1. In compliance with Memorandum, your Headquarters, dated 22 January 1944, the following Unit History is submitted.

**ORGANIZATION**

Company Records indicate Organization was activated about April 1941 at March Field, California, commanded by 2nd Lt. J.W. Ruyon, then known as 25th Signal Platoon, Air Base. Organization moved in June, 1941 to Fresno, California, Lt. Ruyon being promoted to first lieutenant. 2nd Lt. Charles S. Miller assumed command in January, 1942, then at Hammer Field, Fresno, California. Others commanding at Hammer Field were 2nd Lt. Joe E. James and 1st Lt. Wilbur B. Robert, the latter moving the unit which had been redesignated 25th Signal Company Service Group in July, 1942, to Walla Walla Air Base. In November, 1942, the organization moved to Sioux City Army Air Base, Iowa Air Depot in March, 1943, and Camp Kilmer in April, 1943. The company of three officers and seventy enlisted men arrived at AAF station 101, Eighth Air Force, European Theater of Operations, about 1 June 1943. On the 6th of June the unit was redesignated 1025th Signal Supply and Maintenance Company Aviation, and on 26 June was again redesignated the 1025th Signal Company, Service Group.

On 7 October 1943 two officers and 79 enlisted men and all equipment was transferred to the 417th Signal Battalion provisional, leaving one Warrant Officer and one enlisted man. 54 filler personnel from 12th Replacement Control Depot were assigned to the company 22 October 1943, and unit remained with but one Warrant Officer and from 75 to 62 enlisted men until 16 December 1943, when three officers were assigned. 1st Lt. James M. Simpson assumed command, with 2nd lieutenants John F. Daley and Thomas E. Brown. There being no equipment with the organization, little training was possible.

On 7 January 1944, the company was transferred to Station 161, Boreham, Essex, into the IXth Air Force, later to be assigned to the 304th Service Group.

The IXth Air Force soon began assigning personnel to the unit from the 17th Replacement Control Depot, bringing the strength up to 86 enlisted men on 8 February 1944. On 15 February 1944 20 enlisted men were transferred to 25th Signal Company Depot Aviation by Headquarters, IXth Air Force Service Command.

### **EQUIPMENT AND PROPERTY**

As all equipment and property was transferred to the 417th Signal Battalion in the VIIIth Air Force, certain additional orders were required to secure the re-issue. Quartermaster and Chemical Warfare equipment was received by the organization in February 1944, but to date no other property has been issued other than ten vehicles.

### **MISSION**

The Signal Supply Officer was able to secure from 2nd Tactical Air Depot a few essential pieces of equipment and modification units to accomplish the first mission to be given the unit on 20 February 1944. A definite handicap has been experienced in the absence of Signal Corps equipment.

### **JOB TRAINING**

Upon arrival at this station, all enlisted men were immediately put to work on their respective jobs, installing the station telephone system, organizational lines, radio repair, and message center and cryptography. Over eleven men have been sent to technical schools for special training.

### **ATTACHMENT "A"**

Detachment "A" was activated on 25 February 1944 and sent to AAF Station 194 in Team "B", 304th Service Group.

### **SUMMARY**

Though the members of this organization were received from several places, and were not given proper training for several months in the 8th Air Force, they have proven themselves very good and willing workers, putting the company in fine operational order.

The present strength of 75 enlisted men, 10 of whom have unauthorized specialist serial numbers, is causing a certain handicap, and it is anticipated that the overages in specialist serial numbers will soon be removed and shortages made up.

All organizational files and records prior to date of overseas movement were stored at Hammer Field, Fresno, California.

1. In compliance with secret ltr, your Headquarters, dated 5 May 1945, subject same as above, the following historical information is submitted:

a. (1) Date of original activation of unit: Company Records indicate that organization was activated about April 1941 at March Field, California, and commanded by 2nd Lt. J.W. Runyon. The company was then known as 25th Signal Platoon, Air Base.

(2) Dates of all activation changes: Company originally activated as 25th Signal Platoon, Air Base, April, 1941, at March Field, California. In July 1942 the organization was redesignated as 25th Signal Company, Service Group, and moved to Walla Walla Air Base, Washington. On 6 June 1943 it was again redesignated 1025th Signal Supply and Maintenance Company (Avn), and on 28th June 1943 was again redesignated as 1025th Signal Company, Service Group, at Station 101, High Wycombe, Bucks, England. Detachment "A" was activated on 25 February 1944, and assigned to Station 154, Gosfield, Essex, in Team "B", 304th Service Group. Detachment "B" was activated on 12 October 1944, and assigned to Strip A-72, Peronne, France, in Team "B", 304th Service Group. On 16 February 1945 Detachment "A" was reabsorbed by Headquarters at Strip A-74, Niergnies, Nord, France, and Detachment "B", still at Strip A-72, was redesignated as Detachment "A".

b. (1) History of all movements: Company activated about April 1941 at March Field, California. Organization moved in June 1941 to Hammer Field, Fresno, California; July 1942 to Walla Walla Air Base, Washington; March 1943 to Rome Air Depot, Sioux City Army Air Base, Iowa; April 1943 to Camp Kilmer, New Jersey; 1 June 1943 Station 101, High Wycombe, Bucks, England (VIII Air Force); 7 January 1944, Station 161, Boreham, Essex, England (IX Air Force); 8 March 1944, Station 154, Gosfield, Essex, England; 13 April 1944, Station 168, Rivenhall, Essex, England; 2 August 1944, to Station 492, Burn, Wilts, England; 21 August 1944, Marshalling Area, Camp 22, Southampton; 24 August 1944, Transit Area "B", France; 25 August 1944, Strip A-26, Gorges, Normandy, France; 15 September 1944, Strip A-41, Dreux, France; 5 October 1944, Strip A-72, Peronne, France; 12 October 1944, Cambrai, Nord, near Strip A-74; 16 February 1945, Strip A-74, Niergnies, Nord; 5 May 1945, Strip Y-55, Venlo, Holland.

**TO : COMMANDING GENERAL, IX Air Force Service Command, APO 149, U.S. Army.**

1. In compliance with Memorandum, your headquarters, dated 22 January 1944, the following Unit History is submitted:

An advance party, consisting of Radio Officer and Wire Chief, checked communication facilities at AAF Station 154 to be prepared for the move of the 304th Service Group. Telephones were installed and the headquarters building was made ready for the move, which occurred on 6 March 1944. The 314th Station Complement Squadron having recently moved out, this station was short personnel in the communication section, making it necessary for the Signal Company to do the entire job of operating station telephone and teletype and message center along with the message center and courier for the Service Group. The Ground personnel of the 397th Bomb Group had not arrived, so for the entire month the Signal Company handled all communications.

The Radio Repair Section serviced both Teams at Station 161 and 154, Detachment "A" being with Team "A" at Station 161. All installations and modifications were completed, and in the absence of Bomb Group personnel this organization did all repairing and tuning.

The 1025th Signal Company, Service Group, moved to AAF Station 154 on 6 March 1944, and Detachment "A" to AAF Station 161 on the same date.

Releases for Signal Corps Equipment began arriving around the middle of the month, and by the end of the month approximately 90% was on hand.

Lt. Thomas M. Brown (0500), Radio, was transferred to the 896th Signal Company Depot (Aviation) on 6 March 1944, and his vacancy was not filled until WO (JG) William E. Whitacre, W-2121851, was assigned and joined the organization on the 25th of the month.

The company strength reached the authorized level on 26 March, and was reduced to 91 on 28 March, six men having been transferred out as overages. The present strength of 91 still carries 7 as overages in MOS.

Two trailers have been modified to become, one a mobile radio station, and the other a mobile telephone, teletype, and message center operational unit.

**SUMMARY**

With the definite handicap of lack of equipment, tools and vehicles, which was overcome by the close of the month, the Signal Company was still able to handle its assignment in operations, radio repair and Signal Supply for the two stations.

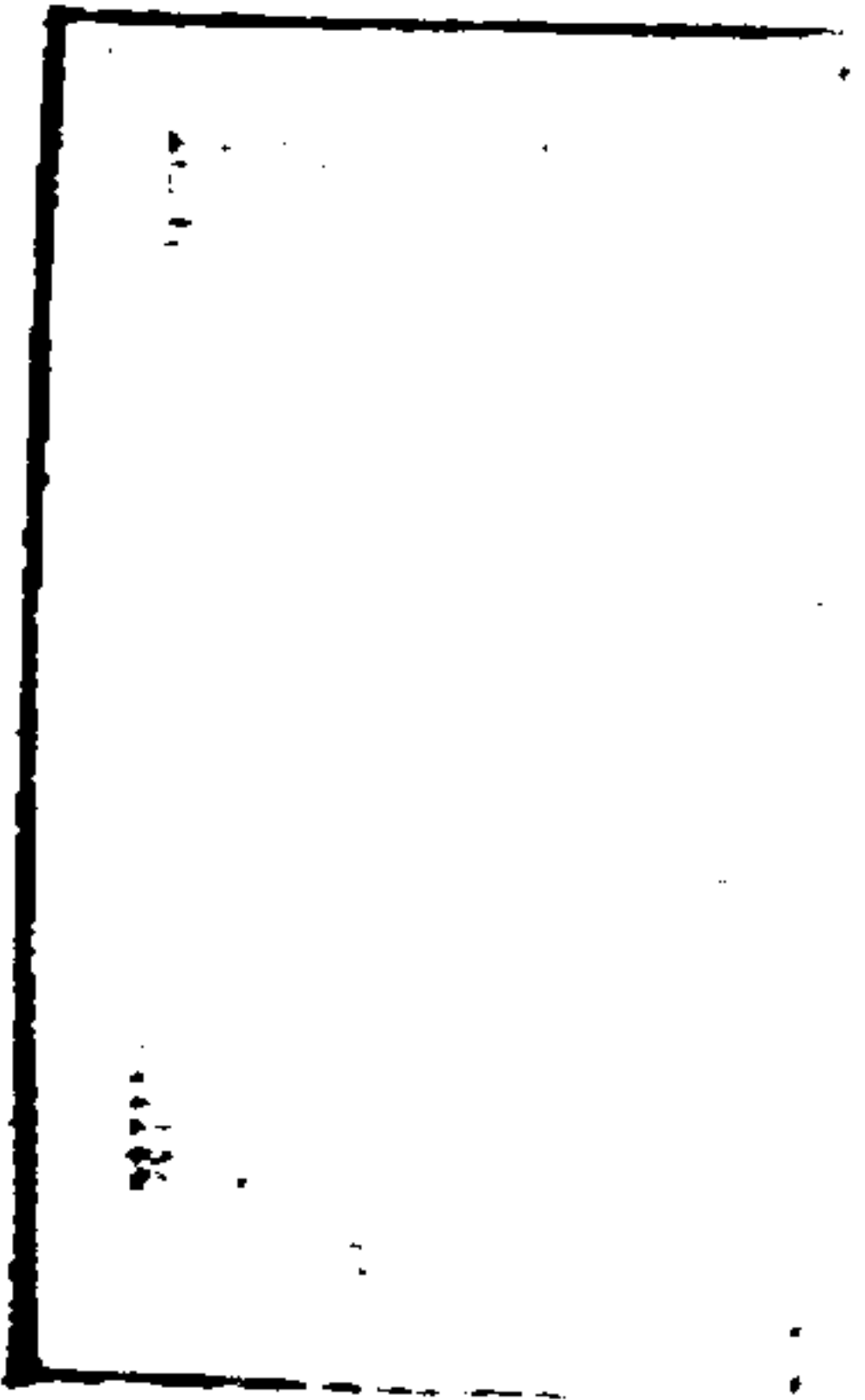

**SIGNAL OPERATIONS**

**A thirteen mile telephone line was installed between the two teams of the 304th Service Group by the T & T Section. This line was simplified for Teletype and has been giving good service. A two position switchboard was installed for 304th Service Group Headquarters and Team B.**

**RADIO REPAIR**

**Both Radio Repair Sections are thoroughly equipped and well trained, carrying on their assignments in good order. To date no equipment or modification has presented itself as too great a problem for repair outside of the lack of repair parts, in which cases the equipment was tagged and sent to the 2nd Tactical Air Depot.**

**SIGNAL SUPPLY**

**Both Storage & Issue Sections have the 30 day stock level and are able to maintain it. Replacements are immediately taken care of.**

**g. Personnel: 2nd Lt. Raymond F. Kiefer, O-1643749, assigned to organization from 15th Replacement Control Depot 9 April 1944, bringing total to 3 Officers and 1 Warrant Officer. WO (JG) William S. Whitacre, W-2121851, transferred to 67th Service Squadron on 28 April 1944. Many overages still exist, while most of the shortages have been taken care of. There are two first sergeants holding the grade, and one other in the grade of staff sergeant. Four men attended Specialist Schools during the month, receiving good training. Three of the 24 received excellent grades.**

**h. Equipment & Supplies: Approximately 90% of T/E equipment was received and considerable time was spent in making boxes and crates for shipment. A shortage of one truck and two trailers exists.**

Radio operators have modified a one (1) ton trailer to accommodate a complete SCR-188 B radio set. This equipment is being perfectly maintained and radio operation is carried on at the fixed station. #### RADIO REPAIR

Enlisted Men of these teams have been working on all required modifications and have installed sets in ambulances and Service Group Oxfords, as well as having been able to repair several personal radio sets.

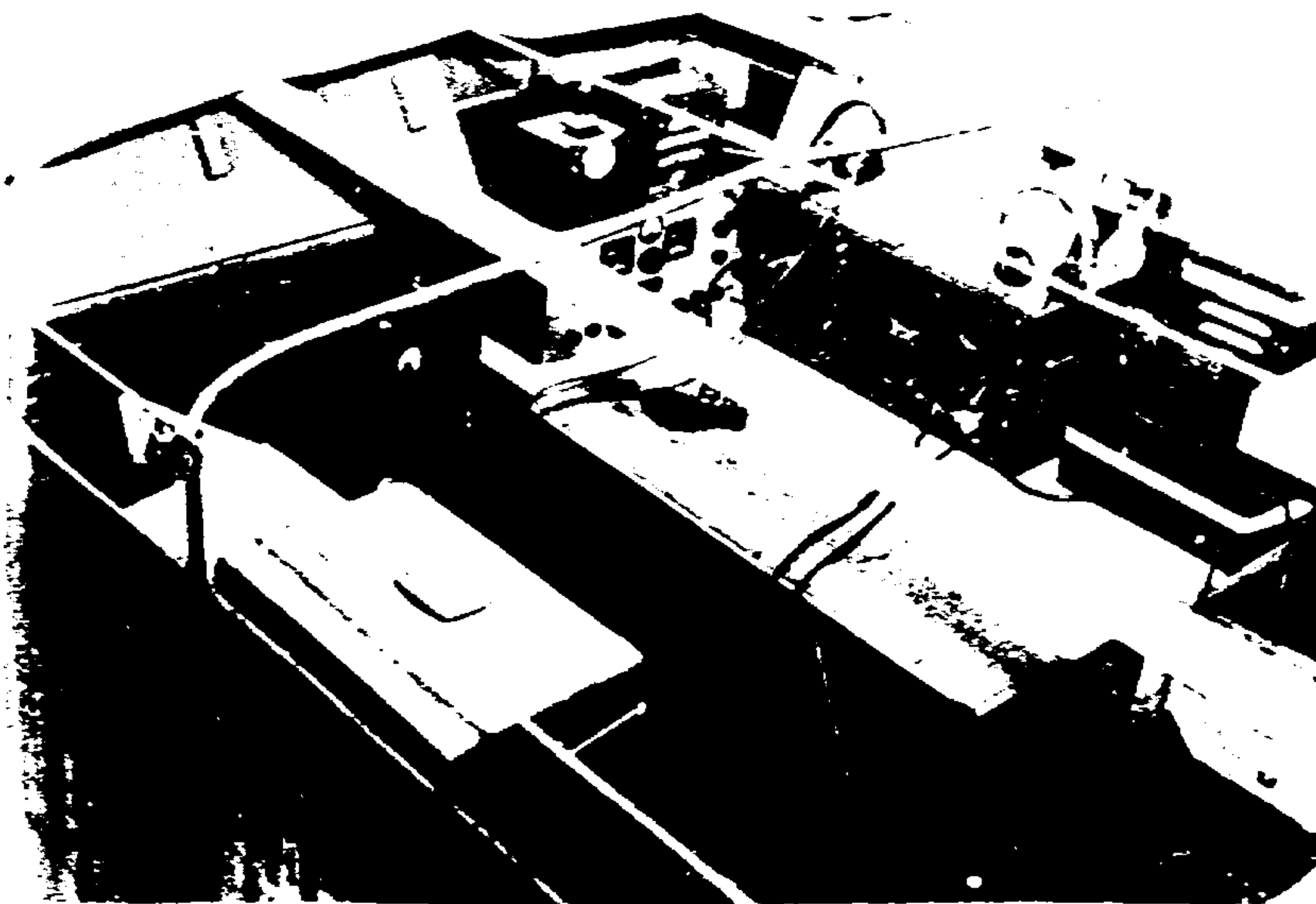

INTERIOR VIEW

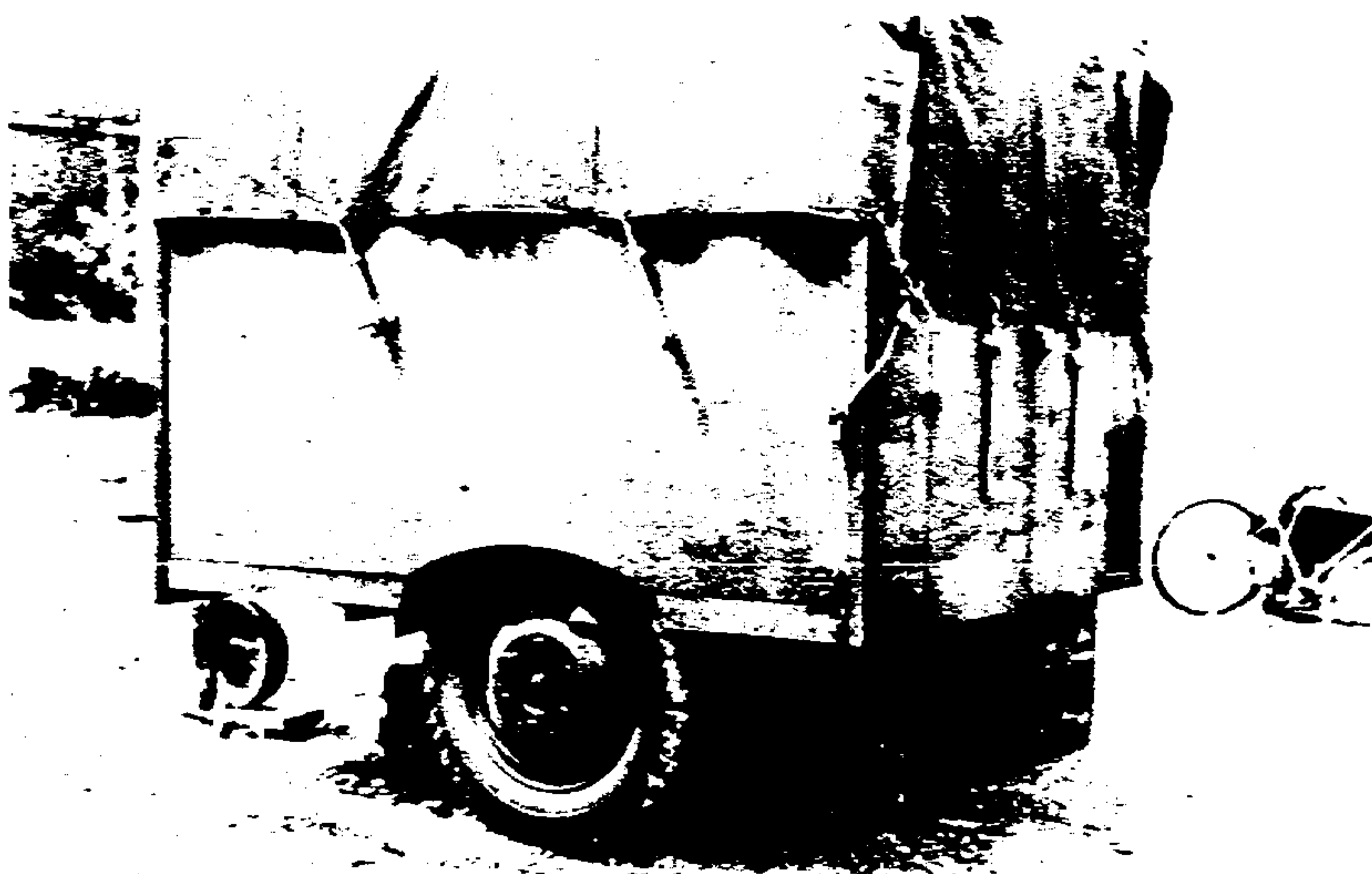
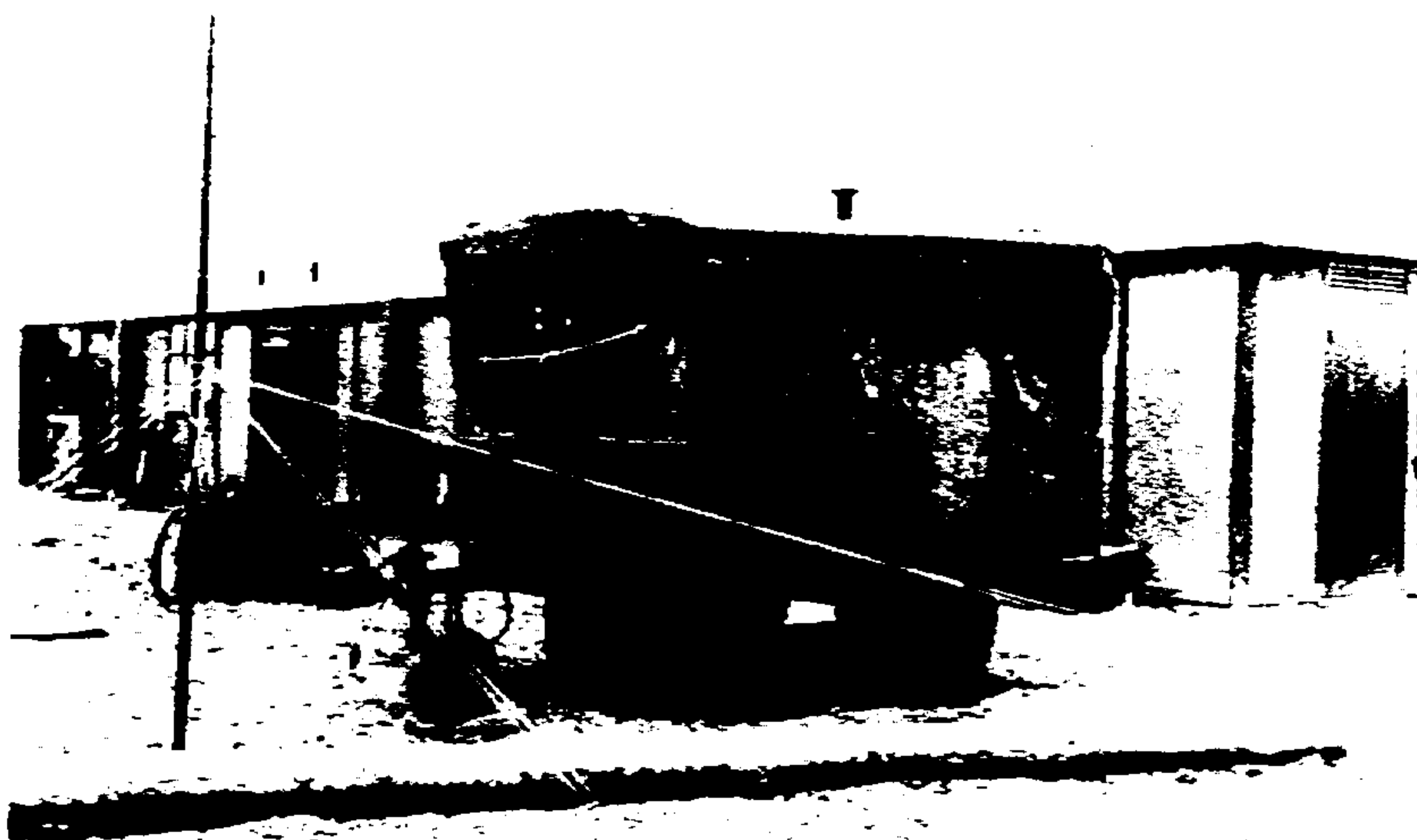
Radio Set SCR-188 mounted in 1 Ton Trailer. Designed and built by 1025th Signal Company, Service Group, March 1944.

1. In compliance with Memorandum 20-10, your Headquarters, dated 5 February 1944, subject same, the following installment for the month of June 1944 is submitted:

a. Organization: T/O 11-237, dated 26 March 1943. No changes.

b. Strength: As of 30 June 1944, Headquarters, 1025th Signal Company, Service Group, Less Detachment "A": 2 Officers, 67 Enlisted Men. Detachment "A", 1025th Signal Company: 1 Officer, 22 Enlisted Men.

c. Company Movement: All Sections practiced loading boxes and trucks under alert conditions at least once during the month. No actual movement was made.

d. Casualties: None.

e. Decorations: None awarded during month.

f. Function of the Organization:

#### SIGNAL OPERATIONS

One mile of telephone line to AAF Station 161 relaid and put overhead. Line to Station 161 rerouted for one mile through Witham. New line installed between Station 168 and Station 584. Another mile of 5 pair rubber cable laid to group switchboard from billeting area, and is used for 2 new phones installed. Another tie-line to Station 161 has been cut in, formerly used by AA Battery. The Tel & Tel section completed a permanent telephone directory from S.O.P., and the switchboard to the new numbers were made on 26 June 1944. The Radio Section has been practicing loading of all its boxes since indefinite radio silence was ordered on 6 June 1944. In addition, classes in Morse code have been given to all NCO's. The station has been moved twice during the month, into larger quarters. Members of the section have repainted their converted trailer and made several modifications.

#### RADIO REPAIR

Enlisted men of these teams have installed sets in ambulances for 596th Medical Detachment and 597th Medical Detachment., made modification on radio receiver in ARO Club, and installed extra speaker. They have also finished marking all boxes, in preparation for movement, as well as building a new repair bench in the radio shop. All regular modifications and checks have been made during this period with little difficulty.

h. Equipment & Supplies: Approximately 97% of all T/E equipment has been received and all boxes and crates have been completed. Equipment on hand not in immediate demand has been shipped to 2nd Tactical Air Depot for storage. No important shortages exist.

Message Center at Team "B" is handling all teletype traffic from SAUCH to GIRAFFE via Bomb Group relaying. Present voice line from SAUCH to GIRAFFE will not operate simplex teletype. Present courier system involves courier leaving Team "B" at 1800 hrs, arriving SAUCH at 1900 hrs in time to meet relay-courier to 1st Advanced Air Depot Area. The following morning courier departs from SAUCH at 0630 hrs, arrives Team "A" at 0900 hrs, and returns to Team "B" at 1330 hrs. Radio communication is available at both teams, but considerable difficulty has been caused by static and jamming of the radio net.

### RADIO REPAIR and SIGNAL SUPPLY

Both detachments are working from their mobile vans, doing all necessary repair work for the two air strips. Teams repaired 30 V.H.F. transmitters (50-625), 26 V.H.F. Receivers (50-624) and 7 liaison transmitters (50-377) during the past month, as well as innumerable other pieces of radio equipment in smaller quantities. All other necessary repairs and modifications have been accomplished, and radio repair men at Team "A" have begun 30 hour check of planes on field. Personal radios are repaired as time permits. 30 day stock level has been maintained, and all replacements are immediately requisitioned. A new micro-wave "Window" is now available along with sufficient supply of wave length "Chaff", although information from 1st Advanced Air Depot Area advises that micro-wave "Window" is not intended for use at the present time.

g. Personnel: Two enlisted men were assigned, and two enlisted men were transferred from the organization.

h. Equipment and Supplies: Approximately 90% of all equipment is on hand. A complete inventory of the equipment of all areas and services has been made, and logistical data compiled. Suggested I/O was drawn up and submitted to the S-4 Office, 304th Service Group. Considerable German and French radio and telephone equipment has been located and good use is being made of its small parts. A large telephone switchboard and frame were found and given to SAUCH as their requirements are greater than that of either team.

thru usual channels. The Army Orientation program was begun with special showings of the Signal Corps - Intelligence Section film, "Resisting Enemy Interrogation", for Headquarters and Detachment "A" personnel. Enlisted Men at Detachment "B" participated in a group discussion under the supervision of 1st/Sgt Cote, using current issues of the Army information magazine, "Army Talks", as a basis for discussion.

Recreation facilities have been provided at both Detachments with the cooperation of Special Services. Tri-weekly showings of Special Service movies, distribution of magazines and newspapers in Detachment day rooms, and occasional dances arranged with the cooperation of the local Red Cross chapters. Christmas parties for French war orphans were held on Christmas Eve. Headquarters personnel share the facilities offered by Headquarters & Headquarters Squadron, 304th Service Group.

h. Significant Happenings: Local switchboards were installed for Team Engineering Officers at both teams, relieving overburdened conditions on their separate lines. Switchboards have been named RIALTO for Team "A" and RICHMOND for Team "B" Engineering officers.

e. Decorations: Thirteen (13) Enlisted Men were awarded the Good Conduct Medal.

Orientation lectures continue at both Detachments and Headquarters, with scheduled weekly lectures presented by officers and enlisted men. The Group orientation officer has arranged frequent showings of instructional films as well as adequate distribution of the magazine, "Army Talks."

Recreation facilities have been provided at both Detachments with the cooperation of Special Services. Tri-weekly showings of motion pictures, the distribution of magazines and newspapers in day rooms, and occasional dances

arranged thru local American Red Cross chapters, have helped solve the problem of morale.

**h. Significant Happenings:** Wire crews at Detachment "B" laid two miles of seven-pair cable, moving group switchboard from Tech site to billeting area. All Tech site cable has been placed underground and two recent cases of its destruction by elephant-track have been reported. Signal Supply at Detachment "B" and the S-4 office of the Pathfinder Group have coordinated supply and repair activities which are to be handled by the Supply. Two French switchboards of 30-drops have been secured for installation at the two teams. These will afford considerable additional lines and will make it possible to discontinue ring two on any number. Both teams are soon to have additional lines to GAUORO. Four practice simulated gas attacks were held during the month, and switchboard operators contacted all operators in vicinity to test audibility and efficiency of reception under attack conditions.

**i. Transfer of Personnel:** No enlisted men were transferred from the organization and fourteen (14) enlisted men were transferred into the organization during the past month. Thirteen of the enlisted men have been placed on TDY as wire crews, and act as "trouble-shooters" maintaining existing telephone lines in the IX Air Force Service Command area.

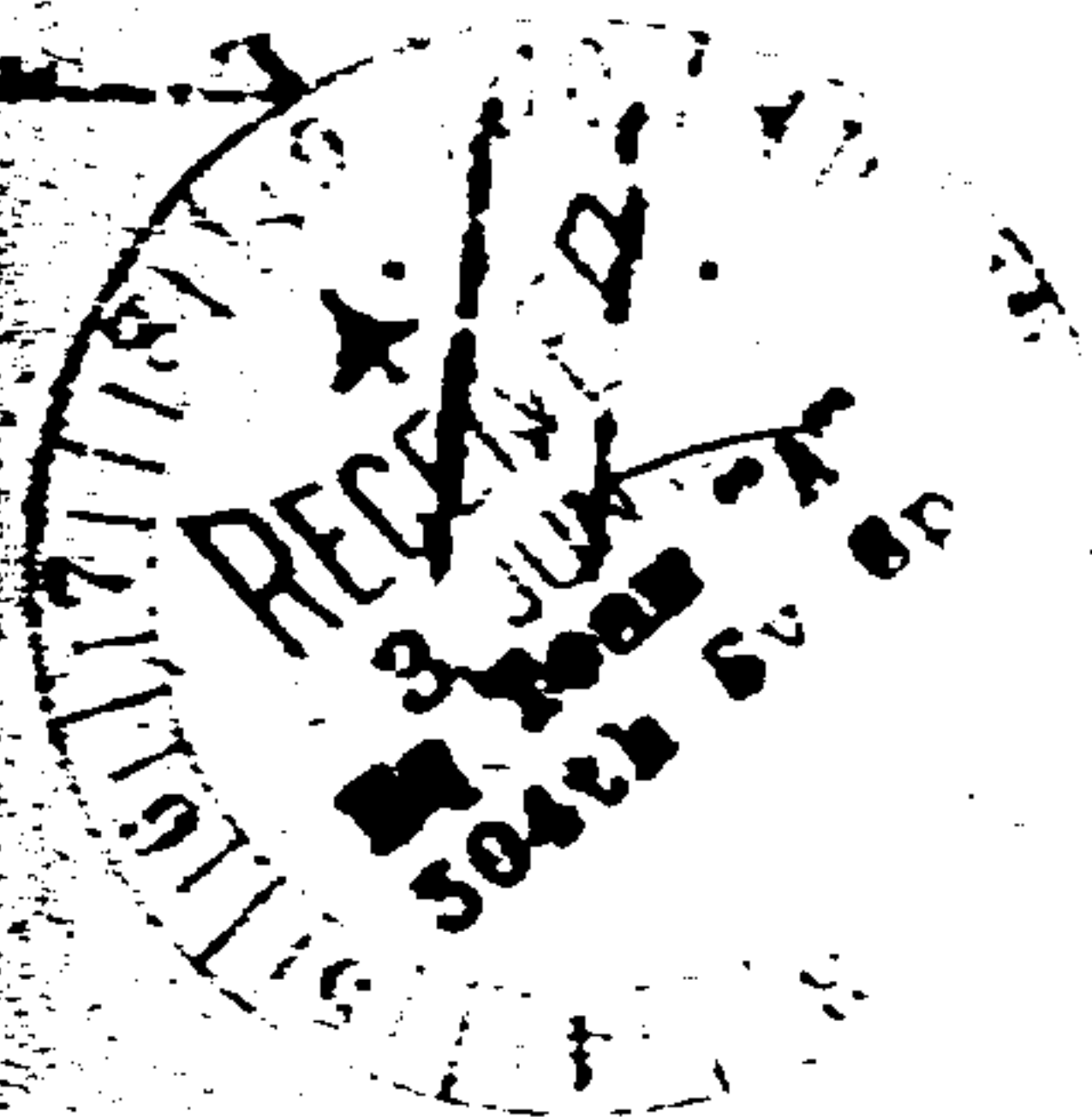

The month of May was a rather hectic one for the Detachment. The end of the war with Germany, the announcement of the adjusted service rating point system, the transfer of six old timers from the organization, the move back to Station A-72 near Peronne, France and the inventorying of all organizational equipment subsequent to the proposed conversion of the Service Group all combined to form a full and not soon forgotten 31 days.

The Victory announcement found the Unit at Station Y-55 in Germany where celebrating facilities were woefully lacking. The closest allied town was Venlo, Holland, which had been badly battered during the fighting in that section and which, according to the reports from those few who had visited the town, offered none too rosy prospects for men celebration bent. So celebrating was confined to a few thanks and a few whoops which were quickly supplanted by this question, "Where do we go from here?" This query was partially answered by the War Department's announcement of its adjusted service rating system the showing of the film "Two Down and one to Go" and the transferring of six men out of the unit.

The six men transferred, Tec 4 John Purdy, Tec 5 Francis Mackowiak, Tec 5 William Hubler, Tec 5 Jean D. Weber, Tec 5 Lawrence Warner and Pvt Claude Bridges were all old men in the outfit and it was with a sincere regret that all men bid them goodbye and wished them luck in their new assignments. The regret was deepened by the feeling that their leaving was only a forerunner of what was to come and that many more sad partings would take place during the anticipated redeployment conversion.

Notice of the move back to Peronne, was received gladly by those who had left numerous friends in that vicinity. Others, however, expressed the feeling that nothing was being accomplished by the change and that it merely occasioned more work.

**SECRET**

The move was made according to plan. There were no mishaps, even though the weather was generally bad and the roads through Holland and Belgium were worse. In contrast of the fine billets the men had occupied in Athois when operating at Station A-72 during the winter, the tents now occupied at Estrees en Chanssee seem like poor lodging. However, in fair weather, they are comfortable and the men snugly content themselves with the knowledge that they had the good quarters when it counted, during the snow and cold of last winter.

The detachment is now in full operation at Station A-72 and all men are awaiting the conversion with interest. There is a deep feeling of regret that the unit must be disbanded but the feeling is softened by the knowledge that many of the men will still be together in the new organizations to be formed.

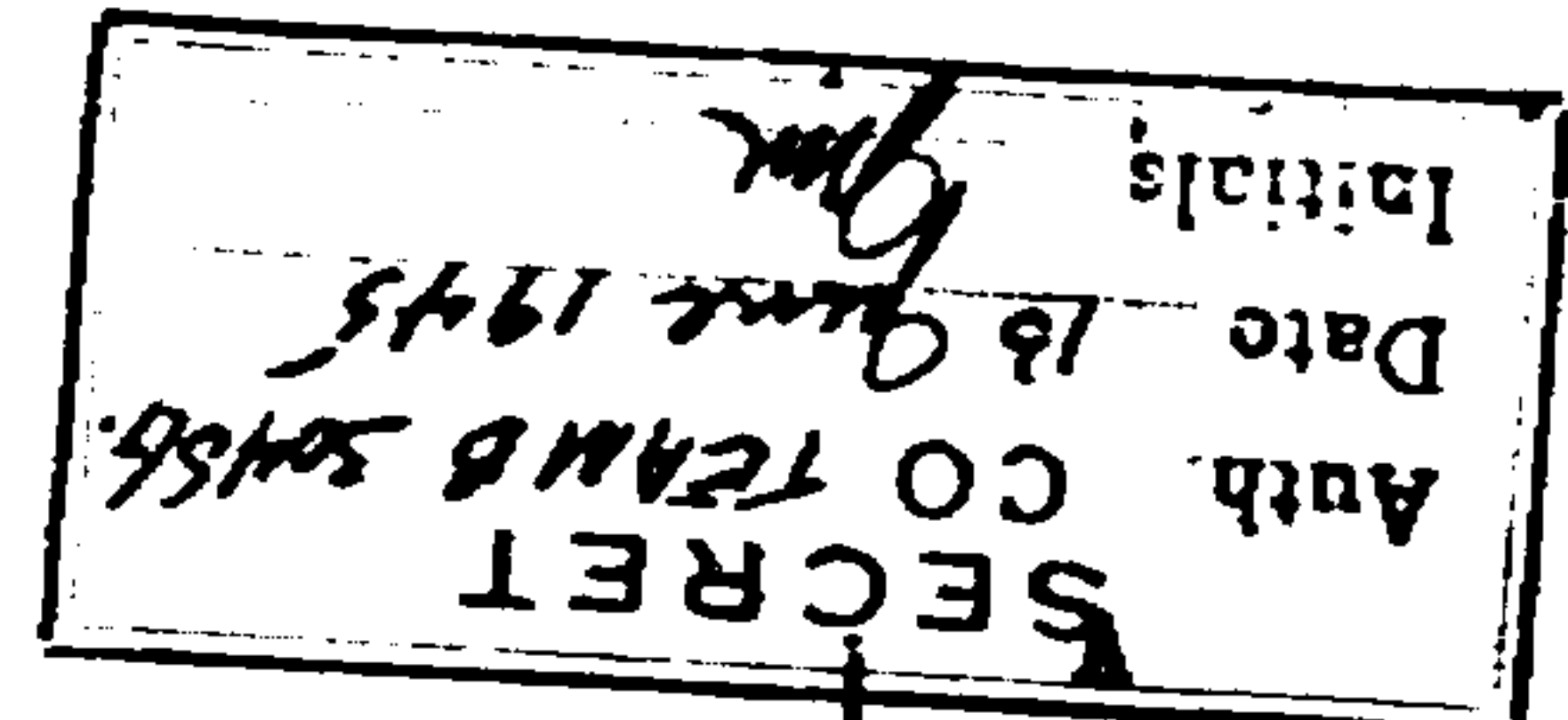

The organization was reabsorbed effective 13 June 1945 by the Parent organization, less personnel and equipment. Personnel were assigned to their new squadrons comprising the 482nd Air Service Group which is the reorganization of Team "B" 304th Service Group. Organizational equipment was divided properly among these three new squadrons, namely Hq & Air Base Services Squadron, 482nd Air Service Group; 724th Air Material Squadron and 900th Air Engineering Squadron.

Some dissatisfaction was noted among various enlisted men in their being transferred into the Air Corps, though with the reorganization felt necessary for proper Group functioning, it is presumed each man will soon find his place.

The part played by this organization with the Hq 1025th Signal Company, with 304th Service Group since 7 January 1944 has been a colorful one. The company's outstanding credit is the award of the Meritorious Service Plaque.

All officers and enlisted assigned to the unit during this period have left with knowledge that they had been assigned to an unusually outstanding organization, proud of their record.
