an armored assault artillery battery), and No 3 consists of artillery observation, survey and mapping, range-finding and balloon battalions. Portions of one or more of these regiments may be found serving in the field from time to time.
- 2. Heeresflak-Lehrabteilung (Army AAA Instruction Bn). Stationed at the Army AAA School in Wkr. II but available for service in the field.
- 3. Heeresflakabteilung (Army AAA Bn). Units of this type carry numbers in the same series as GAF AAA units (see paragraph 1 Section XVII and Order of Battle of the German Army). Twelve have been identified to date. The battalion consists of three heavy batteries equipped with 88 mm (3.46 in) guns and two batteries of 20 mm (0.79 in) guns, and is fully motorized.
- 4. Sturmgeschutz-Abteilung (Armored Assault Gun Battalion). Numbered in the main artillery series. Fifteen identified to date, with numbers ranging between 177 and 244. The battery consists of Hq Btry and three six-gun batteries equipped with 75 mm (2.95 in) guns on SP mount.
- 5. Sturmgeschütz-Batterie (Armored Assault Gun Battery). No 665 and 667 identified.
- 6. Vermessungs-und Karten-Abteilung, V.u.K.Abt. (Survey and Mapping Units). These units belong to the GHQ pool, from which they may be allocated to army groups or armies. One is numbered 501, and the remainder carry numbers in the series 601-(about a dozen identified to date).
- 7. Ballon-Batterie (Observation Balloon Battery). In addition to the balloon sub-units of the artillery observation battalions, the GHQ pool contains some independent balloon batteries numbered in series 100-.
- 8. Velocitäts-Mess-Zug, Vo.Mess-Zug (Velocity Measurement Platoon): Numbered in series 501-.
- 9. Astronomischer Mess-Zug (Astronomical Survey Platoon), Numbered in series 701-.



- 10. Wetter-Peilzug (Meteorological Platoon): Numbered in series 501-.
- 11. Armee-Kartenlager (Army Map Depot): Carrying numbers from the series 501-, allotted arbitrarily.
- 12. Artillerie-Park (Artillery Equipment Park). One to each army, carrying a number from the series 501-, allotted arbitrarily. The officers wear the color of their arm, and other ranks light blue, in each case with the Arabic number of the park.

VI SMOKE TROOPS (Nebeltruppen)


Smoke troops wear maroon piping. They include the following types of unit, all belonging to the GHQ pool. Changes of establishment and nomenclature of units are now in progress. Where alternative designations are given the second can be taken as being in process of superseding the first.

- 1. Nebel-Lehr-Regiment (Smoke Instruction Regt). Stationed at the Army Smoke School at Celle (Wkr.XI), but liable to serve in whole or in part at the front.
- 2. Regimentsstab der Nebeltruppen or Nebelwerfer-Regiment z.b.V. (Smoke Regt Staff). Regimental staffs to control smoke battalions in action, numbered in series 1 upwards.
- 3. Nebelwerfer- or Werfer-Regiment (Smoke Regt). Regiments with Hq and three battalions (numbered I-III). Series 51-54 and 70 identified to date.
- 4. Schweres Werfer-Regiment (Heavy Smoke Regt). Also, probably, consisting of a Hq and three battalions. No 1 is at present the only one identified.
- 5. Nebelwerfer- or Werfer-Abteilung (Smoke Battery). Independent battalions which in action may be controlled by smoke regimental staffs. Series 1-8 identified to date.
- 6. Nebelwerfer-Batterie or Werfer-Batterie (150 mm Werfer 41) (Smoke Battery or Heavy Smoke Battery). Independent batteries equipped with the 150 mm (5.91 in) smoke projector. No 151 has been identified.

- 7. Gebirgs-Werfer-Abteilung (Mountain Smoke Battalion) A unit of this type is known to exist, but no identification has been made as yet.
- 8. Entgiftungs-Abteilung (Decontamination Bn). Also equipped for service as a contamination battalion. Series 101-103 identified to date.
- 9. Strassenentgiftungs-Abteilung (Road Decontamination Bn). Similar to the foregoing type in its functions. No 132 has been identified.
- 10. Gasschutz-Gerätepark (Antigas Equipment Park). One to each army, allotted numbers at random in the series 501-. Officers wear the color of their arm, other ranks pale blue, in each case with the Arabic number of the park.

VII ENGINEERS (Pioniere)

Black, the distinguishing color of the engineer arm, is also worn by various other units of similar type as outlined below. In such cases, a distinguishing letter on the shoulder strap will show what type of unit is in question.

1. General; Without Qualification.

For the employment of engineers in the GHQ pool, and for a list of identifications, see Order of Battle of the German Army. The following are the principle types of unit which may be encountered:

- a. Pionier-Lehr-Bataillon (Engineer Instruction Battalion). Nos. 1 and 2 are stationed at No 1 Engineer School (Pionier-Schule 1) at Dessau-Rösslau (Wkr. XI). There is also a Pioner-Lehr-Bataillon z.b.V. at Offenbach on Main (Wkr. IX), which specializes in mining and similar activities. These units may also be found serving in the field.
- b. Pionier-Regiment z.b.V. or Pioner-Regimentsstab (Engineer Regt Staff). Some twenty have been identified, carrying numbers selected from the series 501-700. Such staffs are used to control engineer battalions, bridge trains and, if need be, construction units of the GHQ pool under corps or army.

- c. Pionier-Bataillon z.b.V. (Engineer Battalion Staff). Nos 300 and 750
- units.

 d. Pionier-Landungskompanie. (Engineer Landing Co). Equipped with

assault boats with outboard motors. No. 778 has been identified.

have been identified. These consist of staffs controlling independent engineer

- e. Sturmbootkompanie and Sturmbootkommando (Assault Boat Co, Detachment): No companies have been identified as yet, though they are known to exist. The detachments carry numbers in the series 901-.
- f. Brückenkolonne or Brüko (Bridge Train): In addition to the bridge trains which form part of the division and GHQ engineer battalions, there are two series of independent bridge trains in the GHQ pool. One series, carrying numbers in the range 401-450, consists of units of two trains (e.g., 1/403, 2/403) which operate independently. The other series, in the range 601-700, consists of single trains. All are fully motorized.
- g. Technisches-Bataillon (Technical Battalion). These battalions, supplied with personnel by the Technical Depot Battalion at Pirna (Wkr. IV), are intended for such specialized functions as the production and treatment of mineral oil for coal mining and the like. They are numbered in series 1-50 (a dozen examples identified to date).
- h. Pionier-Park (Engineer Equipment Park). One to each army, allotted numbers at random in the series 501 upwards. Officers wear the color of their arm, other ranks light blue, in each case with the Arabic number of the park.
- i. Pionier-Parkkompanie (Engineer Park Co). Two are included in each engineer park. Likewise numbered in series 501 upwards.
- j. Pionier-Maschinenzug (Engineer Machine Platoon). One is included in each engineer park. Likewise used independently under engineer battalion staffs "z.b.V." (see c above).
 - 2. Festungspioniere (Fortress Engineers)

Fortress engineers wear the letters "Fp" or "F" on their shoulder straps (Gothic "Fp" if the unit existed in peace time; Latin "F" if it was formed on or after mobilization). The following units and staffs may be identified:

a. Festungspionier-Kommandeur (Fortress Engineer Commander): Gothic "Fp" followed by the Roman numeral of a Wehrkreis. In effect, regimental commander and Hq for fortress engineer units in the military district concerned.

b. Festungspionier-Stab (Fortress Engineer Staff): Gothic "Fp" or Latin "F" followed by an Arabic number in series 1-50. A regimental staff, normally controls two sector groups.



- c. Festungspionier-Abschnittsgruppe (Fortress Engineer Sector Group). Numbered I or II followed by the Arabic number of the controlling staff (e.g. Fest. Pi. Abs. Gr. II/21). Equivalent in status to a battalion staff.
- d. Festungs-Stammbataillon (Fortress Cadre Battalion). A training unit, in Germany, in which personnel from basic training units receive further training while awaiting transfer elsewhere.
- e. Festungspionier-Park (Fortress Engineer Equipment Park): One for each area in which fortress engineers are employed extensively.


For fortress signal, transport and construction units, see sections VIII, IX, and XV.

3. RAILWAY ENGINEERS (Eisenbahnpioniere)

Railway engineers wear black piping with the letter "E" (Gothic if the unit existed in peace-time, otherwise Latin) on the shoulder strap. They are not always easy to distinguish from Eisenbahntruppen (Railway troops), for which see paragraph 3 Section IX. The following types of unit may be encountered:

- a. Eisenbahnpionier-Regiment (Railway Engineer Regt). Eight exist (Nos. 1-8). Each consists of a Hq and two battalions each of four companies, numbered consecutively (e.g., 7/Eisb.Pi.Rgt. 3 = 3d Co 2d Bn 3d Railway Engineer Regt). In common with the independent companies listed below, they receive personnel from five railway engineer depot battalions (Nos 1-5).
 b. Eisenbahnpionierstab z.b.V. (Special Railway Engineer Staff): One
- unnumbered example has been identified.
- c. Eisenbahn (Pioneer)-Baukompanie (Railway (Engineer) Construction Co). Numbered in series 101-200. These are specialist companies, the function of which may be defined by a further title: e.g., Eisb. Pfeilerbaukp. (Railway Pier Construction Co). In others, the special title replaces Bau.: e.g., Eisb. Fernsprechkompanie (Railway Telephone (Construction) Co). By contrast, the Eisenbahn-Baubataillon (Railway Construction Battalion) belongs to the category of construction troops (Section XV).
- d. Eisenbahnpionier-Park (Railway Engineer Equipment Park). No 403 has been identified. In addition there is a Heimat-Eisenbahnpionier-Park at Rehagen-Klausdorf (Wkr. III), where the railway engineer school is situated.



VIII SIGNAL TROOPS (Nachrichtentruppen)

Lemon yellow (Zitronen) piping is the distinguishing color of signal units. It should not be confused with the yellow cavalry piping. For a list of identified units, reference may be made to Order of Battle of the German Army. The following types of unit may be encountered. Army, corps and division units are excluded.

- 1. Nachrichten-Lehr-Regiment (Signal Instruction Regt). Stationed at the Army Signal School at Halle (Wkr. IV), this regiment (like other instruction units) is potentially available for service in the field.
- 2. Kommandeur der Nachrichtentruppen (CO Signal Troops). A Roman numeral with yellow piping denotes the staff of the Signal Officer in a particular Wehrkreis, he has the status of a regimental commander, and controls both training and army communications within his district. Officers of the same title may also be found in the field.
- 3. Nachrichten-Regimentsstab z.b.V. (Special Signal Regt Staff). Special regimental staff to command independent battalions and other units in special situations.
- 4. Nachrichtenführer z.b.V., Nachrichten-Abteilungsstab z.b.V. (Special Signal Commander, Special Signal Bn Staff). Special battalion staffs, formed to control independent signal companies in the field. Mainly numbered in series 651—700.
- 5. Feldnachrichtenkommandantur (Field Signal Command). A static signal Hq for a sector of occupied territory or in rear areas of the zone of operations. The personnel wear yellow piping and a latin "K" followed by the Arabic number of the unit (series 1-60).
- 6. Führungsnachrichten-Regiment (Command Signal Regt) Nos 40 and 601, in the main series, have this classification. Their function is to provide and maintain the highest grade signal communications between GHQ, army group, and army Hq.
- 7. Heeres-Nachrichten-Regiment (GHQ, Signal Regt). Other signal regts, carrying numbers selected from the series 501-700, provide and maintain networks of lesser importance or are allotted to army groups as army group signal regts.
- 8. Propaganda-Kompanie (Propaganda Co). Provided with personnel from the Propaganda Depot Bn at Berlin(Wkr. III). Propaganda cos include No 501 and at least fifteen carrying numbers selected from the series 601-700. These cos are normally allotted to armies. In addition, there are unnumbered bns and cos (Frankreich, allotted to CG, Occupied France; Belgien, under CG, Belgium and Northern France; Afrika, under Africa Panzer Army). The personnel



are mainly journalists, press photographers or film cameramen in civil life, and their main function is front-line reporting. They are considered as part of the Signal Corps.

9. Independent signal companies etc. The following are the principal types of independent signal companies which may be encountered:

Fernsprech-Baukompanie, Fsp.Baukp. (Telephone Construction Co) Fsp.Betriebszug, Fsp.Betr.Zg. (Telephone Operating Platoon)

Fernschreibkp. (Teletype Co)


Horchkp. (Interception Co)

Nachr. Aufklärungskp. (Signal Rcn Co)

Funkuberwachungskp. (Radio Supervision Co). All carry numbers in the series 601 and upwards.

- 10. Festungsnachrichten-Kommandantur, -Stelle (Fortress Signal Command Station). The command carries the same number as the Festungspionier-Stab (see ¶2 Section VII) to which it is attached. It is not known on what principle the stations are numbered.
- 11. Nachrichtenhelferinneneinsatzabteilung (Female Signal Operations Bn). As yet, No 52 is the only example of this type of unit to be identified. It probably administers the women telephone operators over a large area, such as Occupied France.
- 12. Leichter Störungstrupp (Light Repair Detachment). Principles of numbering not yet known.
- 13. Armee-Nachrichten-Park (Army Sig Equipment Park). One to each army, carrying a number from the series 501--. Officers wear the color of their arm, other ranks light blue, in each case with the Arabic number of the park.

IX TRANSPORT TROOPS (Fahrtruppen)

The distinguishing color of transport (including supply) units is light blue. The following list includes the main types of unit belonging to this category, with



the exception of division and corps units.

1. Transport Units

- a. Kraftwagentransport-Regiment, Kw. Trsp. Rgt. (MT Regt). The primary purpose of these regts is to move non-motorized fighting units. They may also be used, however, for the transport of supplies. Examples identified are 360 z. b. V., 501, 602, 605, 606, 616, 982, 985 z.b.V.
- b. Kraftwagentransport-Abteilung, Kw. Trsp. Abt. (MT Bn). Independent bns, similar in function to the foregoing units. Examples identified are 503 z.b. V., 795, 979, 987 z.b.V. and 990 z.b.V.
- c. Kraftwagentransport-Kolonne, Kw.Trsp.Kol. (MT Column or Train). Independent columns, carrying numbers in the series 601 and upwards. In some cases, the title is more elaborate (e.g., grosse Kraftwagenkolonne für Wassertransport 643 = 643d Hv Water MT Train).
- d. Kraftfahrzeuginstandsetzungsabteilung. Kfz. Jnst. Abt. (MT Repair Bn). The following numbers have been identified: 508, 522, 548, 564, 567, 569, 592, 593, 596, 598.
- e. Panzerinstandsetzungsabteilung, Pz. Jnst. Abt. (Tank Repair Bn). The following numbers have been identified: 543, 545, 552.
- f. Kraftfahrzeuginstandsetzungskompanie. Kfz. Jnst. Kp. (MT Repair Co). These are independent cos numbered in series 101-200 (Nos 134, 138, 140, 145, 164, 166, 169 have been identified) and 301—(No 312 identified).
- g. Panzerinstandsetzungskompanie, Pz. Jnst. Kp. (Tank Repair Co). The following number has been identified: 122.
- h. Kraftwagenwerkstattzug, Kw.Wkst.Zg. (MT Workshop Platoon). Independent platoons; No 612 has been identified.
- i. Werkstattkompanie (mot) (Motorised Workshop Co). Ten or twelve have been identified, carrying numbers in the series 1-200.
- j. Feldwerkstatt (Field Workshop). Normally one of these is allotted to each army or Panzer army. They carry numbers, allotted arbitrarily, in the series 501—.
- k. Feldwerkstattzug (Field Workshop Platoon). These are independent platoons; Nos 573, 604, and 607 have been identified.
- l. Armee-Kraftfahr-Park (Army MT Park). One to each army or Panzer army, numbered arbitrarily in series 501 and upwards.

bered concurrently with the establishments described in 1 above.

- m. Heeres-Krafthafr-Park, H.K.P. (GHQ MT Park). A separate series, num-
- n. Kraftfahr-Parkkompanie (MT Park Co). A component sub-unit of the establishments described in 1 and m above and carrying the same number.

2. Supply Units

- a. Nachschub-Bataillon (Supply Bn). Two series exist, namely 1-200 (half a dozen identified) which are non-motorised, and 501--700 (26 identified) which are fully motorised. Both types may be found serving as army troops.
- b. Nachschubstab z.b.V. (Special Supply Staff). Series 671--750 (a dozen have been identified to date) when employed as loading or unloading staffs at a seaport they are described as Verladestab or Entladestab.
- c. Nachschub-Kolonnenabteilung, N.K.A. (Supply Column or Train Bn). Some thirty have been noted, carrying numbers between 501 and 950. Their component columns are distinguished by an Arabic number preceding that of the battalion (e.g., 10/N.K.A.529). Some are horse drawn and some have MT. They are assigned to armies as required, and no standard allotment can be given.
- d. Nachschubkolonnenabt. z.b.V. (Supply Column Bn, Staff). Special staffs formed to control and administer independent supply columns of the GHQ pool. Nos 671 and 672 and 798 have been identified.
- e. Independent supply columns. These include the following types (all carrying numbers from the series 501-999).

gross Kw. Kol. (Hv MT Clm)—capacity 60 tons.

kleine Kw. Kol. (L MT Clm)—capacity 30 tons.

Betriebsstoff-Kolonne (gr. Kw. Kol f.Betr.St., kl.Kw. Kol.f.Betr.St.)

(Gas and Oil Clm Hv or L)—capacity 50 or 25 cubic meters (11,000 or 5,500 gallons).

Kesselwagen-Kolonne f. Betr. St. (Tank Clm for Gas and Oil).

Filterkolonne. (Filter Column). This is believed to be a water column.

Kombinierte-Kolonne. (Combined column). The function of this column is not known.

Fahrkolonne (H-Dr Clm).

3. Railway units (Eisenbahntruppen)

a. Operating Staffs: The following railway operating staffs, numbered concurrently in series 1 and upwards, have been identified:

Feldeisb. Direktion (Field Railway Command Station).

Feldeisb. Betriebsamt (Field Railway Operations Office).

Feldeisb. Maschinenamt (Field Railway Machinery Office).



Feldeisb. Werkstättenamt (Field Railway Workshop Office).


The various offices are believed to be sub-divisions of the directorates or command stations which carry the same number.

b. Operating units. Two series of operating units have been identified, as follows: --

Eisenbahnbetriebskompanie (Ry Operations Co) - series 201 and upwards. Feldbahnkompanie (F Ry Co)—series 301 and upwards.

It is possible that some of the independent companies noted under ¶3 Section VII may come under the control of railway operating staffs on occasion, although their personnel are railway engineers and wear black piping accordingly.

The following figures show the principal tactical signs for transport (including supply) troops: --



X AAMG UNITS (Fla-Einheiten)

This category consists solely of Fla-Bataillone, numbered consecutively with MG battalions (Section II) and wearing the white infantry piping with the addition of the Gothic letters "F1" on the shoulder strap. On charts they are grouped with Army AAA batteries under the heading Heeresflak (see Section V). Two series exist: -

Nos 22-66 (ten identified). These consist of six companies, which operate separately. One company is often incorporated in a Panzer division, being attached for administrative purposes to the division AT Bn, but retaining its original number.

Nos 601-620 (eighteen identified). These consist of three companies, and normally operate as battalions.

In addition, the 90th Light Division in North Africa contains a Fla-Kompanie bearing the division auxiliary number 190.



XI MEDICAL UNITS (Sanitats-Einheiten)


Dark blue is the distinguishing color for medical units. The following varieties may be encountered in addition to division medical units (for which reference may be made to Order of Battle of the German Army).

- 1. Heeres-or Armee-Sanitätsbteilung (GHQ or Army Medical unit). These units are in some cases fully and in others partly motorized. They carry numbers allotted at random from the series 501-700.
- 2. Kriegslazarett-Abteilung (War Hospital unit). Carrying numbers in the same series as the foregoing type of unit. They are fully motorized.
- 3. Reserve Kriegslazarett-Abteilung (Reserve War Hospital Bn). Numbered in the same series, but with a different establishment usually. They are non-motorized.
- 4. Armee-Feldlazarett (Army Field Hospital). Units of this type carry the number of the army medical battalion preceded by 1, 2, 3 or 4 (e.g., A.-Feldlaz. 3/542). The prefix Armee- will often be dropped, but the type can be recognized by its double numbering.
- 5. Feldlazarett (Field Hospital). Independent field hospitals in the GHQ pool carry numbers in the series 601-700. Some are motorized, others are not.
 - 6. Feldhalblazarett (Field Half-Hospital). No 716 has been identified.
- 7. Kriegslazarett (War Hospital). Units of this type carry the number of the War Hospital Bn preceded by 1, 2, 3 or 4 (e.g., Kriegslaz 4/571) or single numbers in series 901--.
- 8. Leichtkranken-Kriegslazarett (War Hospital for Minor Cases). Some are motorized, others are not. The principles of numbering are not yet known.
- 9. Krankentransport-Abteilung (Ambulance Bn). Numbered in the series 501-700 and allotted to armies.
- 10. Kranken-Kraftwagenzug (Motorized Ambulance Platoon). Numbered in series 501-800.
 - 11. Lazarett-Zug (Hospital Train). Numbered in series 501-700.
 - 12. Leichtkranken-Zug (Hospital Train for Slightly Wounded Cases).
- 13. Truppenentgiftungskompanie (Personnel Decontamination Co). Nos 617, 620 and 622 have been identified. In spite of the similarity of titles, these are definitely medical units and not smoke troops like decontamination and road-decontamination battalions.



14. Armee-Sanitätspark (Army Medical Park). Numbered in series 501-700. Both officers and other ranks wear dark blue with the Arabic number of the park.

The following figures show the tactical signs for medical units: --




XII VETERINARY UNITS (Veterinar-Einheiten)

Carmine is the distinguishing color of veterinary units. For division units see Order of Battle of the German Army. In addition, the following GHQ veterinary units may be encountered.

- 1. Heeres-or Armee-Pferdelazarett (GHQ or Army Veterinary Hospital). Numbered in series 501-700.
- 2. Pferde-Transportkolonne (mot.) (motorized Horse Transport Column). Numbered in the same series.
- 3. Armee-Pferdepark (Army Horse Park). Numbered in the same series. One is assigned to each army (excluding Panzer armies).
- 4. Armee-Veterinarpark (Army Veterinary Park). Numbering and allocation as for paragraph 3 above. The personnel of both types, officers as well as other ranks, wear carmine piping with the Arabic number of the park.

The following figures show the tactical signs for veterinary units: --



XIII MILITARY POLICE UNITS (Feldgendarmerie-Einheiten)

Military police units wear orange piping and carry no number. They wear, however, on the left upper arm the Nazi eagle and swastika surrounded by an oak-wreath, and on the lower arm a brown band inscribed with the word "Feldgendarmerie" in silver.



- 1. Feldgendarmerie-Abteilung (Military Police Bn). One is allotted to each army or Panzer army. The following units of this type have been identified: 501, 520, 521, 531, 541, 551, 571, 582, 591, 682, 683, 690, 697.
- 2. Feldgendarmerie-Trupp (Military Police Detachment). Detachments of military police allocated to the military administration of an occupied country are believed to carry the number of the Kommandantur to which they are attached. See section (XVI).
- 3. Verkehrsregelung -Bataillon (Traffic Control Bn). Seven units of this type, carrying numbers in series 751-760, have been identified to date. A battalion or a company may be allocated for as long as necessary to an army on the move.
- 4. Geheime Feldpolizei, G.F.P. (Field Secuirty Police). Gruppen (groups) of the G.F.P. may be assigned impartially to army or GAF organizations. There is normally one Gruppe at the disposal of each army, and one or more attached to the military administration of each occupied country. Series 501-800.

The following figures show the tactical sign for military police units: --

XIV LOCAL DEFENSE UNITS (Landesschützen-Einheiten)

Local defense units wear white piping with the Latin "L", followed by an Arabic number in the case of Landesschützen regimental staffs and battalions. Various other types of unit fall under the same heading in the German classification, although they are not specifically described as Landesschützen and lack the distinghishing "L".

- 1. Landesschutzen-Regiment (Landesschutzen Regt Staff). This is a regimental Hq controlling a varying number of battalions. Some are qualified z.b.V. and sometimes include various attached units. In the case of two-figure numbers the first, and in the case of three-figure numbers the first two figures give the Wehrkreis of origin (e.g., Lds. Schtz. Rgt. 115 comes from Wkr. XI).
- 2. Landesschützen-Bataillon (Landesschützen Bn.). Battalions vary in strength from two to six companies. Some are qualified "z.b.V." and have various attached units. Within Germany they are employed for guard duties at PW camps and vulnerable points. In occupied territories they provide the main support for the military administration. On L of C they may be used to guard dumps, parks, etc. Some 400 battalions have been identified, numbered according to the Wehrkreis of origin as follows:--

The GAF also has Landesschützen units. These, however, may be distinguished from army Landesschutzen, since they wear double numbers, Roman for the Luftgau of origin and Arabic for the particular unit.


- 3. Wachregiment (Guard Regt). Two regiments of this type have been identified, namely Wachrgt. Cluwer (named after its commander) and Wachrgt. Paris (probably the 745th Inf Regt of the 712th Inf Div). The latter unit, though formed from Landesschützen personnel, now forms part of the infantry series.
- 4. Wachbataillon (Guard Bn). There are two main types, namely Heimatwachbtl. and Wachbatl. serving with the armies in the field, with different war establishments and numbered in two series, 1-500 and 501-800. The former type includes bridge guard battalions (Nos 58, 99, 122 and 143 identified) and cyclist guard battalions (No 326 identified). The units of the latter type are assigned to armies to provide guards for army parks, etc. (16 identified to date).
- 5. Grenzwacht (Frontier Guard). In peace time, the regular units stationed in the frontier districts were reinforced by a frontier guard organization, with the following chain of command:

Grenzschutz-Abschnittskommando (Sector Command= Regt Hq) Grenzschutz-Unterabschnitt (Sub-sector= Bn Hq) Grenzwacht-Kompanie (Frontier Guard Co)

Each sector has a signals co, one or more fixed bns of arty and other units. On mobilization, the sector commands were renamed regiments and numbered on the same principle as the Landesschützen regiments (paragraph 1 above). It is probable that they have since been renamed Landesschützen regiments (e.g., 122d Lds. Schtz. Regt. is probably for former 122d Frontier Guard Regt, from Wkr. XII, renamed).

Some Landesschützen units have been reported to wear light green piping, the color of mountain rifle and rifle (Jäger) units. The reason for this is not known.

The tactical signs for Landesschützen units are the same as those for the comparable infantry units, with the addition of the letter L.



Light brown is the distinguishing color of construction units, but railway construction battalions wear black piping, as do bridge-building battalions (with the possible exception of those carrying numbers below 501) and fortress construction battalions. The following types may be encountered:


- 1. Oberbaustab (High Construction Staff). Equivalent in status to a brigade staff. Numbered in series 1-20.
- 2. Kommandeur der Bautruppen (CO Construction Troops): Regimental commander and staff. Two series, 1-50 and 101-150 (about 20 identified).
- 3. Baubataillon, Bau-Btl. (Construction Bn). Series 1-500 (about 100 identified, of which the majority carry numbers below 300), excluding bridge building, fortress and railway construction battalions which are numbered concurrently.
- 4. Brückenbau-Bataillon, Br.Bau-Bt. (Bridge Building Bn). Series 1-500 (to date, 15 identified) and 501-800 (about 20 identified). The battalions in the higher series regularly operate with the armies in the field, and are reckoned as engineers in all respects. The lower series is more likely to be used on the L of C.
- 5. Festungsbau-Bataillon, Fest.Bau-Btl. (Fortress Construction Bn). Some 15 have been identified, carrying numbers between 19 and 242 inclusive. They operate under the direction of fortress engineer staffs (paragraph 2, Section VII).
- 6. Strassenbau-Bataillon, Str.Bau-Btl. (Road Construction Bn). Series 501-700 (shared with field army bridge building battalions) about 30 have been identified, including seven Radfahr- (cyclist) battalions (in series 501-510, intended to accompany spearhead formations). They may be qualified as leichte or schwere (i.e., light or heavy), but it is not known how the two varieties differ from each other.
- 7. Eisenbahn-Baubataillon, Eisb.Bau-Btl. (Railway Construction Bn). Nos 83, 111, 116, 511 and 512 have been identified. It is believed their function is to provide less specialized labor than that of the construction companies described in paragraph 3 Section VII.
- 8. Marine-Baubataillon, Mar.Bau-Bt. (Naval Construction Bn): Nos 311, 312 and 323 in the main series are described thus. They are presumably intended to carry out construction works for the German Navy, though their personnel are provided by the Army. (The coast defense units belong to the German Navy).
- 9. Kriegsgefangenen-Bau- und Arbeits-Bataillon (PW Construction and Labor Bn). Series 1-50 (half a dozen identified to date). The German cadre personnel acts as guards to PW employed within Germany or on the L of C.





10. Landesbau-Bataillon (Agricultural Bn). A series 1-6 has recently been identified. They are presumably intended to assist in the agricultural exploitataion of the Ukraine.

The following figures show the tactical signs for construction units: --



XVI ADMINISTRATIVE UNITS (Verwaltungstruppen-Einheiten)

This category includes a variety of units, and no single distinghishing color can be specified for it. For particulars of corps and divisional units see Order of Battle of the German Army. In the following list units have been grouped for convenience approximately according to their functions and to their place in the German war establishment.

1. Administration of supplies

Units in this group are largely staffed by officials (Beamten) who wear dark green piping. Officers wear the color of their original arm of the service.

- a. Bäckerei-Kompanie, Gross-Bäckerei-Kompanie (Bakery Co, Large Bakery Co). Allotted random numbers in series 501-700.
- b. Schlächterei-Einheiten (Animal Slaughter Units). These vary in size, description and range of numbering as follows:--

Abteilung (Battalion). Nos 201 and 619 identified.

Kompanie (Company). Nos 503, 556, 582, 622, 635, and 641 identified.

Zug (Platoon): Nos 571, 592, 602, 605, 613, 615, 626, 636, 675 and 697 identified.

The companies are allotted to armies. Principles for the allocation of battalions and platoons are not available.

- c. Eisenbahn-Küchenwagen-Abteilung (Railway Kitchen-car Detachment)
 Nos 1 and 2 have been identified.
 - d. Heeres-Betreuungsabteilung (Army Welfare Bn): Series 1-6 identified.



- e. Armee-Verpflegungsamt, A.Vpfl.Amt. or A.V.A. (Army Ration Supply Depot). There are several of these available for each army in the field, carrying numbers selected from the series 501-800.
- f. Heeres-Verpflegungsamt, H.V.A. (GHQ Ration Supply Depot): Numbered concurrently with those under e above.
- g. Feldpostamt, F.P.A. (Field Post Office). Army and GHQ field post offices carry numbers selected from the series 501 and upwards. In addition to its proper number, each post office (including corps and division offices) uses, for all open correspondence, a Kenn-Nummer (Code number) selected at random from the series 1-999: thus, K 943 might be the code number for 571st Army FPO. It is therefore necessary to exercise particular care in studying identifications of FPOs.
- h. Armee-Briefstelle (Army Postal Station): Numbered in the same series as establishments in g above, these are branches of the army FPO for the collection and delivery of the field post.
- i. Armee-Bekleidungsamt (Army Clothing Depot). Numbering same as for Armee-Verpflegungsamte in e above.
 - 2. Administration of ordnance stores, etc.

Officers wear the color of their original arm. Enlisted personnel light blue piping. All except serial 10 are distinguished by Latin "FZ" on shoulder straps.

- a. Feldzeugkommando (Ordnance Command). One or two in each Wehrkreis in Germany (the Gothic letters "FZ" followed by a Roman numeral give the identification), and some in occupied countries (e.g. Belgium and Northern France). The officer appointed to this post has the status of a brigade commander. In the zone of operations there is no comparable post.
- b. Oberfeldzeugstab (Higher Ordnance Staff). Series 1 and upwards. The commander has the status or a regimental commander.
- c. Feldzeugstab (Ordnance Staff). Series 1-50 (a dozen identified). Equivalent in status to battalion Hq.
 - d. Feldzeugbataillon (Ordnance Bn). Series 1-50 (half a dozen identified).
- e. Zentral-Ersatzteillager, Z.E.L. (Central Spare Parts Depot). Series 1-200.
- f. Munitions-Verwaltungskompanie, Mun. Verw.Kp. (Am Adm Co). Series 501 and upwards.



g. Betriebsstoffs-Verwaltungskompanie, Betr.Verw.Kp. (Gas and Oil Adm Co). Series 971-980.

3. Administration of occupied territory

Other ranks belonging to units of the following types wear white piping, with the Latin letter "K" followed by the Arabic number of their unit.

- a. Oberfeldkommandantur, O.F.K. (Higher Field Hq). Hq of this type in the zone of operations come under Army L of C Commander, or CG Army Group L of C Area. In occupied territory outside the zone of operations they come under the general officer in command of the military administration, and in such cases they are distinguished by the addition of (V)-- for Verwaltung--to their title. Nos 365, 372, 379 and 393 were formed in Poland from the staffs of divisions disbanded in 1940, and continue to carry the same numbers. All other identified units carry numbers in series 501 and upwards.
- b. Subordinate field Hq. The following Hq carry numbers in the same series, in which the lowest number yet identified is 178 and the highest 928. According to their special description or the rank of the officer in command their relative importance may be deduced, but there is no system discoverable in the allocation of numbers to them:
 - Feldkommandantur (Field Hq). Approximately equivalent to an area command of a Wehrkreis (See Part B). The term may also be used, loosely, to describe one of the following special types.
 - Ortskommandantur (Town Hq). Town major's command in a small town.
 - Stadkommandantur (City Hq). Town major's command in a city or large town.
 - Kreiskommandantur (Rural Hq). Town major's command in a rural district.

About 150 examples, in all, have been identified to date, the majority of which carry numbers above 500.

4. Administration of PW Camps

The following types of PW camp staffs all carry numbers in a single series 1-400. Personnel wear the color of their original arm. It should be noted that a PW camp located in a Wehrkreis also carries (and in all open correspondence uses) the Roman numeral of the Wehrkreis followed by a letter of the alphabet (e.g., Stalag XXI A).

a. Frontstalag (Forward PW Camp). Twenty-five identified.



- b. Dulag (PW Transit Camp). Twenty identified.
- c. Oflag (Camp for Officer PW). Series 1-100 (10 identified).
- d. Stalag (Camp for enlisted PW). Series 301-400 (40 identified).

XVII GAF ANTIAIRCRAFT UNITS

A list of identified units is given in Order of Battle of the German Army.

1. System of Numbering

All units carry numbers in series 1-1,000. In some cases, one number is carried by two or more units of different types. The following are the principal groups in the main series.

- a. Nos. 1-70. Regiments consisting of Hq, I and II Battalions, each of three heavy and two light gun batteries, III Battalion of three searchlight batteries, and a personnel replacement battalion carrying the regimental number without qualification.
- b. Nos 71-99. Light battalions each of three light batteries (there are also a number of independent regimental staffs carrying numbers in this series).

Most of the units in the above two groups existed in peace time.

c. Nos 100-997. Units formed on or after mobilization are allotted numbers on no deducible system. They include regiments, regimental staffs, and independent battalions (heavy, mixed, light or searchlight). Army AAA batteries receive numbers in the same series. Marine (Naval) batteries are numbered in a separate series, as are transport, balloon barrage and plotting units (which belong to the same branch of the GAF). The term Reserve prefixed to units in this group indicates that they have a special war organization (with a lower allocation of MT). It does not mean that the units in question were necessarily formed on mobilization.

2. Employment

The tactical unit is the battalian (Abteilung) and not the regiment. In action battalians (whether regimental or independent) rarely operate under a regimental staff of the same number.

AAA serving with the armies in the field is fully motorized. Units intended to cooperate with the spearhead of the attack are equipped for cross-country operation. Command is exercised through the chain corps—division—regiment—battalion. There is no fixed allotment of units to higher formations, but the following range has been noted:—

To AAA corps (Flakkorps): Two to four AA divisions.

To AAA division (Flakdivision): Two to five regiments. To AAA regiment (Flak-Regiment): Three to five battalions.

In general, the AAA corps controls the area of an army group, and the AAA division the area of an army. Allotment of units varies according to the estimated needs but an army corps commonly has an AAA battalion attached to it during operations, and a light or mixed battalion will often be found attached to a Panzer division. An infantry division is not likely to be allotted more than an AAA battery.

3. Control

GAF AAA organizations and units operating with the army are subordinated operationally to the army unit concerned, and administratively to the nearest GAF ground organization staff (Luftgaustab). The function of AAA in the field is the defense of the zone of the armies. In practice, this is not confined to the protection of troop columns and concentrations, supply dumps and L of C—on the contrary, mobile AAA units regularly operate in the spearhead of the attack, being employed not only for defense against air attack but against land targets (tanks, pill-boxes and other strong points, etc.). For this purpose the 88mm (3.46 in) gun, with which the heavy battery is normally equipped, has proved conspicuously successful.

XVIII OTHER GAF UNITS

The following are the principal types of unit likely to be found cooperating with army units in fighting on land.

1. Parachute troops (Fallschirmtruppen). The formations and units concerned are as follows:—

XI Fliegerkorps (XI Air Corps). Controlling all air-borne operations. 7th Fliegerdivision (7th Air Div). Containing units marked with an

asterisk below.

.Fallschirmjäger-Regiment (Parachute Rifle Regt). Nos 1-3* and 5 have been identified.

F.S.-Artillerie-Regiment (Parachute Arty Regt). No 1* identified.

F.S.-Panzerjäger-Abteilung((Parachute AT Bn). Unnumbered*.

F.S.-M.G. Btl. (Parachute MG Bn). Unnumbered*.

F.S.-Nachrichtenkompanie (Parachute Sig Co). No. 7*.

F.S.-Fla.Btl. (Parachute AAA MG Bn). Unnumbered.

F.S.-Pionier-Btl. (Parachute Engineer Bn). Unnumbered.

F.S.-Sanitats-Kompanie (Parachute Medical Co). Unnumbered.

Sturm-Regiment (Glider Regt). No 1 identified.

2. Army cooperation reconnaissance units. Army cooperation Staffeln (squadrons of nine aircraft) are described as H. Staffelin if designed for tacti-




cal reconnaissance and F. Staffeln in the case of long range reconnaissance units. The addition of Pz. indicates that a Staffel is trained to cooperate with Panzer units. The H Staffeln are operationally independent sub-units of Gruppen (groups), of which the following have been identified: 10-14, 21-23, 31-33 and 41. Each Gruppe may contain up to seven Staffeln. On Order of Battle the Staffel is shown thus: 3 (H) 13 or 2 (H) 23 Pz. Long-range Staffeln are shown thus: 3 (F) 33.

3. Army cooperation signal units. Luftnachrichten-Abteilung (Heer) motorisiert, abbreviated L.N. Abt. (H) mot. (Air Signal Bn (Army) (Mtz). Numbered in series 1 and upwards, and allocated on the basis of one to each army.

In addition, GAF construction supply or transport units may be encountered. These can readily be distinguished because, like GAF Landesschutzen units (see paragraph 2, Section XIV), they carry a double number, Arabic (for the particular unit) and Roman (for the Luftgau or GAF administrative district in which it was formed).

The tactical signs for the units in paragraphs 2 and 3 above and for GAF AAA units, are given in the following figures:--

PART E

I INTRODUCTION

The state of the control of the state of the

- 1. In this part are included lists of senior officers, arranged alphabetically by rank down to Major General inclusive; of known General Staff Officers (Staff College graduates)—i.e., officers from Captain to Colonel inclusive who wear the uniform of the General Staff Corps and have the qualification i.G. = im Generalstabe added to their title of rank—arranged alphabetically regardless of rank; of known commanders of units (providing an index to the officers shown in Part C); and of senior officers of the German Air Force, whose titles of rank are indistinguishable, except in the case of full generals, from those of Army officers.
- 2. Lists of senior officers of the S.S and Police are given in Part F, sections VI and VII, below. It has not proved practicable to include a consolidated alphabetical index of all the officers mentioned, and it has been found necessary to exclude colonels from the present edition. It is hoped that a list of colonels and a consolidated index may be issued subsequently.
- 3. The classified lists are preceded by a series of brief notes on German surnames, titles and ranks, which are liable to provide stumbling blocks for all except specialists in their study.

II GERMAN SURNAMES

Note: In the name John Henry Ducrot, John Henry are Christian names while Ducrot is a family name or surname.

- 1. The most confusing form of German surname is that in which a person has two surnames, of which he habitually uses only one, since there is no general rule to indicate which of the two names is generally used. For example, Field Marshal von Lewinski genannt von Manstein (literally, von Lewinski called von Manstein) is customarily known as von Manstein, and he is listed among the field marshals under the letter M. However, Lt General von Hartlieb genannt Walsporn is normally known as von Hartlieb, and he is therefore listed under the letter H.
- 2. In some cases of double surnames, where the term genannt is not employed, the von (equivalent to de in French surnames) is customarily transposed; for example, General Geyr von Schweppenburg, formerly German Military Attache in London, is normally referred to as von Geyr. In general, where two surnames are connected by und (and), the first of the two is used: thus, Lt General von Rothkirch und Panthen is usually called von Rothkirch. Hyphenated names are often but not invariably used in full.
- 3. Christian names are seldom if ever used in signatures. Officers sign orders with family name and rank only. It is therefore difficult, at times, to discover an officer's Christian name or initials (neither of which is shown in any official document, except in the original registration, or when two men of the



same name and rank must be distinguished from each other), so that in a few cases in the following lists there is a possibility of confusion between officers having the same surname.

4. Academic degrees, such as Dr. or Dr. Ing., are regularly shown before the surname both in official documents and in signatures, and are therefore included in the following lists.

III GERMAN TITLES

- 1. Persons with hereditary titles are more frequently found in Germany than in Great Britain, because German titles do not pass only from eldest son to eldest son, or to the nearest male blood relation (as in the United Kingdom), but from the father to all his sons. They in turn transmit the title to their sons (except in certain princely families in which the title Prinz is borne solely by the head of the family). The titles most commonly used are listed below.
- 2. Graf (Count) corresponds approximately to Earl. As with other titles, it is usually followed by von, though in referring to a Count the prefix is often omitted; thus, Lt General Graf von Sponeck is normally described as Graf Sponeck.
- 3. Freiherr, abbreviated Frhr. (Baron) corresponds approximately to the lowest degree of the British peerage. The title Baron, which also occurs, is of non-German origin. In conversation a Freiherr is generally referred to as Baron, the prefix von being omitted; thus, Colonel General Frhr v. Weichs may be described as Baron Weichs.
- 4. Ritter (Knight) corresponds in some cases to Baronet and in others to Knight. A Ritter whose title is hereditary usually owns a Rittergut or Knight's estate and takes his name from it. In other cases, the title is derived from a grant made to an officer for heroism in action or for distinguished service to the state. In Bavaria, until 1919, the Military Order of Max Joseph carried with it a patent of Knighthood which was not hereditary—hence the title of Field Marshal Ritter von Leeb whose son, killed in action in Poland in 1939, was Lieutenant Leeb.
- 5. Edler (Noble) approximately equivalent to Baronet. The titles Ritter and Edler are, in most cases, of Bavarian or Austrian origin.
- 6. The prefix von corresponds most closely to the English suffix Esquire (in the strict sense), denoting the right to bear arms.



IV GERMAN MILITARY RANK

- 1. In the following table the approximate American equivalent is given for each German rank. It should be noted, however, that the appointments held by officers of any given rank may vary widely in status, and no appointment carries or presupposes specific rank: for example:--
 - A Generalmajor may command an infantry regiment a division or on occasions, an army corps.
 - An infantry regiment may be commanded by a Generalmajor, an Oberst, an Oberstleutnant or, on occasions, a Major.
 - A "First General Staff Officer" (Ia) (our G-3) may be a Hauptmann, Major, Oberstleutnant or Oberst.

2. In the German Army, acting or temporary rank is not granted--hence the variety in rank to be found among officers holding similar commands. But two qualifications of rank may occur:--





Ernennung (approximately the equivalent of brevet rank): An Oberstleutnant may be ernannt Oberst, or an Oberst ernannt Generalmajor, in order to obtain the higher rank sooner than his seniority in the lower rank would permit (promotion is normally strictly according to seniority up to the rank of Genlt. inclusive. Such officers receive the pay of the higher rank, but do not obtain a specific seniority (Rangdienstalter, abbreviated R.D.A.) until their actual promotion.

Charakterisierung (honorary rank): An officer may be charakterisiert to a higher rank (e.g., Major to Oberstleutnant). Such officers do not receive the pay of the higher rank until their actual promotion, but they obtain a specific seniority in a separate charakterisiert list. The qualification is regularly shown in titles of rank: e.g., char. Oberst.

3. Officers are listed separately, according to their status, as follows:--

Regular officers on the active list. -- An aktiv officer is distinguished by the title of his rank without qualification: e.g., Oberst.

Regular officers on the supplementary list.—During the period of maximum expansion of the German Army (1934-1939), large numbers of additional officers were required, particularly for administrative appointments. To meet this special demand, an Erganzungs (supplementary) list was formed on which exofficers were recommissioned after undergoing suitable courses. An Erganzungs officer is distinguished by the addition of (Erg.) or (E) to the title of his rank: e.g., Oberst (Erg.). Officers on this list take precedence immediately after those holding the same rank on the active list.

Reserve officers.—Retired officers from the active or Ergänzungs list may be transferred to the reserve list, to which suitable candidates may also be commissioned directly. Commissions on this list correspond to some extent, in peace time, to commissions in the Organized Reserve Corps. A reserve officer takes precedence immediately after Ergänzungs officers of the same rank, and is distinguished by the addition of der Reserve, d.Res. or d.R. to the title of his rank: e.g., Oberst d.R.

Landwehr officers.--Reserve officers may be transferred to the Landwehr list because of age or relative unfitness. Such officers are distinguished by the addition of der Landwehr, d.Landw. or d.L. to the title of rank: e.g., Major d.L.

Over age officers.--Officers who have passed the age limit for their rank and classification, but remain fit and willing to serve, are transferred to the zur Verfügung (i.e., available) list and are distinguished by the addition of z.V. to the title of rank: e.g. Maj. d. R.z.V.

Unemployable retired officers.--Retired officers who are no longer fit or suitable for military service of any kind are described as ausser Dienst (out of service) or a.D.: e.g., Oberst a.D.

Officers on the emergency list.--For the duration of the war, emergency commissions (auf Kriegsdauer, abbreviated a.K.) are granted to suitable candidates. Such commissions rank immediately below those on the aktiv list.



1 INTRODUCTION

- 1. In this Part a brief survey is given of such semi-military organizations as are likely to be found operating with the German army in the field, although organized, equipped and, if need be, maintained independently; together with lists of senior officers of the SS and police (excluding those whose work lies outside the semi-military sphere), who hold rank only distinguishable from those of military or air force officers by the addition of the qualification der Waffen-SS or der Polizei.
- 2. The following abbreviations, which will frequently be seen in documents relating to the SS, police and other semi-military organizations, are employed in Sections II to VII below:-


II THE SS AND POLICE ORGANIZATION-GENERAL

1. The German Police have been transformed by the National Socialist regime from an uncoordinated federal system into a single body, in theory controlled by the Reichs Minister of the Interior but in fact immediately under Heinrich HIMMLER, who since June, 1936, has combined supreme control of the police with the leadership of the SS (Schutzstaffel). The two forces have, since that date, become increasingly intertwined, and many of the senior officers hold ranks in both. HIMMLER's official title is Reichsführer SS und Chef der Deutschen Polizei im Reichsministerium des Innern. The customary abbreviation to Rf.SS emphasizes the dominant position of the SS organization.

III THE SS (Schutzstaffel)

z.b.V.

- 1. The SS is the Corps d'elite of the National Socialist Party. Originally formed as protective squads for political meetings and bodyguards for the leaders of the party, it has been considerably expanded and is now widely employed, both for internal security duties in Germany and German-occupied territories, and in permanent military units.
- 2. HITLER is the supreme head of the SS.Under him, HIMMLER is the executive chief of the organization, with Hq in Berlin. This Hq is in effect a complete ministry, with branches and departments comparable to most of those maintained by the three service ministries for the recruiting, training, equipment, administration and control of the SS organization.



- 3. For administrative purposes, much of the work is decentralized to district Hq (SS Oberabschnitte, abbreviated SS Oa.). Geographically, the administrative districts correspond very closely to the Wehrkreise which draft for the army, navy and air force alike, and form the basis of army organization-but they are known by names and not by numbers.
- 4. The districts (SS Oberabschnitte) are normally subdivided into either two or three areas (Abschnitte), which carry Roman numerals. The following table shows this organization in detail:-

- 5. Each district is commanded by a senior SS officer, who is also HIMMLER's immediate representative at the Hq of the corresponding Wehrkreis. In the latter capacity he is described as Höherer SS und Polizeiführer (abbreviated H.SSPf., i.e., Senior SS and Police Commander) in the Wehrkreis concerned.
- 6. In the case of SS and police units stationed in occupied countries, a Senior SS and Police Commander and staff assumes control, cooperating closely with the military administration but closely controlled by the SS Hq in Berlin. Within an occupied country an area may be assigned, if this is thought necessary, to an SS and Police Commander, whose sphere of command corresponds in status to the Abschnitt in Germany.
- 7. The units of the SS fall into two distinct categories, namely Allgemeine SS (Ordinary SS) and Waffen-SS (Armed SS). The former consists of part time volunteers employed for internal security purposes within Germany, and need

not, therefore, be considered here. The Waffen-SS is described among the semimilitary services in section V below.

IV POLICE (Polizei)

1. The Police is divided into two main branches, as follows:Ordnungspolizei, Orpo; uniformed constabulary, including the municipal Schutzpolizei (Schupo), rural Gendarmerie, and river, fire-fighting and A.R.P. police (S.H.D.). The barrack police battalions (Section V below) are drawn from this branch, the head of which is Colonel General of Police DALUEGE.

Sicherheitspolizei, Sipo; security police, comprising the Secret State Police (Geheime Staatspolizei = Gestapo) and the Criminal Investigation Police (Kriminalpolizei = Kripo). The Secret State Police have as their special task the liquidation and prevention of all activity hostile to the regime. This force works in close touch with the Secret Field Police

- , the personnel of which is largely drawn from the Gestapo.
- 2. The police in general and the security police in particular are closely related to the Security Service of the SS (Sicherheitsdienst des Reichsführers SS, abbreviated S.D. Rf.SS). This was originally the intelligence branch of the SS, but since 1936 it has been directly connected with the security police through the appointment as head of both services (Chef der Sicherheitspolizei und des S.D.) of Reinhard HEYDRICH. (deceased).
- 3. Police Hq is in Berlin. Within each Wehrkreis there is a unified chain of command subordinate to the Senior SS and Police Commander (¶ 5 Section III), but there is considerable variety in the local administration, which still shows traces of the old federal system. There are still separate police departments for the different Länder into which the Reich is divided.
- 4. Below the Senior SS and Police Commander, command is exercised by Inspekteure and Befehlshaber (posts which may be held independently or concurrently) -- Inspectors and Commanders-- qualified by d.O. or d.Sipo u.d.S.D., according to their branch of the service.
- 5. The extent to which German police units operate in occupied countries depends on the extent to which the local national police service is thought strong and reliable enough to maintain law and order and cooperate with the German military authorities. There is a Senior SS and Police Commander in each of the following countries: *the Protectorate, the General Government, Norway, Holland, France, Ostland (Baltic Countries), and the Ukraine.

*See Part B, Section XIII, paragraphs 2a, 4, 6, 8, 11, 19a, 19b; the German administrative areas for which these officers are responsible is employed, for convenience, rather than the country in cases such as Poland, U.S.S.R., etc.



6. For service outside Germany, uniformed police are organized in battalians described in Section V below. Within an occupied country or a main subdivision of it, the police battalions present may be controlled by a regimental staff (e.g., in the Protectorate there is one such staff for Bohemia and one for Moravia).

V SEMI-MILITARY SERVICES

In the following list brief particulars are given of the principal semimilitary services which may be encountered in the combat zone. In each case a note has been added on the uniform and distinguishing badges.

1. Waffen-SS (Armed SS): This is a fully militarized and permanently organized force, formed into divisions (see Part C, Sections IX to XIII inclusive) and a number of independent brigades and regiments. Non-divisional units are normally employed for "mopping-up" purposes along the L of C. They come under the control, in some cases, of the Army Group L of C Commander. They may also be employed on occasions in the front line, subordinated to the nearest convenient Army.

Uniform: Field grey as in the Army, but the national emblem is worn on the upper left sleeve instead of on the right breast. The cap insignia is a skull and crossbones, and the h sign is worn on the right-hand side of the steel helmet and on the collar.

2. Police battalions. These may be either fully or partly motorized. The battalion is composed of approximately 550 men, organized into a Hq and four companies. It is equipped with rifles, machine guns, antitank guns and armored cars. Police battalions are normally used for internal security or "mopping-up" duties, but they may, if necessary, be employed in the line under Army command. They are numbered in series 1-325 (about a hundred identified).

Uniform: Field grey with dark green collar and cuffs and white metal buttons. The police version of the national emblem -the eagle and swastika enclosed in and resting on a wreath of oak leaves-is worn on the left sleeve and on the cap, or steel helmet.

3. *National Sozialistisches Kraftfahrkorps, N.S.K.K. (Nazi Party MT Corps). The functions of this organization are to assist the police in traffic control duties on the L of $^{\rm C}$ and to provide MT units (Brigaden) to supplement the transport services of the armed forces. Four such brigades exist: -

Heer (Army): To supplement Army transport.

Luftwaffe (Air Force): Assist in the supply of bombs and fuel for the GAF. Speer and Todt: Provide transport for the construction organizations, now under the unified control of Professor SPEER.

Within Germany, the N.S.K.K. also trains men in its motor schools and training units for service with the army's mobile troops. Its basic unit is the motor battalion (Motorstandarte), which carries a number in the series 1-400.

Uniform: Brown shirt and black breeches. The national emblem is mounted on a wheel enclosing a swastika, and is worn on the cap or black crash helmet. White Arabic numerals preceded by the letter "M" on the right-hand collar patch give the number of the battalion.

4. *Organization Todt, O.T. This was first formed, by the late Dr. TODT, to assist in the construction of the Autobahn (motor highway) system, and was subsequently expanded to build the western defenses known in this country as the Siegfried Line and in Germany as the Westwall. It is now employed to assist army engineer units in road building, railway repairs, bridge construction, etc., in the wake of advancing troops, and for longer term work in occupied territory, e.g., restoring communications, preparing sites for aerodromes, building fortifications, clearing harbors of wreckage. It is organized into battalions with a nucleus of specialist German personnel. It also employs hired foreign labor on a large scale. Its motor transport is provided mainly by the N.S.K.K., but in part by local contractors.

Uniform: In principle, only the German members of the organization wear uniform-a khaki colored blouse open at the neck, and breeches. On the left sleeve is a red armband with a black swastika set in a white circle, and immediately above the left cuff is a narrow armband with the inscription "Org. Todt" in white Gothic letters on a black background. Foreign workers employed by the organization wear civilian clothing or dungarees and an armband displaying the Arabic number of the battalion.

5. *Reichsarbeitsdienst, R.A.D. (National Labor Service): All German men who are physically fit are normally required to perform six months' service in the R.A.D. before beginning their military service. They are organized into companies under a cadre of permanent officers and NCOs, and such companies are available in considerable numbers for service on the L of C and in occupied countries, where they provide additional manual labor for the O.T. or the engineers.

Uniform: Brownish-grey blouse with dark collar and slacks. On the left sleeve the R.A.D. emblem (a spade-head containing the Arabic number of the company) and, beneath it, a red armband with a black swastika set in a white circle.

* Personnel of these services are equipped, wherever it is thought necessary, with rifles and in some cases with MGs, for protective purposes or guard duty.

6. *Technische Nothilfe, Teno or T.N. (Technical Emergency Corps). Classified as auxiliary police. The Teno is used in the combat zone or in occupied territory for such tasks as the restoration of essential services, the demolition of damaged buildings, the removal of unexploded bombs, or the reconstruction of installations of all kinds. In Germany it plays an important part in A R P work.

Uniform: When serving in the field, field grey, with a narrow armband immediately above the left cuff with the inscription "Technische Nothilfe" in white. Above this is a yellow armband with the inscription "Deutsche Wehrmacht" in black. The national emblem is worn in the upper left sleeve, superimposed on a black triangle. The Teno emblem, a cog-wheel, is worn on the collar patches.
