Britain has announced that some 1,600 000 Germans will be demobilized from the British occupation zone. They are to be demobilized at the rate of 12,000 per day. No officers will be released. Those being sent home are to be sifted to make sure no war criminals will be released

Two German youths, ages 16 and 17, were executed today after being found guilty on charges of espionage against allied troops. They were members of the German Youth.

Peace movements for the settling of the dispute in Levant are being carried out in Cairo, Paris, and London.

Kamikaze Special Attack Corps

This time the Japanese know that it would take more than a typhoon to save them. They knew they must create their 'divine wind', and so they created the Kamikaze Special Attack, Corps.

These pilots are dedicated to death! There is no returning from their mission. When the pilot takes off, he is going on a one way trip. Their mission is to crash dive a bomb laden plane into a warship or a transport with the object of sinking the ship at the loss of one pilot and one plane.

The Kamikaze Special Corps first went into action against McArthur's troops two weeks after the invasion of the Phillipines.

Japan is in a lather over the exploits of this suicide corps. The newspapers radio broadcasts, magazines and reports from neutral sources show that the Japanese people have risen to the point of hero worship over the reported successes of the Kamikaze. Such high acclaim from the people has prompted many pilets to join the Kamikaze.

The average Kamikaze volunteer is five feet three inches tall and weighs one hundred and eighteen pounds. He is between the ages of nineteen and twenty five. 
